GOD SAVE THE QUEEN.

This excellent programme was exceedingly well rendered. The greatest possible credit is due Mr. Watts. His organ selections were all good, showing a grasp of technique but seldom exhibited here. The grand offertoire by Batiste and the variations on Pleyel's hymn—which has such sweet associations to many persons—were perhaps the most fully appreciated by the audience. Mrs. Watts' sympathetic contralto voice had full scope when singing "O Rest in the Lord," Miss Helen Dawson's rendition of her two songs could not but evoke great admiration. Miss Dawson certainly possesses an exceptionally powerful voice of great promise. In her rendering of "Beloved, it is Morn," she was particularly pleasing, and her manner of singing was most artistic. The Rev. Leo Williams chose in "The Coming of the King" a very appropriate song to which he gave fine expression. His reading was, if possible, even more appropriate to the occasion, for by it he portrayed in a very touching way that sad scene in hospital life which Tennyson so graphically described. The chorus was large and fairly well balanced. It showed much precision and power and is, certainly, a great credit to its conductor. We find it hard to say which is the three beautiful choruses was the most enjoyable,—but the Gloria Patri, with orchestral accompaniment, was a capital ending for a programme which from beginning to end was delightfully rendered.

The audience rose and remained standing while the Dead March was played and "The Shadows Yonder" song in memory of the brave lads of this city who gave their lives for Queen and Country.

We congratulate the "Ladies Aid," upon the success of the concert, both musically and financially. The receipts will be in the vicinity of \$200.
