MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS

Dread Crippling Disease Affects Hundred Yearly

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles concerning organizations taking part in the province-wide United Fund campaign.)

Young adults are the victims of multiple sclerosis, a disease that attacks the central nervous system. Paralysis and invalidism are the results. The cause and cure are unknown.

One of the 17 agencies in the United Fund, the P.E.I. chapter of the Multiple Sclerosis Society of Canada, has as its main purpose the providing of support to the national organization. It also conducts medical research into the cause and control of this disease, which is responsible for the crippling of at least 25,000 Canadians and an estimated 100 persons on Prince Edward Island.

SECONDARY AIMS
 Secondary purposes are the education of the public in the social problems of multiple sclerosis and patient welfare in which the chapter provided patient aid free of charge in the form of wheel chairs, hospital beds, necessary sickroom supplies or assistance in transportation to treatment centres.

The P.E.I. chapter has budgeted for \$7,000 in the United Appeal.

Since its formation in 1956 it has directed its efforts toward a much needed education of the public. The chapter operates on volunteer service. Many of the active workers are MS patients who, despite their affliction, give of their services. Their courage in the driving force behind these members who are healthy and well.

No strings are attached to patient services. Wheel chairs, walkers, and all other forms of patient aid are provided without obligation. The only requirement is a recommendation from the patient's doctor.

 The chapter plans to expand the present services, especially with respect to physiotherapy. With a view to improving the outlook of patients through one another and with the chapter, there is a plan to begin a Patients' Bureau and arrange for various outings during the summer. A total of 88 patients are registered with the chapter here.

Multiple sclerosis has been found to be a 'cold climate' disease, and cripples more Canadians than polo ever did. For over 20 years it has plagued society, but very little was done about it until the last decade.

The disease is not contagious nor hereditary. It is more prevalent than polio and more serious in its effects. The person who has it, however, cannot look to the relief of an early death, for the life span of the victim is about the same as any advanced person.

Patients in a young stage cannot be rehabilitated until they have been rehabilitated medically—until a cure or some other means is found.

It is most important that the association continue to support research into the cause and control of the disease so that children of today and the generations to come will have at least some ray of hope if they must bear the words "You have multiple sclerosis."

Saturday's High Winds Slow Ferry Operations

Officials of both ferry services between Prince Edward Island and the mainland, last night reported that the heavy winds experienced Saturday caused a partial disruption of service.

On the Borden-Cape Tormentine run, the MV Abegweit managed to complete all five round trips, but the MV Confederation only completed their scheduled runs Saturday forenoon and one one-half trips in the afternoon.

Reports indicated that the heavy seas churned up by the high winds, gave the Confederation a rough toasting around and the winds made docking very difficult.

Capt. Claud Hunter, president of Northumberland Ferries Ltd., reported that both the Lord Selkirk and the Charles A. Dunning, were able to make their scheduled runs Saturday forenoon, between Wood Islands and Carleton Place.

Around noon Saturday, the winds increased causing high seas, which made it necessary to cancel all afternoon crossings. Both companies reported that on Sunday all ferries were running back on schedule and all crossings were made.

Storm Delays Gear Hauling By Fishermen

SUMMERSIDE — Fisheries Officer Norman MacLeod, Summerside, said last night that it was difficult to ascertain just how much storm damage, if any was incurred, because the lobstermen had only Saturday to work on their hauling operations since the season closed Friday night.

There weren't too many traps out as it was anyway, "he pointed out," the two-day extension came very late and many fishermen already had about 90 per cent of their gear ashore. In view of this fact, I don't think damage will be too great. Mr. MacLeod said that some lobstermen reported their traps were roused up and damaged to a point where it was unprofitable to repair them.

He estimated that the western shore would have suffered more serious damage, where the winds came directly off the water.
