Await AL Approval In Athletics' Purchase

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The eight-man Philadelphia syndicate, seeking to complete the purchase of the Philadelphia Athletics, Monday night was granted a request to await American League approval before paying the Mack family for the stock.

Roy Mack came back to a stormy meeting of the syndicate after taking a one-hour recess to talk things over with his lawyer and told the group, "Boys, you can have an extension to await league approval." Earlier, Roy's brother, Earle, and their father, Connie, Sr., had granted the extension of time without a murmur. Roy had balked and a heated discussion followed.

Members of the syndicate stormed out of the meeting room, some obviously angry and discouraged.

ANGERED BY ROY

Several of the prominent Philadelphians, who declined to be identified, said within the hearing of reporters, Roy may have been trying to back out of selling them the club. They interpreted Will Harringer's refusal in Chicago to grant immediate approval as an aid to Roy in an attempt to back out of the deal.

One member said he thought Roy was trying to get out of the deal in order to sell to Arnold Johnson, Chicago businessman, for a better price.

Aluminum Ltd. Plans Expansion
MONTREAL (CP)—Aluminum Limited Wednesday announced plans to double the authorized capital of the company and to make a substantial increase in the productive capacity of a new aluminum plant at Kitimat, B. C.

The announcement was made by Nathaniel V. Davis, president of Aluminum, following a directors' meeting.

Mr. Davis said the board had decided to increase the authorized capital of Aluminum Limited to 20,000,000 no-par-value shares from 10,000,000. This would be accomplished by the creation of 10,000,000 additional shares ranking equal in all respects with the 10,000,000 shares now constituting the capital of the company.

Approval of the increase in capital will be sought at a shareholders' meeting Nov. 23.

Subject to shareholders' approval of the capital increase, plans were being studied to give shareholders the right, probably early in 1955, to subscribe for additional share of the company.

"If such financing is undertaken," said Mr. Davis, "it is expected that the proceeds will amount to approximately \$40,000,000."

Mr. Davis said the expansion plans for Kitimat will boost production there by 60,000 tons of aluminum ingot a year to a total of 151,500 tons.

The expansion, including the installation of an additional power generator at Kemano, B.C., and the construction of additional smelter facilities, will cost approximately \$45,000,000, Mr. Davis said.

Lou Boudreau Can Have Job

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP)—Lou Boudreau, deposed manager of the Boston Red Sox, can always find a job at his alma mater, Illinois. "I wouldn't supplant any of our present coaches with Lou," said Illinois athletic director Doug Miller, "but there are many ways in which he could serve the university."

Boudreau, former Illinois baseball and basketball star, is seeking a major league affiliation. He drew a reported \$55,000 for 1954 as manager of the Red Sox and has the same amount coming in 1955 under terms of his contract.

Canada To Produce Various Types Of Guided Missiles

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada intends to get into production of various types of guided missiles. It won't be for some time, though.

Defence Minister Campney and Defence Production Minister Howe are going to the United States for a week in November to have a look at development work and production there in the fields of guided missiles, new aircraft, aircraft engines and the like.

They may also be on the lookout for an American engine to power the CP-105, a successor to the RCAF's long range, all-weather CP-100 jet fighter plane. A prototype of the CP-105 is expected to be ready in 1956.

Final stages have been reached in Canada on development of an air-to-air guided missile to arm fighter planes. But there has been more than one purpose to this development.

Canadian scientists have acquainted themselves with the principle and workings of guided missiles. Although air-to-air guided missiles differ from ground-to-air or surface-to-surface missiles, the principle of their operation is the same.

Nearly 60 Canadian soldier-technicians already have been trained on Nike, the U.S. Army's ground-to-air, anti-aircraft guided missile and will man the weapon this winter during cold-weather tests at Fort Churchill, Man.

Thus, when Canada decides to go into production of various types of missiles, there will be a fairly large group who will possess the necessary know-how.

It has long been recognized here that present anti-aircraft weapons are inadequate to meet the threat of an air attack.

The obvious answer is ground-to-air guided missiles and Canada is waiting for the right weapon to come along. Officials here do not consider the Nike the final answer to this problem.
