**Georgetown School Closing Is New Type**

Georgetown School closing ceremonies were held Friday afternoon for the nine grades in Georgetown High School. This year, for the first time, the closing ceremonies were held in the school in each grade's room, rather than in the gymnasium which was traditional for many years.

Parents attended the various rooms, particularly those in which they had children attending to witness the presentation of certificates and prizes.

On Thursday evening the various rooms held their school closing parties, which varied to some extent but mainly consisted of treats, games, contests and dancing. It was felt that this type of school closing will continue to be carried out in the future, rather than the time honored method of gathering all the pupils in the gymnasium for the hour, to sit through a long program of certificate and prize presentations and many times a series of speeches. This new method is believed here to stay, as it has been termed more efficient, less tiring on the pupils and teachers and less costly for the parents than the full dress parade of former years.

**West Royalty Man Fined \$20**

Gerald Glen Ford of West Royalty was fined \$20 and costs for driving without due care and attention when he appeared in city police court Saturday.

Magistrate A. H. Haslam, QC, set bail at \$130 in the case of Arthur George Fleischer, charged with impaired driving and remanded to today to obtain counsel.

Bernard Murphy, Charlottetown, charged with littering the streets, was given a severe reprimand and a \$10 fine.

One man charged with unlawful possession of liquor was fined \$20 and three others appeared on charges of being drunk and incapable. One was fined \$20; the second \$10 and the third given a 20-day suspended sentence on his first offence.

Linus Alcorn, Rocky Point, charged with failing to stop at the scene of an accident, was further remanded to the same date on the charge of failing to yield at a yield sign. A fourth man previously charged with being drunk and incapable and remanded from the 21st was further remanded to July 3.

**Rare Wollen Cloth From Tryon Donated To Centre Art Gallery**

A rare woolen cloth, 56 x 34 inches, a part of the Island's history, has been donated to the Confederation Centre Art Gallery by Mrs. Eleanor Stevenson, a resident of the Livingstone and MacArthur Nursing Home in Charlottetown.

It came in the form of rare woolen cloth, the product of the Tryon Woolen Mills, an old Island company (1856-1920) that made some of the finest tweeds in the world.

Mrs. Stevenson's donation is thought to be the only remaining piece of the cloth that isn't made up into suits or blankets. It is rather coarse material in a beautiful blend of browns and greens, designed by Alexander Dauber, Tryon, whose daughter, Mrs. Bessie Rogerson, now lives in that community. It was woven about 1900.

Gallery curator Moncrieff Williamson said the wool will be displayed this summer in a glass case along with several other textile donations, and will eventually be transferred to the craft museum when it is established.

The gallery appreciates the donation not only for its value as a museum piece, but because it was such a treasured possession of its owner, Mr. Williamson said.

Biggest and most colorful of the lot is a 108" x 146" rug, hand-hooked by Mrs. F. Brennan, Summerside, from a freehand birds-and-flowers design by Joe Smith. Begun in 1936, it combines a background of soft green with bright pattern colors of vegetable-dyed Island wool. The rug, a magnificent handicraft, was the gift of Mrs. Constance Holman of Summerside.

**Electrical Plans Go Ahead Given**

SUMMERSIDE — At a special meeting of the town council Saturday morning two resolutions were passed concerning the electric light company.

It was resolved that tenders be called for repairs to the old section of the roof of the electric light plant. The present tar and gravel is to be removed and replaced with a cold roof process of 5-16 inch plywood.

The superintendent of the local plant, Tom Richardson stated that water has been dripping on the generators during storms.

The second resolution concerned the re-building of 4,700 feet of lines as follows: Euston Street — from Harvard to Hanover; Fitzroy Street — from Euston to Spring; Spring Street — from Winter Street to Canadian National Railways; Central Street — from Notre-Dame to Second Street; Winter Street — from Granville to Spring.

The construction is to be such as to have poles with a pacer aerial cable inside the sidewalks to permit snow removal. The approximate cost of construction is \$20,000.

The reason for the construction is that many of the Summerside lines are quite old and the voltages are dropping.

For the purpose of correcting low voltage and increasing top capacity it was decided to purchase a 450 KVAR capacitor bank and to install on the Hillcrest circuit.

Mr. Richardson said the new lines will be similar to the ones on Water Street East and will be strong enough to stand sleet storms as well as ideal for going through trees. He also said the labor would be done by the electric light company crew.

Acting mayor George Key presided. Councillors Frances Grant Molison and J.E. Morrison were present.

**OWNED BY FATHER**

Mrs. Stevenson has a close connection with the old mill. Her father, John Dawson Reid, owned it from 1873 until his death in 1903. During that time, cloth from the mill won a diploma and commemorative medal at the Great Colonial Exhibition in London and a gold medal in a Paris exhibition around 1900.

The mill, destroyed by fire in 1920, was founded in 1836 by Charles E. Stanfield, grandfather of Nova Scotia's premier. Stanfield married Phyllis Dawson, sister of Mrs. Stevenson's grandmother, Charlotte Dawson.

Charles Dawson's brother, Samuel Edward Dawson, bought the mill from Stanfield in 1867 and her sons, John Dawson Reid and James E. Reid took over the business about 1873.

**AUSTRALIA AND P.E.I.**

This province was much stronger on sheep raising in those days than it is now, and the mill (incorporated in 1881 as the Tryon Woolen Mill Manufacturing Company Ltd.) bought most of its wool from Island farmers.

The finer wools were imported from Australia and the Cape of Good Hope, however, and some New Brunswick wool was used.

Equipment included a number of looms, each capable of producing about 45 yards of fabric per day, and three dyeing vats that could handle 200, 300 and 500 pounds of wool at a time.

**WARTIME USE**

In 1905 the mill closed, but reopened 10 years later under the name Reid and Rayner as a knitting mill to make underwear for the troops of World War I. The mill burned in 1920 and was not rebuilt.

A clipping from a 1902 Guardian includes several testimonies to the excellence of Tryon wool. A Maine tailor who bought most of his goods from the Island mill said he had found none better anywhere else in the world. And another authority claimed the Tryon name was "a guaran-
