Below Par Scores In 1st Round British Golf Open

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP)—Three British professionals—a Scot, an Englishman and a Welshman—were the Old Course of St. Andrews in a sunny, benign mood Wednesday and took three strokes off par of 68 in the opening round of the British open golf championship.

One of the three, Dal Rees of Wales, has been runner-up in the last two British opens.

Other 69s were shot by Syd Scott of England and Eric Brown, a former Scottish fireman on a railway engine. Scott shared second place with Rees and Bobby Locke last year, when Australia's Peter Thomson won.

Just behind the three leaders with steady 70s were pros Henry Cotton, Bernard Hunt, Frank Jowle, and Cecil Denny, all of England; Denis Smallwood, Wales, and Ian Martin, Scotland.

JOWLE LOW QUALIFIER

Jowle was low qualifier and the man who shot the New Course in 63 on Monday. Hunt spent last winter in the U.S. on the winter circuit and said:

"The chipping, putting and short game which I worked so hard on in America stood me in good stead out there today."

Thomson was bracketed with 11 others with 71.

Scott never has won a big tournament. His greatest day was last year on the second day of the open when he shot a 67 at Birkdale in tie of that with Rees.

TWENTY BEAT PAR

Twenty golfers beat par today. Par 72s were shot by Byron Nelson, a veteran Texan who is on a sentimental journey to the home of golf; Joe Conrad, San Antonio, Tex.; the British amateur champion; and Jimmy McHale of Philadelphia.

Both McHale and Conrad are amateurs and along with Scotland's A. M. M. Bucher lead the non-salaried players.

Gene Conley Sets Cubs Down On 3 Hits; Kaline Leads Tiger Win Over White Sox

Gene Conley, chosen for the National League all-star team, became the first Milwaukee pitcher to win 10 games when he hurled the Braves to a 5-1 victory Wednesday over Chicago Cubs.

Conley gave up just three hits in the game at Chicago and missed a shutout when he yielded a lead-off single to pinch-batter Frankie Baumholtz in the sixth. An error, a walk and rookie Jim King's single followed, bringing in a run.

The Braves blasted 11 hits off three Chicago pitchers as starter Bob Rush suffered his fifth loss. The victory pulled the Braves within one game of the second-place Cubs.

Al Kaline slugged a two-run homer in the first inning to help Detroit Tigers to a 5-3 American League victory over Chicago White Sox. The triumph at Detroit snapped the Tigers' six-game losing streak—their longest in two years.

Kaline connected off loser Virgil Trucks following an inning opener single by Harvey Kuenn and a force-out grounder by Bill Tuttle. It was Kaline's 18th homer of the season. Ned Garver went all the way for Detroit. He yielded 12 hits and twice worked out of bases-loaded jams.
