Upon graduation from P.W.C. Russ joined the R.C.A.F., and completed his training in navigation at Summerside, P.E.I. receiving his wings and commission as Flying Officer in 1951.

He was married in Comox, B.C. in 1954 to the former Rosemary Burns, R.N., of Markham, Ontario.

His career in the R.C.A.F. was one which he enjoyed and in which he excelled. It was marked with promotions and ever increasing responsibility.

In 1957 he graduated as Observer-Air Interceptor from No. 2 Air Observer School in Winnipeg. Later he was selected for training in electronic warfare with the United States Air Force.

After serving with squadrons of the Maritime Air Command in Nova Scotia and British Columbia, he was appointed as instructor of Navigation at Winnipeg, Man. He was promoted to Flight Lieutenant in July 1958.

At the time of his death he was on exchange to the Royal Air Force. He was killed Tuesday, May 3rd at Watton, Norfolk in England when the Canberra jet bomber he was navigating, crashed on its approach to the air base.

Today's 212 stores extend from Halifax to Victoria and business volume in 1965 reached \$4,500,000.

"By the end of this year we expect to have 219 stores, with an eventual rise to 250 by 1970 and an annual volume of around \$50,000,000," said Mr. Reitman.

Ore Shipment Will Be Cut TORONTO (CP) The country-wide railway strike which started today will cut ore shipments from Canadian mines to the United States, mining companies report.

The extent to which deliveries will be curtailed isn't known but more than 60 per cent of Canada's \$3,000,000,000 mining output is exported. A long strike could close mines because of lack of shipping space for ore.

A spokesman for International Nickel Co. of Canada Ltd., the world's largest nickel producer and Canada's largest copper producer, said there "are bound to be some delays."

Inco, which has about 10 mines in the Sudbury area of Northern Ontario, has its own train to its smelter and trucks can transport material from the smelter to the refinery.

Inco said, however, that if the strike goes for more than a week miners will be laid off.

Hudson Bay, a copper producer in Manitoba, said its mining operations would be limited to its stockpiling capacity.

Falconbridge, Canada's second largest nickel producer, said that a long strike would "seriously impede operations."

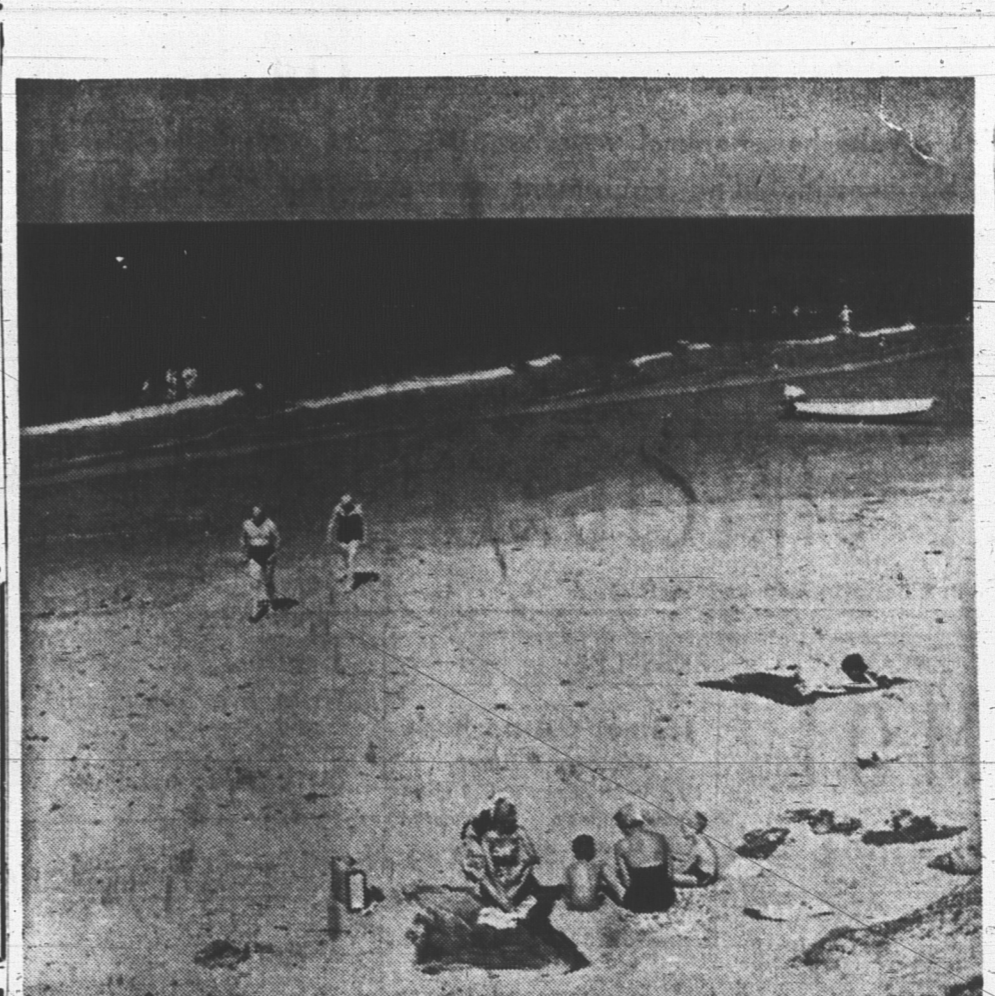
