The former British prime minister sent a message to the Inter-parliamentary Union, which will open a conference in London Sept. 12. It was released by Geneva headquarters.

"I rejoice that at this meeting the Interparliamentary Union is stronger than ever before, particularly that it now contains representatives of the parliaments of many nations which have recently achieved independence, as well as newcomers from

### New Legion President Has Long Service With Veterans

The newly elected President of the Canadian Legion Provincial Command in this office is a wide experience in veterans' problems. Captain Andrew C. MacEachern, M.C. of North River was on the executive of the Great War Veterans' Association following World War One. He held the office of second vice-president in that organization.

Following World War Two he was for five years president of the Kingston Branch and from 1956-1957 he was zone commander for Queens County. Comrade MacEachern first enlisted with the 50th Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery from Calgary. He gained his commission on the field of battle and later at Vimy Ridge in 1917 won the Military Cross.

When the Veterans' Guard of Canada was being formed during World War Two, Captain MacEachern again volunteered for service as an officer with 18th Company V.C.C. and later became second in command of No. 10 Company. 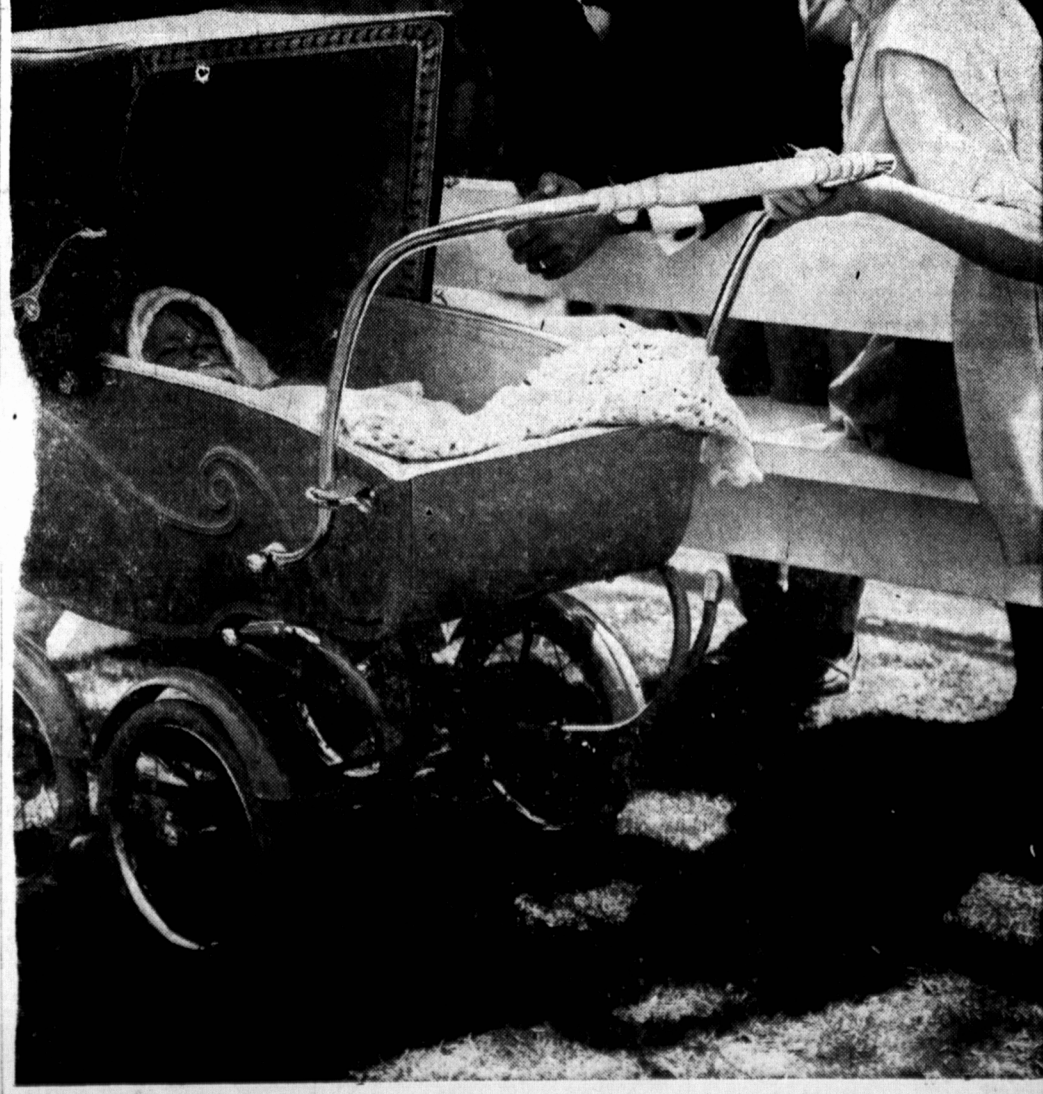
