ANOTHER MAN MADE MISERABLE.

NO CUT SALARIES THERE.

A proposition was submitted to the Winnipeg City Council a short time ago to reduce the wages of all corporation officials and laborers, but the aldermen rejected it on the ground that the state of affairs in Winnipeg did not call for any such reduction.

NEW TELEPHONE COMPANY.

A special to the New York Sun from St. Louis, Mo., says: A new telephone company, to be known as the Harrison Telephone Co. of Missouri will be organized this week. It promises to supply a much improved telephone at a rental which will not exceed \$1 per month, and perhaps be even lower.

WHOLE FAMILY POISONED.

Some days ago, at Michigan City, Ind., the family of Charles King, eight in number, partook heartily of pork. They were taken violently ill and suffered from trichina. Despite the efforts of the physicians of the afflicted family, the mother died and physicians declare there is no possibility of any of the household recovering.

HABEAS CORPUS.

An application was made this morning to Judge Hodgson for a writ of habeas corpus on behalf of Matthew Phelan, who is now in Queen's County Jail under a Scott Act commitment. His Lordship granted an order for the writ, and Phelan will come before the Judge on Tuesday next, when the argument will take place regarding the legality of Phelan's imprisonment.

THE MAILS.

Boats left Cape Traverse this morning at 9.25 with ten bags Summerside mail (the Charlottetown mail not connecting) but had to put back on account of the severe cold and high northeast wind. They will make another attempt to cross to-morrow morning, weather permitting. The boats left Tormentine at 8.45, with 52 bags, 5 bags being left behind, and arrived at Cape Traverse at 2.25.

HATSAZ.

In our Maritime 245 list, as published a couple of weeks ago, an untimely over-kill occurred in the case of Hatasz, Milford Farm's beautiful and speedy two-year-old filly of last year. She should have been marked as a two-year-old, in which class she proved herself to be one of the very best ever bred in the Province. We think she was capable of reducing her enviable mark of 2.41 by several seconds last year, and we look for her to be a great three-year-old this year.—Agronomist.

A FAMILY OF SCORCHERS.

A woman named Gosse, residing at Springfield, Mass., swallowed some rat poison a few days ago and died from the effects soon afterwards. She was twenty-five years of age and married. She would give no account for the act. Her father, a French-Canadian, committed suicide by cutting his throat with fifty years of age. Her brother, Joseph Colant, committed suicide in Springfield, Feb. 27th, 1893, by swallowing a pint of Paris Green. She leaves a husband and a child 11 months old.
