As it is, the 34-year-old native of Fort William has combined with super-star Gordie Howe to give Detroit Red Wings one of their most potent one-two punches.

But ever since his rookie year in 1951 when he was tabbed as the "greatest prospect since Howe," there has been a definite lack of something.

Delvecchio showed all the signs of a future super star in that rookie year as a 15-goal scorer. He had all the necessary ingredients which make a hockey great, with one glaring exception—a fiery, competitive spirit.

Good hockey player, too nice a guy. That's the way they rate the six-foot, 190-pound Delvecchio. He's a hard worker, a goal scorer, he has finesse and he's far from lazy.

Kay Hoare's RCAF Team Captures Silver 'D' Title

SUMMERSIDE — The Kay Hoare rink from the RCAF station captured the Provincial Ladies' Silver 'D' Curling title yesterday afternoon at the Curling Club here by defeating the Ann Wood foursome of Charlottetown 13-9 in the final game of the championships.

Going into yesterday's play three rinks remained alive for the coveted curling crown but the Hoare foursome held a better chance of winning the spiel as it had not tasted defeat up to that time while the other two contenders both had suffered one setback.

The other rink alive at that time was the Ella Taylor rink, also of Charlottetown.

In the morning the Taylor and Wood rinks met for the right to play the Hoare quartet for the titles with the Wood rink winning a 9-8 squeaker.

The 1966 champions went through the five day spiel without a defeat. Members of the rink which will represent the province in the Dominion Diamond 'D' championships at Vancouver later this month are Kay Hoare, skip; Lila Tucker, mate; Diane Stark, second and Muriel Thomas, lead.

This is not a new experience for Skip Hoare. In 1963 she secured on a rink skipped by Fern Seale which represented the province in the National Championships. The provincial spiel that year was played at the Charlottetown Curling Club.

A six ender in the third clinched the title for the new champs yesterday afternoon in the final game of the championships.

Wood had counted five in the first two ends but the big six appeared to reverse the trend. Hoare had counted three in the third, the six in the fourth and a single in the fifth for a 10-5 lead. The runners-up never recovered. They counted singles in the sixth and eighth while Hoare added two to her total in the seventh. And one in the tenth. The Wood rink counted its two rocks in the ninth.

Members of the runner-up rink along with the skip Wood are Jane Hall, mate; Dorothy Cormier, second; and Ruby MacEachern, lead.

Following the final game Clinton A. Gray, Regional superintendent of Dominion Skates presented Silver 'D' Plaques to the competitors.

Mrs. Jerry Hayes, president of the P.E.I. Ladies Curling Association officiated at the ceremony.

A congratulatory telegram was also read from the president of Dominion Skates, Mr. MacArthur.

Grenoble Site Gains Bid; U.S. Officials Disfused

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (CP-AP) — Grenoble, France, was chosen Friday as the site of the 1967 world bobsledding championships, bitterly disappointing United States delegates who backed Lake Placid, N.Y.

"I am disgusted," said Stan Benham, of Missoula, Mont., vice-president of the International Tobogganing and Bobsledding Federation. Benham also criticized the Canadian representatives for backing the French city, whose bobsled track is only in the planning stage.

While temperatures rose in the committee room Friday, there was an appreciable drop outside. A 6 p.m. here the thermometer showed 30.2 degrees Fahrenheit and organizers prepared to go ahead tonight with the first two world championships.

Canadian team captain Vic Emery, 32, of Montreal, is defending the world four-man title. He won at St. Moritz, Douglas Anakin of Montreal, Michael Young of Port Credit, Ont., and Peter Kirby of Montreal will ride his No. 1 bob. All but Young were on the squad which also won the Olympic Gold Medal at Innsbruck in 1964.

The defending champions will start 12th in the first run down the 1,740-metre Ronco Chute tonight.

Canada's No. 2 bob, manned by Monty Gordon of Montreal, as captain, with Purville McDougall of Montreal, Bob Storey of Toronto and Paul Levesque of Montreal, will start sixth.

Benham, who won the world four-man title here in 1950, directed his hire at Emery, the Canadian delegate, for favoring Grenoble. He accused Emery of voting against Lake Placid "for personal reasons and not for the benefit of his own country."

Ferrari Vs. Ford At Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) It's Ford vs. Ferrari again today in the 24-hour Daytona Continental, more demanding of man and machine than any other international race except the 24 hours of Lemans in France.

Many things are new about the Continental. The race will be nearly twice as long. It took 12 1/2 hours to run last year at 2,000 kilometres (1,243 miles).

Most of the top 20 contenders in the field of 60 cars are newly designed machines making their first important start.

International rules for this type racing are revamped so that the world manufacturer's championship will be decided in the sports car class rather than grand touring.

FORD WON LAST YEAR But the basic duel between the Italian-made Ferrari and the Fords of the United States continues. Ford won here last year under the master hand of Carroll Shelby of Los Angeles, who went on to wrest the manufacturer's title from Ferrari. He's running a three-car entry of the Mark II Ford racers this year.
