Believes Prohibition Practicable For India

NEW DELHI (AP)—Many Indians are convinced their country can accomplish successful prohibition. Politicians and newspapers, with important exceptions, are backing a prohibition inquiry committee, which has recommended that India achieve total prohibition in stages by April, 1958. Its recommendation probably will be approved with little modification. The committee says prohibition can work in India for these reasons: "The relatively small magnitude of the problem of drink; the general law-abiding nature of the people; the assured support of womenfolk; the resistance of the average family to drinks being served at home; and inhibitory teachings against drink which have prevailed for centuries." Anticipating comparisons with foreign experiments, the committee analyzes reasons for the failure of previous attempts at curtailing drink. Its finds on the United States said:

Addresses Red Cross Council

Thursday, Nov. 10th, was one filled with meetings at Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown. Early in the afternoon, Mrs. E.A. Foster, Provincial Chairman of the Red Cross Women's Work Committee, presided over a meeting of this group which was given the report of last season's accomplishments and an outline of the program for this year. 4,869 mittens and sewn garments, 600 more than the previous year, were shipped recently in thirteen large cases, 6 cases containing 2,061 articles to Lebanon, and 7 containing 2,808 articles to Egypt where they will be distributed through UNRWA to Arab refugees in these countries. These shipments are made on the advice of the League of Red Cross Societies at Geneva which maintains close contact with the needs of different countries.

In addition to the articles shipped overseas the Women's Work Committee has supplied garments for distribution to families involved in local disasters. Mrs. Foster paid tribute to the hundreds of women representing many different groups throughout the province who faithfully carry out this work year after year, and urged that more take part in this effort which results not only in clothing the needy but is an important factor in increasing international understanding and goodwill.

At a meeting of the P. E. I. Divisional Council of the Canadian Red Cross Society held late in the afternoon and chaired by Mr. Edwin C. Johnstone, Provincial President, the highlight was an inspiring report given by James Norton, student of Grade XI of Summerside High School, on his attendance at the Junior Red Cross International Study Centre held this past summer for women's college students in Kingston, Ontario. Two other High School representatives from this province, Maureen Wood of Souris and Ernestine MacDonald of Tignish, also attended this conference at which Miss Marie Bowness, Director of Junior Red Cross for P. E. I. was one of the 27 staff members.

In his interesting account of the proceedings at this Study Centre, James Norton stated that living together at the University with the delegates from ten Canadian Provinces, 22 American States, and representatives from the United Kingdom, E. U. A. D. R. Uruguay, Jamaica, Greece, Japan and Yugoslavia, had made all in attendance realize that they are "World Citizens," all alike in most ways, and had exemplified "international understanding" as no other means possible. The speaker was thanked by the President and by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Lt. Col. L. F. MacDonald suggested that it would be an excellent idea if this address could be given by James Norton to as many High School students in the province as possible.

Effective reports showing outstanding participation in Red Cross services were given by the following chairmen, Mrs. E. A. Foster for Women's Work; Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan for Handicapped Children; Miss Katharine MacLennan for Nursing Services; Mr. J. Gordon MacDonald for Disaster Services; Dr. A. J. Murchison for First Aid Services; and Mr. E. A. Large for Blood Donor Services. Reference was made in several of the reports to the effectiveness of the "Know Your Red Cross" programs which have been held in one centre in each of the three counties recently. These have been spearheaded by three Red Cross Branches in the province, St. John's, "Accident Prevention", Disaster, First Aid, Swimming and Water Safety Services.

In the evening, a meeting called by the Charlottetown Blood Donor Committee, headed by Mr. F. A. S. Jones, was attended by representatives of more than 25 Charlottetown organizations who signified their willingness to assist in securing donors among members and friends, utilizing a new pledge card system, in order to insure an adequate supply of blood for the use of patients in our hospitals.

ST. JOSEPH'S SODALITY The St. Joseph's Sodality and Altarium held their annual meeting on Nov. 6. This meeting took the form of a tea at which the dainty table was presided over by Mrs. Peter Walsh and Mrs. Leo MacNally.

After the opening prayer the minutes of the last regular and executive meetings were read and approved. The president, Miss Ann Walsh, welcomed Rev. Mother St. Mary of St. Joseph's convent, Miss Walsh spoke of the great loss the society had sustained in the deaths of Rev. Sister Anne Resurrection and Sister Margaret Butler. She gave a summary of the work of the different committees.

A nominating committee was appointed to bring in a slate of officers at the next meeting. Rev. Mother Superior gave an interesting talk, too, on the resurrection of the late Mother of the Resurrection and asked all to remember her in their prayers.

A most enjoyable tea hour followed during which time Miss Kay Hughes played many piano selections.

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Operations Of Canadian Farm Loan Board Reviewed

The 26th annual report of the Canadian Farm Loan Board, covering operations for the year ended March 31, 1955 shows that during the year a total of \$9,225,500 was approved for loans. 52.5 per cent was to buy land and pay land-secured debt, 16.5 per cent to buy livestock, farm machinery and to make improvements, 28 per cent to pay debts and three per cent for sundry purposes. The average loan was \$3,835.

At March 31, 1955, the Board held loans on 18,111 farms throughout Canada, for a total of \$40,120,336, the highest figure in the history of the Board.

The statement by provinces of farm loans distributed for the year ended March 31, 1955 show 117 first mortgages for Prince Edward Island amounting to \$321,557.63, and six mortgages, amounting to \$4,700.00, or a total of 123 loans totaling \$326,257.63.

Since the Canadian Farm Loan Board was established in 1929, a total of \$99,758,185.02 has been disbursed by the organization. Of this amount P. E. Island has received in farm loans the sum of \$2,959,502.07.

Farm Loan Board loans are available only to farmers actually farming the land offered as security and are made for such purposes as purchasing livestock and farm implements, etc. Farmers may borrow up to \$10,000 on first mortgage at an interest rate of five per cent repayable over a period of 24 years, or up to \$12,000 on combined first and second mortgages.

Concerning Princess Margaret's decision not to marry Group Captain Townsend, Dean Lloyd said: "The fine and courageous decision made by a much loved Princess was made not as a member of the established Church but as a loyal communicant of the Church of England, in a desire to find the will of God as interpreted by the Church of which she is a devout and practising member."

NEAR BLASPHEMY

He described the present system of appointing Church bishops as "utterly and completely wrong."

"Our constitutional practice is that the sovereign nominates on the advice of the prime minister, who need not be a churchman or even a Christian," the vicar said. "Our prime ministers in the last 40 years included a Welsh Baptist, a Scottish Presbyterian; a Unitarian and now a man who has defied the Church by remarriage after divorce."

COURAGEOUS DECISION

"Surely the answer must be 'no.' Despite all that the Church has done in and for the nation, if it is to inspire the country, convert the country, capture the country for our Lord as He has charged it to do, it must be free from the limitations of state control, the brakes and restraints of establishment."

"This she cannot do herself. Action must be taken by the state to whom, perhaps, the echo of the voice of God comes again saying 'let My people go that they may serve.'"
