## Conference Discusses Auxiliaries, Fund Raising

What an auxiliary or volunteer group can do for your association. What it can do for an institution. These were topics for discussion at an afternoon session of the Canadian Association for Retarded Children yesterday.

Reports of three branches were read and delegates were given an insight into the organization, aims and functions of these important groups. Acting as moderator for the session was Mrs. L.G. Stuart, Montreal.

The practical and human side in meeting the needs and assisting the work of the association was stressed by speakers. The auxiliaries formulate their own policies independently, and the size and scope of their activities vary.

A cross section of the work and help provided by these women's groups shows a wide field of interest. This field provides for fund raising, hostessing, camp assistance, donations, toy projects and entertainment. In addition assistance is given in rehabilitation, training and transportation.

"Our aim," said a speaker, "is to complement the work of the association, fostering its growth and development in ways particularly suited to our time and talents. Many of the items in which we assist are vital, but low on the priority list, budget-wise."

The speakers included, Mrs. A. J. Salloum, past president Metro-Toronto Association Women's Auxiliary; Mrs. Warren Horn, Montreal, president Women's Auxiliary of the Montreal Branch of the Quebec association; and Mrs. H.F. Frank, member of Ladies Volunteer Group of Smith Falls, Ont.

Warren Clayton, executive director, Metropolitan-Toronto Association for Retarded Children conducted the Publicity and Fund Raising Workshop at the afternoon session.

Harry E. Foster, Toronto, outlined the success of the campaign last year in Ontario, pointing out the necessity of organizing as was done there where 16 associations combined to increase the giving by over 300 per cent in excess of the previous year. The effort was conducted entirely by non-professional operatives.

He assured the members that such a plan would prove a similar success throughout the whole of Canada.

"The secret of success is organization," Mr. Foster said, and went on to deal with the goals, which are to show that the problem of mental retardation is the problem of every citizen; to demonstrate to the public that retarded children can be helped; to alert parents of retarded children to the value of Retarded Children's Association work; to prove that the Retarded Children's Association is composed of responsible citizens and that its work is based on sound principles.

Local financial campaigns should give the public an opportunity to participate in the work of the associations; to bring needed services within the reach

## Leo Durocher Quits TV Job For Baseball

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Leo Durocher Thursday quit his \$65,000-a-year job with NBC-TV to return to baseball as a manager, possibly with Cleveland Indians.

Durocher, reached as he was about to board a jetliner for Pittsburgh, was reluctant to discuss a report that he was going back to the game where he piloted Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants to championship years.

"Yes, it's true that I have notified NBC that I was not re-signing my contract which expires Oct. 1 but I have never told anyone that I was going back to baseball. I guess they were all right in assuming that."

"But I can't say anything because I'm in the midst of negotiation."

A reporter pressed him: "Is it baseball?"

"Yes," answered Durocher, "it's baseball."

"Is it the Cleveland Indians?" asked the reporter.

"I can't say anything about that," he answered.

## Red China Brass Reported Fired

PEKING (Reuters) — Communist China Thursday dismissed Defence Minister Marshal Peng Teh-huai and Huang Ke-cheng, chief of the general staff, in a cabinet shakeup approved by the standing committee of Parliament.

Marshal Lin Biao was appointed defence minister.

An amnesty for certain war criminals, counter-revolutionaries and other prisoners "reformed through labor" was announced at the same time in celebration of the 10th anniversary of the Communists' victory on the mainland.

The dismissals took most foreign observers by surprise. There had been no surface signs of trouble in the army, or dissension over military policies, observers said.

## UK Campaign Is Launched

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain's election campaign opens officially today with the dissolution of Parliament.

Voting day is Oct. 8 and public opinion polls point to a return of the Conservative government.

The Queen, vacationing in Scotland and expecting a baby, will not attend Parliament's formal ceremonies, but she will be in London for various duties connected with the dissolution.

The royal speech will be read on her behalf by a royal commissioner of peers headed by Viscount Kilmuir, lord chancellor of the House of Lords.

A proclamation to be issued by the Queen today will give constitutional effect to the dissolution, which by law must take place three weeks — actually 17 days excluding Sundays — before polling.

The parties have until Sept. 28 to complete their nomination of candidates, expected to total about 1,500 for the 630 seats in the House of Commons.

The standing in the House at dissolution: Conservatives 338, Labor 272, Liberal 6, Unionist 1, Independent 1, Vacant 6, total 630.

## Body Of Second Man is Found Off Rosebank

The body of George Francis Murphy, 31-year-old native of Iona, Queens County, was found in Charlottetown Harbor off Rosebank shore early yesterday afternoon by Constable C. Craig and P. Mailman of the Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP.

A cousin of Alphonse McIsaac, also of Iona whose body was found floating in the harbor Wednesday evening, Murphy was presumed to be the driver of a 1955 Studebaker discovered submerged Thursday near the head of Prince Street wharf.

Murphy and McIsaac, 49, were last seen Friday evening at about 6:30 p.m. At that time they were both in the car and heading towards Charlottetown. Neither of the men had been reported missing as acquaintances all presumed they had either remained in Charlottetown or proceeded home.

Following the discovery of McIsaac's body about 4:30 Wednesday, police began a search for his companion. The car was found by a diver yesterday morning and removed from the harbor bottom.

Murphy is survived by his father, Francis Murphy, four brothers: Andrew, with the department of transport, Goshen, N. S.; Leo, Toronto; Gerald, Whitehorse, Yukon; Leonard, Dawson City, Yukon; and one sister, Sister St. Francis David, C.N.D., Charlottetown.

He was predeceased by his mother in 1952 and one brother, Joseph, who died in 1957.

Coroner Dr. Clarence Coady said last night that holding an inquest would depend on the result of a post-mortem examination scheduled to be carried out today.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — World light heavyweight champion Archie Moore stepped into a new role Thursday—that of a movie actor.

Studio boss Sol C. Siegel of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer announced that ageless Archie, one of boxing's greatest figures, will make his screen debut in a starring role in The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn.

The part will be no brief walk-in for Moore. He'll play the role of Jim, a runaway slave and bosom buddy of Mark Twain's immortal Huck.

Director Michael Curtiz handled Moore's screen test for the part Wednesday. He termed the test "remarkable," and producer Samuel Goldwyn Jr., called Archie "outstanding."

From his home in San Diego, Moore expressed elation. He has been angling for the role for some time.

 said Russia has tried unsuccessfully to win state department approval to more such exchanges and added:  
 "But the state department is hindering this. Do you want them to revert back to the status of the Iron Curtain?"

**DENY STATEMENT**  
 The state department denied it is trying to cut the exchange program. Said the department press officer, Lincoln White: "The United States wants to expand the exchange program with the Russians."

In contrast with the Russian's gay mood, Lodge and Wagner spoke in a solemn way of American hopes for peace.

Wagner said that in the U.S. "the people are the boss" and he referred to \$11,000,000,000 worth of lend-lease sent to Russia during the Second World War.

Lodge, who is U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, said "I hope you will forgive me, but you, sir, (Khrushchev) have awakened us and made us more conscious of the great ideals on which our country rests, and we sincerely appreciate that."

**MR. K'S ADDRESS**  
 Khrushchev, when his turn came to speak, noted that he had applauded both Wagner and Lodge. Then, smiling, he added: "I would like to introduce some clarity into the matter, otherwise you might think Khrushchev is being converted to the capitalist faith."

"Both Mr. Lodge and Mr. Wagner spoke in defence of your system."

"The question is who am I, then? Is it that I am a man who when I appear before Communists, I applaud Communists, and when I am among American capitalists, I applaud them? People might think this is no politician, this is a weather vane."

With such quips the visitor won applause at the luncheon, but outside the Commodore Hotel where it was held there was grim evidence of hatred of the Russian system.

One anti-Communist organization handed passersby leaflets picturing a bloody hand and stating, "Nikita Khrushchev, thou bloodstained tyrant." A sky-writing aircraft marked a cross in the cloudless sky. This was a repeat of a Washington performance arranged by Christianiform, an anti-Communist group. A knot of people broke into a chant: "Khrushchev is a murderer."
