## Company Says Strike Preceded By Sabotage

TORONTO (CP)—The International Nickel Co. of Canada Ltd. says in a statement that the dispute leading to a walk-out by 15,000 workers at its 14 establishments in the Sudbury, Ont., area had been preceded by sabotage and a deliberate slowdown.

The statement was contained in a company letter to Inco employees made public Saturday.

It said the work stoppages in the Sudbury area and at Port Colborne, Ont., "have already meant a loss to our employees of more than \$2,000,000 in wages."

"We are certain that only a small handful of people are responsible for the threats and acts of violence," the letter said. This man was told to go to work or go home, and when he went to the surface the others followed.

A group of men at the 2,500-foot level on the same shift reported sick, and with the group from the 3,000-foot level "formed a picket line in violation of our collective bargaining agreement."

"We are certain that only a small handful of people are responsible for the threats and acts of violence," the letter said.

"Inco" sources had said the walkout began July 14 at the Lestack mine when two men were ordered to the surface from the 3,000-foot level after a shift boss refused them permission to eat a sandwich while awaiting work orders. The rest of the day shift walked out, and other shifts followed suit. So did workers at other Inco installations.

The company said in its letter that since June 30 there had been more than 150 incidents of "deliberate property damage and sabotage at the mine."

It said the men responsible "were exposing their fellow workers to great danger and possible death" in their attempts to harass the company and interfere with production.

On July 14, it said, the whole group on the 3,000-foot level walked slowly to the lunch room at the start of the day shift and sat down. They were ordered to go to their work places, but one man refused.

## Fishing Experts Confer With Reds

WASHINGTON (AP)—A six-man U.S. delegation on fishing will confer in Moscow this week with Soviet experts about conserving fish resources off U.S. shores, state department officials said Saturday.

Heading the U.S. team is William C. Harrington, special assistant to the secretary of state for fish and wildlife.

The U.S. government has asked for the talks to deal with the question of Soviet fishing activities off America's Atlantic and Pacific coasts, particularly out of concern over potential damage from Soviet fishing off the West Coast.

State department officials described the meeting as one in which views would be exchanged on how to conserve the fish resources in question, rather than a negotiation looking toward a formal treaty or pact.

## Top Officials Dismissed

BELGRADE (Reuters)—Three top Yugoslav security officials have been dismissed and new men named to replace them, the Yugoslav Communist newspaper Borba says.

In a continuation of widespread purges in the state security service, the parliament of Montenegro, one of Yugoslavia's six constituent republics, dropped two men.

Montenegro's internal affairs minister, Vukobrat Bulatovic, was replaced by Milutin Tanjevic, mayor of a Montenegrin town.

Borba Bulatovic, a high official in the Montenegrin Socialist Alliance, replaced Drago Mijovic as assistant interior minister.

Dimitrije Vidakovic, head of the internal affairs secretariat of the city of Nis in south Serbia, was dismissed Saturday. Dozidar Filipovic, a high official of the Nis municipal assembly, was named acting head of the secretariat.

## Canadian Firm Placing Order

TOKYO (AP)—A Canadian firm is ordering for the first time a ship in Japan that will sail under the Canadian flag, the business newspaper Nihon Keizai says.

Canadian firms have purchased ships from Japanese shipyards in the past but these have been registered under foreign flags.

Nihon Keizai says Upper Lakes Shipping Ltd. of Toronto signed a provisional contract with Ishikawajima Harima heavy industries company of Tokyo for a 24,000-ton coal carrier to be used on the Great Lakes.

The paper says shipbuilding costs are far lower in Japan than in Canada.

## Italians Get Friday Rights

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The bishops of Italy have granted permission for the country's Roman Catholics to eat meat on all Fridays of the year, except during Lent.

The new norm, worked out under the guidance of a papal document of last February, goes into effect Aug. 23.

The Vatican daily L'Osservatore Romano Saturday published the new fast and abstinence rules for Italy.

Pope Paul issued an apostolic constitution Feb. 17 authorizing changes in fasting and abstinence. He set the start of abstinence from meat at age 14, instead of seven. He kept the ages for fasting—taking only one full meal at 21 to 60 years old. He reduced Lenten fast days from 40 to two: Ash Wednesday, which starts Lent, and Good Friday.

Everything the Pope left up to the 53 national and regional conferences of bishops around the world to decide, including whether to keep or do away with the traditional Friday abstinence.

Italy's bishops agreed that on Fridays, excluding the Fridays of Lent, there will be no strict obligation to abstain from meat, leaving the people a freedom of choice for other acts of penance in place of that obligation.

The new rules suggest as substitute forms of Friday penance: giving up foods that are "especially desired or expensive," acts of spiritual or physical charity, reading a section of the gospels, family prayer, giving up movie-going or other entertainment for the day and "a greater commitment in bearing the weight of any difficulties in one's life."

The decision was made after the company submitted an offer to the 6,400-man local.

A joint company-union statement said negotiations will continue while the conciliation officer is being appointed.

Of 39 non-monetary points originally in dispute, seven remain unresolved.

The current contract was signed in February 1965 after nine months of negotiations.

Since negotiations began May 16 on a new contract, 35 meetings have been held.

The union is seeking wage increases, improved pension plan, extended vacations, supplemental unemployment benefits and a company-paid welfare plan including Ontario hospital insurance premiums.

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## Tourist Stalking Is Newest Fad

VANCOUVER (CP)—The latest fad in British Columbia big game hunting is stalking the tourist in his native habitat.

The most sought-after quarry is the greenbacked Californian, king of the highways and the resort hotels. He's the biggest specimen in the tourist bag that could be worth up to \$250,000 to the province this year.

Tourists used just to happen. They turned up for years all by themselves, but lately the government and tourist industry officials have been scrambling to bring in more.

California is the best hunting ground because it "has more people than all of Canada. Gamesters, by and large, have plenty of time and money.

This explains a massive invasion of the state by provincial tourism leaders, who made 117 separate pitches in a five-day period during April.

It is also the reason for the five-man staff at B.C. House in San Francisco, which works to cultivate good relations with 1,000 travel agents in San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Sixty per cent of the U.S. visitors to B.C. last year came from California, roughly 15 per cent of all the province's tourists.

## Former Governor Dies In Hospital

SEATTLE (AP)—Arthur R. Langlie, a former governor of the state of Washington, died in hospital here Sunday after a prolonged illness. He would have been 66 today.

Death was due to a heart ailment, leukemia and complications.

Langlie, the only man ever to serve three terms as governor of the state, returned here last year from New York after eight years as president and then board chairman of the McCall Publishing Co. He had been in failing health since a heart attack in 1961.

A lifelong republican, Langlie was governor from 1940-44 and 1948-56. After completing his third term, he ran for the U.S. Senate against Democratic incumbent Warren G. Magnuson and lost by a large margin.

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
