Militia Officers Win Top Awards As Rifle Shoot Ends

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—Militia officers from Toronto and Lennoxville, Que., won the top awards of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association's 73rd annual match which ended Saturday.

Lieut. Gilmore S. Boa, 31-year-old Toronto civil engineer won the Governor-General's Gold Medal for the top award of the match. He shot 195 of a possible 200 points.

Saturday a 25-mile-an-hour wind blew through the match and a heavy rain fell through most of the day.

The retiring army chief of staff, Gen. G. G. Sim presented the award to Boa.

Boa's 75-year-old Alec Parnell of Montreal, veteran of several wars, was named runner-up by only one point to win the Governor-General's Silver Medal.

At the two-thirds mark, Parnell led the field with 124 of a possible 150 points, but dropped five points at the 900-yard range to finish behind Boa.

Warner, winner of the new service rifle championship, is a 2nd lieutenant in the Sherbrooke, Que., regiment. A member of Canada's 1953 Bisley team, he shoots in pistol and .22 calibre as well as service rifle competitions, and was with Canada's 1952 Olympic team in Finland and at the Norwegian world championships meet that year.

The new prize was based on total points in Bisley aggregate matches plus three service rifle matches not counted in the Bisley total.
