

## ST. LAURENT TO OUTLINE TAX PLAN

### Will Kick Off Meeting Today With Premiers

OTTAWA, (CP)—Provincial premiers are approaching the big federal-provincial tax conference with varying views as to whether the tax rental pacts should be scrapped. They said they have been given no advance inkling of what Prime Minister St. Laurent may propose.  
Mr. St. Laurent kicks off the historic conference in the Commons chamber today with a 10,000-word speech in which he undoubtedly will outline the federal position. He may choose at that time to outline officially for the first time a possible alternative federal-provincial tax-sharing arrangement.  
Jockeying for position in the fight for more cash, the provinces are not too sure just what he'll do. Many have come to Ottawa with prepared texts of what they will say at the conference. But they feared they may have to tear up these speeches and write new ones once they hear the prime minister.

### French Postpone Moscow Visit; Debate U.N. Stand

PARIS (Reuters)—French Sunday night decided to postpone a scheduled visit by Premier Edgar Faure and Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay to Moscow later this month.  
The decision was taken at a five-hour cabinet meeting to consider further action to be taken over the United Nations General Assembly decision to include France's problems in Algeria on its agenda.  
In the 28-50-27 vote before the General Assembly Friday, Russia voted against France to include Algeria on the agenda.

### Dwelling Destroyed By Fire At Mermaid

A disastrous fire early yesterday morning completely destroyed the dwelling of Mr. and Mrs. Leo P. MacIsaac who had only Saturday moved into their newly acquired property at Mermaid. The house, a large dwelling formerly owned by Mrs. A.S. Robertson was one of the country's oldest and most prominent landmarks.  
Mr. and Mrs. MacIsaac and their children had retired for the night when at about 1:30 on Sunday morning they were aware that the house was filled with smoke. The fire, which is reported to have started around the kitchen stove, had made such headway that the efforts of City and Parkdale fire departments were of little avail. A large group of neighbours who quickly gathered on the scene were

able to save a small amount of the household furniture.  
The MacIsaacs previous to moving to Mermaid had resided on Mount Edward Road.

### Athabaskan Goes Aground In Exercise

VANCOUVER (CP)—The destroyer HMCS Athabaskan went aground off smoke-shrouded Spanish Banks here Saturday but exercises Sea Serpent was still a startling demonstration of co-operation and timing as Canada's three services combined for a mock raid on a city beach.

**RECALL DELEGATION**  
In addition Sunday's cabinet session decided to recall provisionally the French permanent delegation to the United Nations.  
French delegates will remain in the UN Security Council and on the disarmament committee.  
The French delegation to the General Assembly walked out after Friday's vote and was called home Saturday. The General Assembly delegation, headed by Pinay, arrived in Paris Sunday, before the cabinet session began.  
Faure said after the meeting that he would see Soviet ambassador Serge Vinogradov today, and a full statement explaining the government's decision would be issued later.  
Government sources said a meeting between Faure and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer due to be held this week would also be postponed.

### Call U.S. Polio Vaccine Program "Encouraging"

WASHINGTON (AP)—The department of welfare said Saturday, in the first official report of such scope, that preliminary reports from the country-wide Salk polio vaccine program "are very encouraging."  
The announcement, by secretary Marion B. Folsom, said:  
"Preliminary data, now being compiled, show that the incidence of polio among about seven million vaccinated children, most of whom have received only one injection, is running roughly 25 to 50 per cent below the rate among non-vaccinated children in the same age groups."  
"These preliminary reports are very encouraging," Mrs. Folsom said, and more information is expected soon.

**MOTION PICTURE PIONEER DIES**

RIO DE JANEIRO, (AP)—Brazilians whose major task will be a campaign to bring the nation out of its dizzy inflation spiral.  
Four candidates seek election for a five-year term starting next Jan. 31. The winner will have a number of tough problems on his hands, in addition to the deep unrest inflation is causing as living costs continue to soar.  
One task will be to expand food and industrial output to meet the needs of a growing population—now 35,000,000. Another problem all the candidates have promised to tackle is that of bolstering and expanding the weak transport system. Many inland areas are not linked except by air. Thus production is held up because there is no way to get goods distributed adequately.

### 20 Aircraft Search For DEW Line Supply Plane

EDMONTON (CP)—The RCAF sent "weekend" fliers of its auxiliary force into the north Sunday to help hunt for a four-engine civilian aircraft with two men aboard missing since Thursday.  
Three twin-engine Mitchell bombers of the 418 City of Edmonton auxiliary squadron took off to search an area around Buffalo lake, south of Great Slave lake and just north of the Alberta boundary in the Northwest Territories.  
About 20 RCAF and civilian aircraft searched for the York aircraft, owned by Associated Airways Ltd. of Edmonton, which disappeared while flying back to Yellowknife, N.W.T., after a trip into the Arctic with supplies for the DEW (Distant Early Warning) radar line.  
Those aboard were Capt. Joseph Cermak, 40, whose family lives in Northern Ireland, and first officer Gerhard (Gerry) Lozie, 27, former Dutch Navy pilot.

LONDON (AP)—A dark-haired young man played a breathless game of hide and seek with police Sunday on the spidery scaffolding of Big Ben tower 320 feet above Parliament Square.

### Predicts Russia Will Accept Eisenhower Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—Health Minister Paul Martin of Canada predicted Sunday night that Russia will accept President Eisenhower's plan for mutual air reconnaissance and exchange of military blueprints within three months.  
"I would be inclined to think we ought to look for acceptance of the proposal rather than its rejection in the months ahead," said Canada's chief UN delegate in an interview.  
Asked to be more specific on the time element, Martin predicted that Russia will accept the plan before the end of December.

### Granddaughter Of Prime Minister Wed At Quebec

QUEBEC (CP)—Louise Samson, vivacious 21-year-old granddaughter of Prime Minister St. Laurent, was married Saturday to a young Quebec lawyer while some 30 policemen tried to keep crowds of curiosity-seekers in order.  
Following the wedding a reception in the swank Cercle Universitaire police ejected a newspaper woman who reportedly entered without authorization.  
Prime Minister St. Laurent, still wearing a small cast on an injured ankle, and Mrs. St. Laurent, were among the 150 formally-attired guests who attended Louise's marriage to 25-year-old Yvan Mignault.  
The wedding was held in the Samson's family parish church of Notre Dame du Chemin in Upper-town Quebec.  
The altar was decorated with white pompons and white gladioli and the aisles and sanctuary were dotted with standards of gladioli and palms. Louise was given away by her father, Dr. Mathieu Samson, a prominent Quebec medical doctor.  
Father Georges-Henri Levesque, former dean of the faculty of social science at Laval University and now superior of a Dominican order monastery, officiated at the ceremony.

### Ferry Princess Helene To Remain In Port

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—While the Seafarers' International Union claimed a lockout, the Canadian Pacific Railway said Sunday its Bay of Fundy service would not be operated until further notice and the ferry Princess Helene would not sail Monday for Digby, N.S.  
The Helene ordinarily sails daily except Sunday. Trips were made last Monday, Tuesday and Friday, after postponement of strike action. The Wednesday and Saturday sailings were cancelled.  
On Thursday the union set Friday midnight as the next deadline. A spokesman Sunday, however, contended the men were not on strike but had been locked out.  
A company representative said the crew members—between 40 and 45—were signed off at 4 p.m. Saturday in accordance with shipping regulations.  
He said no official notification had been received from the union that the men wished to return to work. The company has specified that 24 hours notice would be necessary to permit resumption of service.

### Peron Flies To Paraguay

BUENOS AIRES, (Reuters) — Ex-president Juan Peron, whose regime was overthrown last month left here by flying boat Sunday for exile in the neighboring South American republic of Paraguay.  
The 59-year-old Peron had been living on a Paraguayan gunboat where he sought refuge when his government was ousted Sept. 19 after an armed force revolt.  
Since then Paraguayan officials and those of the new Argentinian government headed by Gen. Eduardo Lonardi have been discussing his fate.
