## SWEET PEA COMPETITION.

Names of the Prize Winners in Hazard & Moore's Exhibition.

The most attractive spot in Charlottetown to-day was undoubtedly Messrs Hazard & Moore's store, where the annual exhibition of sweet peas grown from seed purchased from Mr. Hazard charmed the many lovers of flowers who viewed the beautiful display. A number of exhibits were sent in and it must have been a difficult matter for the judges to make a decision and award the prizes. Mr. Hazard's own collection was the centre of attraction, though, of course, it was not put into competition with those of other exhibitors. Each variety was displayed in a separate container, the masses of distinct shades presenting a charming sight. Needless to say the characteristic of each variety was faithfully evident to each instance and the size of the blooms gave evidence of Mr. Hazard's acknowledged skill as a sweet pea grower. The exhibit made by Mrs. Hedley Palmer was also a most excellent one, and, arranged as it was in distinct shades fell but little short of Mr. Hazard's in conspicuous superiority. It was not such an easy matter to determine as to the relative merits of the remaining exhibits, when number of varieties, size and form had to be taken into account, but we feel sure that the judges' decision will be upheld by all who are competent to judge and who go as fully into all the relative merits of each collection as these gentlemen did, who, we learn were unanimous in their awards which were conferred by Mr. Hazard. The second prize for best collection was carried off by Mrs. W. M. Scott, and the third by Mrs. R. B. Norton. Mrs. Scott took first prize for bouquet of shades of red or blue, the second being awarded to H. C. McLeod and the third to H. E. J. Lewis. Messrs Edward Bayfield and Lawrence W. Watson were the judges in the contest, with Mr. Hazard as referee. The exquisite Dahlias, Lilies, Balsams, Palms and other plants grown by Mr. Hazard lent additional charm to the exhibition, which we trust that all lovers of flowers who have not already done so will visit. We are in a position to promise them a veritable treat.

MAJORITY.—At the annual meeting of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of New Brunswick, held in St. John a day or two ago, Dr. Darrach, of Kensington, was elected Grand Master for P. E. Island. Dr. Macneill, of Stanley, was elected Inspector General for the same province, and Neil McKelvie, of Summerside was elected Grand Chaplain.

POLICE COURT.—For being drunk and incapable James Hennessey was this morning fined \$4 or 20 days. MILITIA CHANGES.—By a recent militia order we learn that the establishment of the 4th regiment of this province has been readjusted. The number of companies reduced from five to four, but the strength of each company is increased from forty to fifty-three officers, non-commissioned officers and men. The establishment of the Regiment is increased from 232 to 244.
