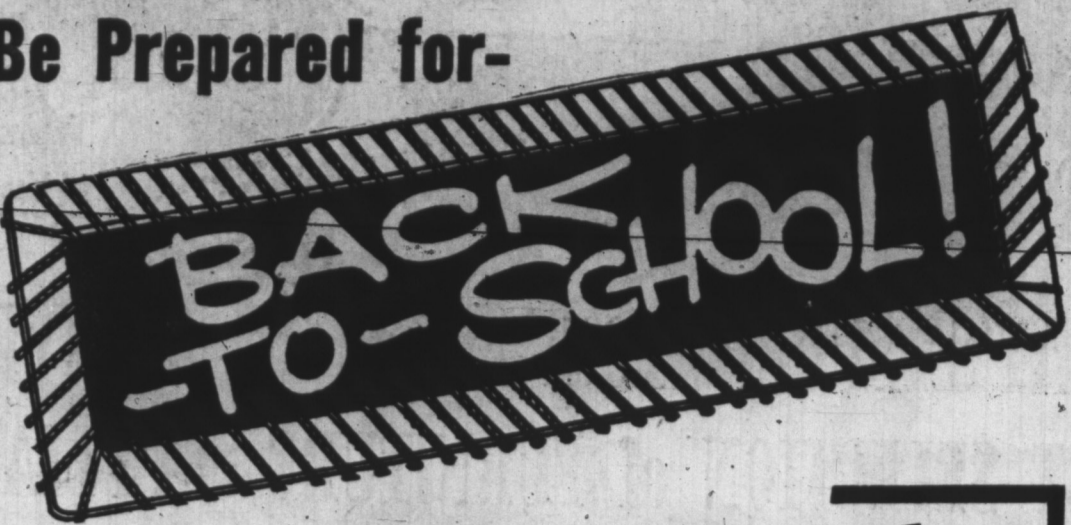
WEEKLY WAGES DECLINE

tics reported Tuesday. Average weekly wages dipped to \$70.71 from \$70.90 the previous month as the average work week fell to 41 hours from 41.1.

CANBERRA, Australia (Reuters) — Prime Minister Robert Menzies was asked Tuesday if he would submit himself to a "crocodile test" to prove his good intentions. Opposition Labor member Edward Ward told the prime minister that a candidate in the recent Malayan elections had bathed in a stream in the belief that good people went unharmed while bad people were eaten by crocodiles. "Is the prime minister agreeable to my proposal that he submit himself to the crocodile test?" Ward asked. Menzies said he would give the question his most "earnest consideration." He suggested that Ward could go into the stream with complete safety as the "crocodiles would run away."

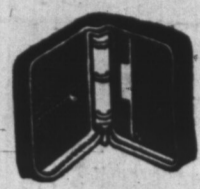

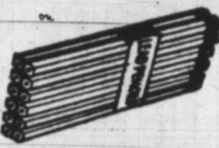

Court Orders Transfusion

SUDBURY, Ont. (CP) — A four-day-old baby girl has been given a blood transfusion after an emergency court hearing in Sudbury Memorial Hospital took her from her Jehovah's Witness parents and made her a charge of the Children's Aid Society. The hearing took place after Gordon and Hilda McNally refused permission for a transfusion for their daughter Catherine. The child, born in the hospital late Thursday while the Bridgeville, Ont., couple were on their holidays in the Sudbury area, was premature and suffering from severe jaundice, a condition similar to that caused by the Rh factor in premature births. Pediatrician Dr. Nick Jaco told the parents that a transfusion was necessary at once to change the baby's blood type. Both parents refused on grounds that the religion of the Jehovah's Witnesses forbids blood transfusions.
