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P.E.I. Farm Income Down

OTTAWA — An advance preliminary report released by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reveals that in 1963 farm net income for Prince Edward Island was down from the preceding year.

Net income from island farming operations is estimated at \$6,346,000 compared to \$6,875,000 in 1962 and \$6,908,000 in 1961.

The P.E.I. income included \$2,340,000 from farm products and \$3,816,000 from income in kind for a total of \$29,247,000.

Offsetting this were operation and depreciation charges of \$2,430,000 leaving a net income of \$6,346,000.
