The Latrobe, Pa., pro with a record round the first day led throughout the 72-hole event. Until the final day, when he held his own, he increased his lead by the day with his scores of 66-69-67-69. He won by five strokes. The runner-up spot meant \$4,600 to Jay Hebert of Sanford, Fla., who shot a 68 to finish with a 278 total.
Don Fairfield of Casey, Ill., held tenaciously to the third spot, with a 279 total.
Stan Leonard of Vancouver tied for seventh with a total of 281 — three under par to win \$1,675. His rounds were 73-72-67-69.
Al Balding of Toronto closed with 73-71-73-70—287. This gave him a tie for 25th place and \$500. Leonard was not as happy as he should have been. The Vancouver golfer is having tax trouble. He has won a total of \$18,794.51, including Sunday's prize, so far this year. On these earnings he has to pay both U.S. and Canadian taxes.
