Father Butler, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Butler of Charlottetown, graduated from St. Dunstan's in 1936, received his seminary training at the Sulpician Seminary, Brookland, D.C., and took special courses in classic literature at the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C. After his ordination in 1940 he was appointed curate in Summerside where he served also as part-time chaplain at the R.C.A.F. Station, until 1941 when he joined the Air Force as Chaplain and served overseas until 1945. On his return to civilian life Father Butler was appointed to the St. Dunstan's College Staff where he remained until he was appointed curate in St. Peter's Bay in 1948. After two years he was named Pastor of Fort Augustus. The Sunday evening ceremony at St. Dunstan's is open to the public. The Baccalaureate Sermon to the candidates for degrees will be followed by Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The annual luncheon meeting of the Charlottetown Women's Auxiliary of the Canadian National Institute of the Blind was held in the Charlottetown Hotel at noon Tuesday. Twenty-four members were present, and one guest, Mr. P. C. Bower, Field Secretary for the Institute in Prince Edward Island. The president, Mrs. S. G. Peppin, was chairman of the business meeting which followed the luncheon.

Absent from the meeting because of a death in the family was the secretary, Mrs. P. J. Proude. Mrs. John B. Murley acted as secretary for the meeting in her absence.

Mrs. Peppin thanked the members who assisted in packing and delivering Easter gifts to the blind. Mrs. W. J. P. MacMillan a number of blind people and how much these visits were appreciated. A number of members present volunteered to make similar visits and to make a report at the next meeting.

Arrangements were discussed for holding the annual summer picnic at Stanhope. July 5th was set as a tentative date for this year's event. The following members were appointed: Transportation, Mr. P. C. Bower; Refreshments, Mrs. J. T. Rodd and Mrs. J. J. Morris; Supplies, Mrs. S. G. Peppin and Mrs. W. J. P. MacMillan; Prizes, Mrs. Allan MacDonald and Mrs. P. J. Proude; Games: Under the auspices of the Friendship Club, assisted by Mr. Don Holden; Tea, Mrs. Wm. Teed and Mrs. J. M. Garnham.

FRIENDSHIP CLUBS

Mr. P. C. Power, the Field Secretary, gave an interesting talk on the work of the Friendship Clubs, which are organized by the blind for the blind. Their purpose is to create the feeling that the members are capable of doing things for themselves. They hold business and social meetings once a month where they learn how to conduct meetings and discuss their problems. Any pressing problems which arise are referred to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, which finances the Clubs.

A Friendship Club was organized in Charlottetown two years ago with twelve blind members and two sighted. There are fifty-nine clubs across Canada and a National Convention is held each year. This year it will be held in Toronto. The Maritime Convention will first be held in Cape Breton with one delegate in attendance from Prince Edward Island.

At the Maritime meeting delegates will be named to attend the three day convention in Toronto. At these regional and national conventions, the problems of the blind are discussed with relation to obtaining employment, training, and education and means and methods of overcoming the handicaps of the sightless.

The Friendship Clubs as one of its objectives raises money for the S. R. Hussey Scholarship Fund, which extends assistance to school graduates to further their education. As one example of this assistance Mr. Bower told of a Dalhousie graduate who was given \$500.00 and other assistance so that he might continue further studies at Harvard University.

Last year the Charlottetown Club sold Christmas cards realizing a profit of \$23.00 and held a cake sale which brought in \$13.13, a total of \$35.13. This amount was donated to the Scholarship Fund.

The local club also enjoyed bowling and cribbage games throughout the past winter. Mrs. Peppin, president of the auxiliary has actively assisted the local club during the past year. Mr. Bower was thanked for his address on behalf of the Auxiliary by Mrs. Peppin.

Reports Absence Of Major Crimes

In the report on the City Police Department for the month of April, Chief of Police C.W. MacArthur stated that a total of one hundred and fourteen arrests had been made, out of which one hundred and eight convictions were obtained. Leading the arrest count were 77 charged with drunk and incapable followed by twelve for drunk and disorderly. Drunken driving and driving whilst impaired accounted for four other offenders and impaired while in care and control of a motor vehicle amounted to four cases. Other offences shown in the report were for common assault; assaulting a peace officer; criminal negligence (with MV); falling to stop after accident; loitering; mischief; vagrancy; public mischief and theft.

Additional to the above fifteen traffic violators appeared before Magistrate K.M. Martin, all being convicted. Two persons charged with nonpayment of resident taxes were convicted.

Other duties performed by the department: Forty prisoners were transported from the Police Court to the jail and eighteen transported from jail to the court. Eighteen transients were accommodated overnight. A total of twenty-eight motor vehicle accidents were reported and investigated. Of the two motor vehicles stolen recovery was made in both cases and out of six bicycles reported stolen four were recovered. A total of \$812.50 was collected throughout the month for motor vehicle and other violations; meter permits; dog licences; bicycle licences and meter rentals.

Chief MacArthur reported that the overall picture for the month showed conditions as usual, with a few minor breaks being reported and investigated. There was a complete absence of major crime.

U. B. District W. M. S. Held At Murray River

On Tuesday, May 8, at 3 P.M. the Women's Missionary Society of the United Baptist district met in the Murray River Church. The devotional was taken by members of the Murray W.M.S. Mrs. Wilson Moore presided and read the scripture - Isaiah-chapter 6. Mrs. Peter MacLean led in prayer.

The address was given by Mrs. Rogerson on the subject, "Snail Winning." A duet was sung by Jeanie MacKinnon and Betty MacLean. Mrs. Moore welcomed the delegates most heartily and Mrs. McClare responded. The president Mrs. Donald McClare then took charge.

Dr. J.A. Clark of Charlottetown gave a resume of the work in Asia, India, Africa and South America. Dr. Clark stated facts and figures about each field giving a vivid picture of the work and the need for greater expansion.

Rev. H.L. Milton gave an address on foreign missions. Foreign missions should have a fore most place in our churches. It is not presented often enough. In many cases lack interest in this very important work is due to ignorance, said Mr. Milton. Mrs. G. Ives spoke on the general work and Rev. Leonard McClare spoke on daily vocation Bible Schools. Stressing the importance of the M.R.E.C. work shop.

Mrs. E.J. Barrass, Mrs. AK MacPhee and Mrs. D.N. Bell gave reports on mission band, Baby Band and C.G.I.T. work. Murray River, Montague, East Point, Hazelbrook, Bedouque, Charlottetown, Summerside and Tryon societies had representatives speak on work of special interest carried on by their groups.

The singing of "Blest Be The Tie That Binds" and the benediction by Rev. Mr. Rogerson brought this most interesting and helpful session to a close.

Very Busy Week At Immunization Clinics

At the polio immunization clinics conducted in the rural areas by the Health Department last week, a total of 5559 pre-school children and expectant mothers received their initial inoculation of Salk vaccine. In addition 487 children started the series of inoculations against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. This latter is very important at the present time due to the prevalence of whooping cough in several districts.

Throughout the very busy week for the medical and nursing staff, everything proceeded smoothly due to the co-operation of the parents and the volunteers from women's groups and clerical workers. The public health nurses said that a number of expectant mothers were disappointed, as they neglected to obtain a doctor's certificate as to their condition, were unable to receive an inoculation. This requirement is a must by the Department of Health before a polio inoculation can be given in those cases.

These rural clinics will continue for the next two weeks, by which time all eligible pre-school children will have had the opportunity of receiving the first inoculation against polio. Thus they will have some measure of protection against this paralytic disease.

The program of the Department of Health was to give all pre-school children born before 1955 and school children up to grade six at least two injections this spring and the third dose to all those who received two last year. Due to an unexpected tie-up in the delivery of vaccine, plans have been changed slightly and the original program will be carried out as soon as supplies become available.

At the airport the party will be officially welcomed by Lieut. Governor Prowse, Premier A. W. Matheson and Lieut. Col. A. W. Rogers, E. D., aide to the Lieut. Governor. There will be a private luncheon for the distinguished guests followed by a reception at Government House from 3.30 to 5.30 this afternoon. The Provincial Government is giving a dinner in honour of Earl and Lady Home on Wednesday evening at the Charlottetown Hotel.

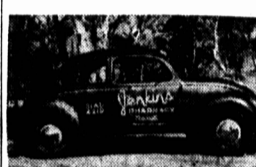

active in regard to proper employer-employee relations. He felt that co-ops should take the lead in paying a proper wage scale and not be content to pay a little over the minimum. He said that nothing could ever be accomplished by comparing one imperfect firm against another - if a certain firm was paying a meagre wage there was no reason why the Co-op should try to justify their position by paying a rate just above that wage. He would like to see the wages brought to a point where heads of families would find it profitable to work in the store.

SUMMERSIDE MANAGER Mr. Rod MacNevin, manager of the Summerside Co-op gave a brief outline of a plan evolved between employees and employers of the store. Mr. MacNevin said that the first thing worked out was evaluation of the job. "This was done with employees working in conference with the management.

After certain rates had been established and pay increases agreed to there was little or no dissatisfaction among employees because they knew exactly what they were supposed to receive after a certain period of service.

The second thing that was worked out between the staff and management was a bonus system. The rate of bonus was calculated upon the earnings of the business and it soon became evident to every employee that it was their duty to do a good job and see that no waste occurred in the operation thereof. "Each member of the staff became sort of a policeman to the other and they did not hesitate to call attention to any laxity in duty," he said.
