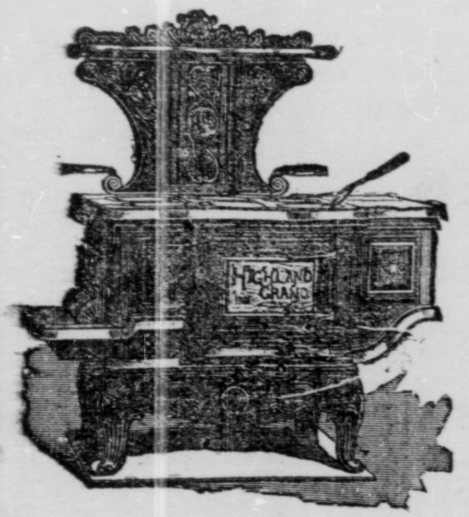

## HON. SENATOR FERGUSON

Honored at Georgetown.—He Delivers a Great Speech.—Fine Address by Hon. Mr. Gordon.—Encouraging Report by Mr. Morrisey.

The following address of welcome was presented to the Honorable Senator Ferguson, P. C., by the Georgetown Tupper Club, on Monday evening:

TO THE HONORABLE SENATOR FERGUSON, P. C.,—

In the name of the Liberal-Conservatives of Georgetown and vicinity we bid you a most hearty welcome to our town.

Your services to this province in many capacities of great responsibility and importance have received deserved recognition at the hands of the leaders of the great Liberal-Conservative party; but we assure you that none have watched your career with greater pride and appreciation than the people of your native province.

With respect to all the great measures with which your name has been connected during your long public life, we desire to draw special attention to your action in the matter of the secrecy of the ballot. Thanks to the firm stand taken by you on that question the sacred right to vote as conscience dictates is still maintained in this province.

In the appeal which is now being made to the people of Canada we feel sure that the electors of Georgetown will show their appreciation of this privilege, and contribute their full share in turning out of office a party who have ruthlessly broken their promises to the electors, etc., and whose career must meet with the condemnation of every honest Canadian, and securing the return to power of the Liberal-Conservative party who will give Canada a more competent, progressive and honest administration than has been.

Senator Ferguson, before referring to the great public questions of the day, gave a short resume of the Senate's action on the secrecy of the ballot.

He then briefly reviewed the history of the Liberal-Conservative party, and showed that they have redeemed every pledge given to the electorate of Canada.

He then took up the various planks of the Liberal party as adopted at the Ottawa convention; and as he scored point after point against the Laurier Government the hall fairly shook with cheers.

He appealed to the farmers present to know if the reciprocity treaty promised by the Liberal party had been negotiated. His explanation of the emergency ration control was most explicit. He closed with a short but eloquent eulogy of the Conservative candidate, Mr. A. C. McDonald, and urged each and all present to use every legitimate effort to secure the return of the Liberal-Conservative candidate.

H. D. Gordon was the next speaker. The popular leader of the opposition in this Province was loudly cheered on coming forward. He said that as the hour was late he would not detain the audience. He paid a high tribute to Hon. Senator Ferguson, and referred to a letter received by him from the late Sir John A. Macdonald, a few days before his death, in which he stated that Senator Ferguson would yet make his mark as a statesman in this Canada of ours. Mr. Gordon then briefly referred to the commissions appointed by the Laurier Government,—such as the tariff commission, smelling commissions; etc.

Mr. T. E. Morrisey was the last speaker. He gave encouraging accounts from different parts of the county, and predicted the return of Mr. A. C. McDonald by an overwhelming majority.

The meeting closed with cheers for A. C. McDonald, Senator Ferguson, Sir Charles Tupper and the Queen.

The election is a challenge to the people of Canada on many points, but on these in particular:

Do you think that politicians should observe their contracts with the electorate, or is representative government no longer to be tolerated?

Are you in favour of a progressive industrial policy, or do you believe that industry should "lose its pull" at Ottawa?

Do you want to be taxed \$12,500,000 for reckless and boodling schemes, or would you rather be taxed no higher than clean and moderate government calls for and have the balance in your own pocket?

When Britain says let us have a reciprocal trade alliance doing good to both of us, shall our statesmen look into the proposition and try to strike a bargain; or shall they say, in the language of Mr. Fielding, that it is "arrant humbug" and "utterly preposterous"?

Are the finances and the territory of the people to be exploited as they have been in the "deals" of the last four years; or shall we have an honest administration with no boodling?

Is this country to remain British, is it to grow stronger under the flag, or is Mr. Tarte's hope for separation to be endorsed in this period of Imperial progress elsewhere?

There is no mistaking the issues. We must either declare for public honesty, industrial progress, and British union, or we must give in to Messrs. Sifton and Tarte.
