WAR NOT ENDED SAYS KRUGER

The Real Struggle Will Now Begin.

Enquiries as to the Colonials' Home Coming—
Kruger's Government on Wheels—Little Apparently Thought of Boer Threats.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

KRUGER AND REITZ.

LONDON, June 8.—A correspondent of the Express interviewed President Kruger, who says: "The occupation of Pretoria does not mean the end of the war."

"The Burghers are fully determined to fight to the last. They will never surrender so long as five hundred armed men remain in the country."

"I feel deeply encouraged by the fine work Steyn and Dewet are doing in the Free State."

State Secretary Reitz remarked yesterday: "Depend upon it the war is not over. Guerilla warfare will continue over an enormous area."

"We intend to fight to the bitter end and shall probably retire upon Lydenburg, where we can hold out for many months."

"Yes," observed Kruger, "it is only now that the real struggle has begun. I fear that there will be still much more bloodshed. But the fault is that of the British government."

Then, raising his voice to an almost passionate height, Kruger exclaimed:

"The time has passed for us to talk. We have done plenty of that; but it has done us no good."

"There is now nothing to do but to keep on fighting,—to keep on fighting."

A GOVERNMENT ON WHEELS.

LONDON, June 8.—Executive officers of the Transvaal Government are in a railway car which is shunted on a switch at Marchadorp station.

President Kruger caused the interior of coach to be reconstructed some time ago, with a view to the contingencies that have now arisen.

PROSPECTIVE.

LONDON, June 8.—Already representations are being made to the War Office to secure permission for the Colonial troops now in South Africa to return home via London and take part in Lord Roberts' triumphs, marching through the capital of the Empire.

The War Office states that nothing has yet been settled concerning the question.

A Leader Who is Not a Leader.

OTTAWA, June 8.—The House of Commons has adopted an address congratulating the Queen on the approaching termination of the war in South Africa.

After a violent anti-British harangue by Mr. Bourassa the Hon. Dr. Montague said:

"I think the best answer to that is to give three cheers for the Queen."

The members sprang to their feet with the exception of Fielding, Fisher, Fitzpatrick and two or three others, and cheers were given with great energy.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier sat down as soon as he rose.

But those on their feet sang "God Save the Queen" before they took their seats.

PROHIBITION IN MANITOBA

Premier Macdonald Interviewed Respecting the Bill.

WINNIPEG, June 7.—When questioned on the subject yesterday, Premier Macdonald said that the prohibition bill would pass its third reading this session, and would be at once submitted to the Privy Council for decision. If that body ruled that the Act was unconstitutional, it would be repealed at the next session of Parliament, which will be held in January or early in February next.

STREET LIGHTING.

Six.—Some two months ago the City Council moved in the matter of calling for tenders for lighting the city, the present contract expiring in December. Since this primary move on the part of our city fathers the citizens have heard no mention in the Council of street lighting. Surely we are not to presume that a former act of a former city council is to be repeated, and that the present holders of the contract will secure without competition a renewal of their lease. The plan by which the city of Charlottetown is lighted in long obsolete and completely out of date, and the citizens should see to it that the street lighting of our city is made a matter of competition, whereby other concerns beside the Royal Electric of Montreal will be at least given a chance to compete. We have enough scandal in P. E. Island. Don't let us add another and give an exhibition of a City Council bound hand and foot, and at the mercy of a company like the Royal Electric.

Sworn to Fight it Out.

LONDON, June 7.—The Lourenzo Marques correspondent of the Times, telegraphing June 5, says:

"According to refugees from Pretoria, thousands of burghers, under Gen. Botha, have taken an oath to continue the struggle to the bitter end."

"U. S. Consul Hollis started for the Transvaal today. The nature of his mission is not made public."

THE TROUBLE IN CHINA.

A BRITISH FORCE LANDED.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, June 8.—A special despatch from Shanghai says: "The Dowager Empress has ordered General Neih Si Chong with 3,000 men, to protect the railway at Peking."

A severe fight, it is added, has occurred with the Boxers, whose ranks include many soldiers of other generals' commands. When the battle ended two hundred dead were left on the field.

The despatch goes on to say: "One hundred and eighty British marines with a machine gun are about to force a passage from Tien Tsin to Peking."

"Altogether, about 900 British marines have been landed from the fleet, a greater number than have been landed from the combined vessels of the other Powers."

"This evidence of Great Britain's intention to assert her position strongly, gives great satisfaction here."
