Council Approves 15-Point Program

MONCTON (CP) — A 15-point program which includes liaison work between Trade Boards and Chambers of Commerce was approved Monday at a one-day joint meeting of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade executive council and the Maritime regional committee of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

Other items included in the program outlined involve presentation of trade board policy declarations and resolutions, increased board and chamber membership and industrial development.

Charlottetown was approved as the site of the MPBT's 1967 annual meeting and final preliminary discussions were given plans for this year's meeting to be held in Sydney beginning Wednesday.

The joint meeting also discussed reports of Canadian

Chamber of Commerce policy items which will be presented next month to the prime minister and the federal cabinet.

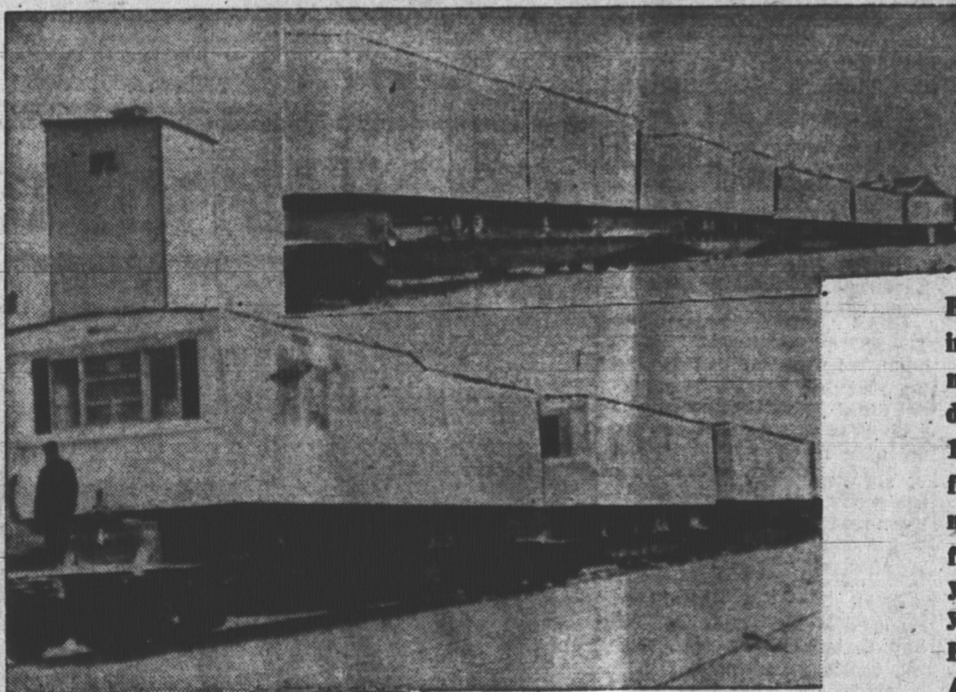
The Citadel is to be erected on the site of the old Baptist Church. Work of demolishing the old church will start about the middle of March.

Premier Promises Gov't Aid To Island Fishermen

Fishermen from Victoria to North Cape who met the provincial cabinet here Tuesday forenoon "will receive every possible assistance from our Government", Premier Walter Shaw told a press conference in his office in mid-afternoon.

The reference is to the fishermen in what is commonly known as "the fall lobster season" — officially it is a part of District No. 8 — and it was disastrously bad for the great majority of the fishermen involved last year.

The Canada government has offered certain assistance but it does not begin to meet the needs of these fishermen, Premier Shaw emphasized.

Some 375 fishing boats are affected. Add to that the stores and other mercantile establishments from which the fishermen normally buy their requirements; add to that again the large number of other people who normally work in the lobster factories and that sort of thing, and the number of people affected mounts rapidly, he explained.

The federal government originally offered what amounts to a maximum assistance of \$190 for a single man and \$200 to a married man with his family. This week they raised that to \$300 for a single man and \$350 for a married man.

for a fisherman with dependents. NOT GOOD ENOUGH. But that's not nearly good enough, the Premier commented. Many of these fishermen did not make their expenses during the season, to say nothing of their living expenses.

The initial outlay is heavy at the start of the season, and these unfortunate fishermen face the problem of getting geared up again when next season rolls around. They must have financial assistance if they are to survive as fishermen, the spokesman emphasized, and Premier Shaw indicated that he and his government are in agreement with that opinion.

We have asked them to organize a committee of two or three men, and Fisheries Minister Leo Rossiter will go with them to Ottawa to assist them in presenting their case as effectively as possible, Premier Shaw explained.

The presentation was made by Dorthee Poirier, president and Adelard Gallant, secretary of the East Prince Fishermen's Association. Both men are from Mont Carmel. Also in the group was Ulrich Poirier, Mont Carmel and Urban LeBlanc, St. Dunstan's Extension Department who is also a representative of United Maritime Fishermen.

PAYING EXPENSES. The Premier said the government would pay the expenses of the delegation to Ottawa. Mr. LeBlanc said last night that his expenses would likely be paid by the UMF. He will be one of the

group making the Ottawa trip. It was indicated. The proffered federal assistance is tied in with unemployment insurance and the possession of a certain number of stamps. But, it was explained, many of the Island fishermen affected will not qualify for this measure of assistance.

Art Lecture For Centre

The problem of originality in Canadian Art will be the topic of an illustrated lecture by J. Barry Lord, to be given at Confederation Art Gallery Lecture Theatre on Thursday, January 20th, at 8.30 p.m.

Mr. Lord, Curator of Art at the Provincial Museum, Saint John, N.B., is already familiar with Charlottetown, having organized and opened the J.M. Barnsley exhibition here in 1965. Graduate of McMaster University, he did post-graduate work at Harvard and in 1960 won the Governor-General's Gold Medal for scholarship. After training with the National Gallery of Canada Council Grant for a study tour of European art museums. Prior to his appointment in the New Brunswick Provincial Museum, Mr. Lord was assistant Curator at the Vancouver Art Gallery. He has numerous publications to his credit.

In selecting the problem of originality in Canadian art, Mr. Lord will discuss how the Canadian artist can achieve and maintain an original statement in a provincial setting. Comparisons will be drawn between Tom Thomson and J.W. Morrice. Artists discussed will include Henry Sandham, Ozias Leduc, Homer Watson, and others.
