Inspected Educational Facilities On Mainland
A thorough inspection of the large Moncton High School featured the trip of the Legislative Committee on Education yesterday morning. Greeted by the principal, Dr. W.C. Haines, the members were taken on a tour of the school embracing every one of the many facilities provided students. The two-storey building built in the English architectural style covers a large area and is complete down to a gymnasium and auditorium seating 1,300. It is a composite school combining academic studies and vocational training with pupils from Grade 9 to 13 or first year university. A large proportion of its 52 teachers have minimum degrees and all have a minimum of three years teaching experience.
Dr. Haines, in commenting on the large proportion of pupils of French descent in the Province, stated that he noted a growing movement to have the school examinations made bilingual. The 1,200 pupils have excellent physical facilities with first class workpal shops ranging from draughts-men's classrooms to full automotive garages.
FULL ACADEMIC COURSE
All students in Grade 9 take the full academic course as well as shop and commercial work and it is believed that by the time they reach Grade 10 it is known what their future educational course will be.
The Committee learned on its two-day tour that in New Brunswick education administration units are on a county basis with a seven-man school board of whom four are elected by ratepayers in the county and the other three appointed by the Provincial Government.
In each county, with the exception of Restigouche, there is a uniform tax assessment, but at the same time an equalization fund is maintained to aid the poorer counties in providing at least minimum educational facilities.
AT PORT ELGIN
Mr. Harvey Malmborg, principal of the Regional Memorial School at Port Elgin, believes that the larger the unit the more efficient it is. The pupils in his school represent 12 districts in a territory stretching for 17 miles each way and covering an area of approximately 500 square miles. They are transported free of charge on county operated buses.
In that territory are local schools having grades one to six. There are 10 one room schools, two two room schools and one six room school. In the district is a separate school children of Roman Catholic faith, but it is operated and financed entirely by Catholic ratepayers who also pay the uniform tax assessment. They are primarily of French descent and that language is used in school.
The Memorial School is excellently equipped and takes grades 9 to 12. Despite distances travelled students have lost only six days due to storms blocking highways.
The Committee arrived back in the city last evening and will hold four more public hearings next week starting Monday night in the Legislative Chamber.

Minister Moves To Put More Teeth In Existing School Act
A move to put teeth in the school act is seen in an amendment to the Act at present undergoing second reading in the Legislature. The amendment makes provision for the appointment of an official trustee who shall replace the regular trustees of a school district where, in the opinion of the Minister of Education, the said regularly elected trustees have defaulted in respect to outstanding debentures or obligation owing to any creditor.
The Minister felt it would not be necessary to take any such action described above but at the same time felt it was necessary to have such legislation for the protection of the fund. Some districts, he said had taken the attitude, "It's a Government loan so why hurry about paying it back".
Premier Matheson said there was no need for alarm in any of the cases in default since the mortgage held included the property in the district. "We have plenty of security," he said.
Another amendment provides that the Government guarantee all loans of \$1,000 and upwards made through the Superannuation Fund. Previously they were required to guarantee only loans of over \$5,000.
Provision is made for the raising of the minimum supplement paid by school districts. The minimum supplement for a second class teachers has been raised from \$200 per annum to \$250 while that of first class teachers has been raised from \$300 to \$350 per annum.
Another amendment in the Act calls for recognition of service for teachers who have served part of their time outside of the Province. Also academic qualifications over and above that required by the Department for regular license will be recognized by additional remuneration. Mr. Clark didn't intimate what the extra remuneration would be but said a scale of qualifications would be set up by order-in-council.

On Tuesday night at the Y.M.C.A. five Junior Hi-Y Clubs met in the banquet room. The program was "Youth and Alcohol." The meeting opened with the opening ritual led by Dianne Rupert, president of the Theta-Rho Junior Hi-Y. Following the ritual, a devotional service took place conducted by three members of Junior Hi-Y Judy MacDonald, John Owen and Margaret Parker.
A film was then shown entitled "Far from Alone" dealing with a young athlete and his convictions against the use of alcohol. Following the film a panel discussion was held led by Captain Carter of the Salvation Army with Dr. Forsythe, well known City psychiatrist. Also on the panel was a member of the Alcoholics Anonymous.
After the members of the panel gave their various opinions on the alcohol problem, an interesting question period followed with the Hi-Y members participating. The program of the evening proved very successful to all present. Captain Carter closed the meeting with prayer.

Former Islander Dies In The U.S.A.

While on his trip "Rollie" visited Vienna, Germany, Switzerland and France, and the counties of Devon and Dorset in Southern England.
Mr. Taylor, who is a prominent member of the Charlottetown Camera Club, also showed the members a series of colored slides taken on his trip. These views included watch factories and winter playgrounds in Switzerland, the camera factories in Germany, The Royal Staffordshire China factory in England, along with many other wonderful European winter scenes.
Mr. Taylor's talk was interesting and highly educational, and the Centennial Y's Men thanked him for an enjoyable evening.
Other business conducted at this meeting included the passing of a motion to invite the Maritime Y's Men's Club to hold their 1958 Regional Convention in Charlottetown, with the Centennial Y's Men acting as hosts for the occasion.

Out of Province Photographers To Pay Stiff License Fee

Local photographers will have protection under the Pedlar's Act now before the Legislature. A license fee of \$200 will be imposed on non-resident photographers who wish to solicit business on the Island while Island photographers will not be required to have a license.
Hon. B. Earle MacDonald who sponsored the Bill said there had been complaints from parents and teachers that itinerant photographers were visiting the schools of the Province and occupying considerable time in taking pictures of the pupils both group and individual. He had also complaints from local photographers who said these men were taking business away from them.
Under existing legislation a license of \$50 is required of anyone soliciting business in this manner.
Hon. Mr. Clark felt that it would be a mistake to discourage the taking of pictures in the schools since many of these pictures were highly prized both by the children and the parents. He did feel however that some steps should be taken to prevent out-of-the-province people from profiting from this trade when local photographers were available.
LICENSE UNNECESSARY
R.R. Bell thought the \$50 license should not apply to local photographers but felt it would be advisable to make the license higher for those outside the province. He suggested \$200 which was agreed to by the House.
Premier Matheson said many of these photographers from outside the Province were of the high pressure type and could easily take advantage of young teachers with a slick sales talk. He was in favor of discouraging them from Island members of the profession.
S.S. Hessian, Liberal, Fifth Kings said there was considerable trouble with two photographers from Ontario who wanted to take pictures of the children in Montague. One of these men was chased from one school and his partner appeared a few minutes later at the same school. Mr. Hessian felt that these men were carrying on a racket.

In the March issue of the Ayrshire Review, Ayrshires from seven Island herds appeared prominently in the production records for the various classes.

Charlottetown Trim Honor, owned by the Experimental Farm, was 2nd, in the Junior 2-year-old Class while Charlottetown Sir Roderick Dorothy was 3rd, in the Mature Class and Charlottetown Flora 3rd, in the Junior 4-year-old Class, producing 159 per cent and 158 per cent of Breed Average respectively for fat.
Kirkside Rose, owned by George P. Matheson and Son was 3rd, in the Senior 4-year-old Class. Fairview Lollipop, owned by Andrew B. and Fred T. MacRae, was 4th, in the Junior 4-year-old Class while Colmarium Jennie F, owned by John W. Lewis, Freetown, P. E.I. was 5th, in the Junior 4-year-old Class.
Royalty Fashion Joan, owned by Col. F.I. Andrew, was 8th, in the Senior 2-year-old Class and Royalty Fashion Joy, owned by Col. F. I. Andrew, was 4th, in the Senior 3-year-old Class. Fairview Annette, owned by A. MacRae and Sons, stood 5th, place in the Senior 2-year-old Class.
Charlottetown Dimple Gladys and Charlottetown Gall, owned by the Experimental Farm, stood 8th and 13th respectively in the Junior 3-year-old Class.
The production of all cows mentioned above range from 125 per cent to 159 per cent of Breed Average for fat production. These records serve to show that Island Ayrshires stand well up in the Breed for both milk and fat production.

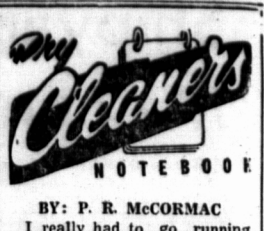

I really had to go running to the history books the other day. One of our favorite customers (she's a favorite, I guess, because she seems to like this column) came up and asked me where the dry cleaning business got its start.
Somebody, she said, must have had the bright idea of cleaning clothes in a fluid that, unlike water, had no affinity for textiles but at the same time went after the dirt.
Well, I don't know much more than when I started. The idea of dry cleaning, though, wasn't North American. It was French.
It all started in France about the middle of the last century, which makes the business a hundred years old, or so.
Since then, it's spread around the world. The methods used are about the same everywhere, but dry cleaning plants in Europe are quite different than on this side of the Atlantic. There are fewer dry cleaning plants in Europe, and they are generally much larger organizations.
There is efficiency in business, sometimes, but I think we've managed to keep the individual attention that a customer expects when you're handling personal belongings.
If, for instance, you come into our place and tell us that it's a blob of peach juice on your jumper, or a splash of so-and-so brand ink on your lapel, you know that the spot is going to be watched carefully throughout the whole cleaning process.
Knowing what the spot is, we'll use exactly the right solvent to remove it. But, and this is important too, we won't try it in the first place if it would harm the fabric.
