Fish Plant Expanding In Jude's Point Boom

By EDITH ELDERSHAW TIGNISH — Expansion into the fishing industry is booming at Jude's Point where a freezing and cold storage filleting plant is being erected.

The business of processing lobster and other fish for the Tignish Fisheries began at Jude's Point 40 years ago and since that time the story of the fish industry in Tignish area has been a story of continued success as Tignish Fisheries pioneer the co-operative effort.

The large cold storage room in the new plant is 30 feet by 60 feet with a 10 foot high ceiling, with 8-inch fiber glass insulation on the walls and ceiling.

The floor is covered with 8-inch black cork slipped in hot pitch, on top of this will be a 4 inch concrete floor.

Other parts of the plant contain a freezing room, storage room for fish, ice holding room with an ice maker installed on the roof of the building, a large working room, dry storage room, washrooms, rest room, laboratory, and office.

The exterior of the building is finished in aluminium. A salt fish cold storage plant was put into operation in 1963.

BUILDING FILLED
The building capable of storing more than 500,000 pounds of wet salt fish is at the present time well filled up.

The fish salted at Tignish Run and left in the vats there for 18 days can be placed in the cold storage room for an indefinite period. The fish are taken from the storage room to the factory where they are boned and packaged for shipment.

Two car loads have already been shipped and three more are ready for shipment that go to Toronto, Virginia, Baltimore,

and as far away as the West Indies. Close to 2,000,000 pounds of fish is transported to Jude's Point by truck, over a three-mile stretch, where a road connecting Jude's Point and Tignish

Run, a distance of three hundred yards, would solve the major transportation problem for the fishermen.

Wilson Shea, manager of Tignish Fisheries Co-operative, and the board of directors have been working for such a road for quite some time but without success.

This along with a bridge across Skippers Pond Harbour are two necessary and important steps that must soon come for the fishermen. At present there are 110 people employed with the Tignish Fisheries, both men and women. This is believed to be one of the highest number of employees in this

kind of business on the Island. One million, six hundred thousand pounds of cod has been reported caught so far this fall.

Lemay Escape Report Given

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Coincidence, confusion and collusion all combined to aid in the escape from jail here last month of Georges Lemay of Montreal, wanted in Canada on charges of breaking, entering and theft in connection with a bank robbery, says a special police board.

Lemay, wanted in Canada on a charge of taking part in a Montreal bank robbery that netted at least \$300,000, slipped out of the supposedly escape-proof Dade County Jail Sept. 21 and disappeared with his pretty wife, Lisa.

A police board assigned to investigate the escape recommended Wednesday more careful screening of guards and building modifications to prevent future jail breaks.

Also, the board said confusion wasted valuable time when the escape alarm was first sounded. The board said Lemay was

able to make good his escape by familiarity with the few security officers assigned to his quarters and the ease with which he could communicate with his wife.

Sheriff T. A. Buchanan said shortly after the escape that Lemay had "bought" his way out of jail for a reported price of \$35,000.

Three jail employees were arrested and charged in connection with the escape and two security officers have been dismissed.

A lawsuit was once fought in Newfoundland on the point that the word "fish" meant cod only.

200,000 Voters Said Missing From First List

OTTAWA (CP) — Political observers here are wondering where the voters went.

Preliminary tabulation of voters' lists for the Nov. 8 federal election produce a figure some 200,000 short of the final number expected.

Most observers put it down to political apathy. Some voters just do not care whether they get on the list.

Thus if they are somehow missed by the army of enumerators they are not sufficiently interested to see that their names are added to the list.

On the basis of population growth since the 1963 election, the final voters' list should have at least 10,400,000 names on it.

This is seen as a reasonable expectation. It is some 300,000 short of the estimated total electorate of 10,700,000.

However, the preliminary tabulation totalled only 10,191,825—more than 200,000 fewer than expected. Later revisions will take up some of the slack. But based on past experience, it would come nowhere close to 200,000.

The electorate is thought to comprise about 55 per cent of the population. The preliminary 1965 tabulation puts only about 52 per cent on the lists.

Significantly, four provinces, Manitoba, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, have fewer on the preliminary 1965 list than the final list of 1963.

In the 30-month period between the 1963 and 1965 votes, the average monthly increase in eligible works out to more than 9,000.

This was less than half the monthly increase between the 1962 and 1963 elections. The last vote in particular was regarded as a high-interest election, lending credence to the belief that the 1965 vote is not sparking the same interest.

Student Voting Time Requested

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson has asked Canadian universities to do what they can to give students time off to vote in the Nov. 8 election. The Liberal leader made the request in letters mailed some time ago.

He sought university co-operation in seeing students get off to vote in advance polls and on the regular polling day.

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain has made a £1,000,000 (\$3,000,000) bid to attract a major United Nations body to set up its headquarters in London. The offer, made by the board of trade to the United Nations conference on trade and development Thursday, includes rent-free accommodation worth up to £500,000 (\$1,500,000) a year and a similar sum to prepare accommodation for the body's secretariat.

This 3-suitler is about the size of one of the cases you may take free of charge on your trip. The rule to remember here is that its total outside dimension (combined length, width and height) must not exceed 62".

The second bag must not measure more than 55" in total outside size to earn a free trip. You'll find that most 2-suitlers fall within this size restriction.

Attache and make-up cases typify this third piece of free baggage. Maximum total outside dimensions may not exceed 45" and the case must be placed at the passenger's feet. Handbags, cameras and other small articles may still be carried.

Good news for air travellers! Now the three pieces of baggage each passenger may take on a trip free of charge are not weighed—it's the overall size that counts! This rule applies as well to those rather sizeable accordion-type flight bags and to military-type duffel or dunnage bags which exceed the overall 62" maximum. But, under these circumstances, only one other case (maximum 45" total outside size) will be allowed free and must be placed at the passenger's feet. (Extra and oversize baggage will be assessed a modest charge.) Incidentally, all articles over 80" in total outside dimensions must be shipped as Air Freight. The exceptions to this would be sporting equipment, live animals and containers or the duffel-type bags mentioned previously. One other important point to keep in mind is this: if your final destination is outside North America, your baggage will still be weighed... 44 lbs. Economy... 66 lbs. First Class. Any questions?
