**Islander Candidate In Ontario Party Election**

The following excerpt taken from the Vancouver-Province newspaper will be of interest to our friends on the Island: "Professor Harry Cassidy is to be a candidate for the leadership of the Liberal Party in Ontario."  
"Dr. Cassidy is, in fact, one of the world's greatest social work scientists. In this field he has a career full of achievement behind him both in Canada and the U. S. A. When the United Nations was asked by Egypt to send them an expert to advise on a thorough overhaul of their social welfare service, anyone who knows much about social work in North America knows about Dr. Cassidy. The surprising thing is that at his age (just past 50) he should be willing to leave the security of a top position in the academic world for an arena as turbulent as Ontario provincial politics.

"The key to the riddle is that Professor Cassidy was advised, even urged, to do what he is doing on the advice of no less an authority than the late MacKenzie King himself.  
"It is another thing for anyone to advise even Dr. Cassidy to run for the leadership of a party in opposition to Tory Ontario. Everybody knew that Professor Cassidy has brains. Now, they know he's got guts, too. He must have, or he'd never take this plunge.
