

# Prime Minister Wilson's Power Seen Renewed After Conference

BLACKPOOL, England (CP) Prime Minister Wilson, renowned as a brilliant political operator, has emerged with his reputation and his position intact after a five-day defence of his policies against minority opposition in his Labor party.

Wilson, a sometime leftist who captured the party leadership 31 months ago, has shifted to the political right since he became prime minister last October. Part of the reason may have been the critical need to persuade a questioning world that he would follow traditional methods in overcoming an economic crisis at home. But part may be due also to some private views on how the country should be run.

Nevertheless, by vote of the annual party conference this week, Wilson won every important battle against angry left-wingers, powerful trade union chiefs and some uneasy moderates.

## Canada-US Auto Deal Said Unfairly Panned

Drawing attention to Opposition allegations that the Canadian-American automotive agreement is nothing but a \$50,000,000 handout to the automobile industry, Mark R. MacGulgan, Liberal candidate for Queen's along with B.E. Jones of Banbury, speaking at the annual meeting of the Fifth District of Queens held in Charlottetown Community Hall last evening, charged that the situation "was being grossly misrepresented by all three opposition leaders."

"It was never expected that the agreement — not yet passed by the American Congress but put into immediate effect by Canada — would promptly close the gap between Canadian and American motor cars", Dr. MacGulgan maintained.

Eventually Canadian buyers would benefit from a narrowing of the gap, he said, likely in a year or two, but the cost of cars in the two countries probably could never be identical because of the lower unit cost resulting from much higher volume production in the United States.

To the American price must be added Canada's 11 per cent excise tax, various provincial sales

taxes and the impact of the unfavorable exchange rate. He said that industry Minister Drury had pointed out in Ottawa yesterday that price consideration must be based on the \$150 difference in popular priced cars at the assembly line level.

This price difference would be substantially reduced by the time the 1968 models come out, Mr. Drury had said.

## Island Cattle Breeders Purchase Top Animals

Nine cattle breeders from this province brought 20 high-class Hereford breeding animals to farms across the Island this week. They purchased them at

the dispersal sale of one of Canada's better known Hereford breeders, E. H. (Ernie) Himmelman, LaHave, Nova Scotia.

For the most part the animals have the blood of Whittier National Velvet, that won the grand championship at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto several years ago, or that of Beaumont Celebrity, the English bull that topped the dispersal sale this week at a price of \$2,600.

Celebrity was purchased by George Rodanz, Stouffville, Ontario, who is Canada's best known Hereford breeder. The Velvet bull was also imported from England and he is now heading a prominent herd in Western Canada.

His grand championship at Toronto in 1960 was the first taken by a Hereford beef breeder east of Ontario.

SENIOR SIRE One of Velvet's sons, Nova National Romeo, is a senior sire on the herd of Shed Acre Farms, owned by the Island Development Company in the Brackley area. Romeo was a consistent grand champion winner for owner Gordon Matheson, Hunter River, before he sold him to Shed Acres earlier this year.

Royal Grand championships in any breed are a scarce commodity among Maritime breeders. Daniel Jewell, North River, has since won a grand at the Royal with a bull he bred and showed, Chestnut Royal Technician, and an Ayrshire cow bred by Keith Boswell, Victoria, Dealands Royal Margaret, went to the grand championship spot at Toronto last week.

The female price was the \$765 paid for a heifer that had won the female grand championship at the Hants County exhibition at Windsor, N.S., last week. She went to the Willowbank Farm, Port Williams, N.S.

McKinley Brothers, North River, were the largest Island purchasers as they bought six animals at the sale. The lot consisted of one bull and five females, it was learned yesterday.

AVERAGE \$929 Mr. Himmelman told The Guardian that his bulls averaged \$920 and his cows and calves averaged \$409.

Fulton Sanderson and Sons, York Point bought three heifers, one of them sired by the National Velvet bull and is carrying the service of Beaumont Celebrity. The other two are January calves.
