This arrangement is good for all incoming trains on Monday and Tuesday, 8th and 9th inst., and outgoing trains on Wednesday and Thursday, 10th and 11th inst.

POLICE COURT.—There were four Scott Act cases on the docket this forenoon. Annie Curley, convicted of a second offence, was fined \$100 and \$11.65 costs or two months' imprisonment. William Froug, for a first offence, was fined \$50 and \$5.00 costs or two months' imprisonment. The summons against Mrs. Thomas Clarke was dismissed. P. P. Gillis' case was adjourned. Edgar McCarron, for being drunk and disorderly about the streets yesterday, was fined \$90 or 90 days' imprisonment.

THE DRAMA AT ST. PETER'S.—The Grand Musical and Literary Entertainment held at Head St. Peter's Day on Monday night, the 1st inst., was a big success, financially and otherwise. The dramatic Club rendered the new and popular Irish play, "Siann Aroon," a bumper house. The performance was very creditable to the young ladies and gentlemen who took part. Every character was acted to perfection, so that there is no need of special mention. It may be truly said that their performance would do credit to professionals.

A MINING CONVENTION.—A mining convention under the patronage of Lord Aberdeen is being now held at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal. Mining engineers and mine owners will be present. Invitations have been extended to Hon. Mr. Laurier and other prominent Ministers and the Governor-General himself has signified his desire to attend some of the sessions. Realizing the importance of this gathering, the Governments of Ontario and Nova Scotia have decided to send exhibitions of their mineral resources. Papers on different subjects will be read from day to day till the Convention rises.

AS INTERESTING CASE.—An application for certiorari in the town of New Glasgow, N. S., was made a few days ago in the Supreme Court chambers. The case is peculiar. The applicant for the writ is a ratepayer of New Glasgow. The town council of that prosperous eastern community passed a resolution in relation to Scott Act violations, which offered to any person who would become the prosecutor of a case of illicit selling half the fine as a reward or remuneration. One of the ratepayers took exception to the right of the council to pass such a resolution and has undertaken to have it tested in the present manner. The application claims that the resolution is ultra vires of the council.

BOARD OF TRADE.—A special meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held last evening. The President, Horace Hazard, Esq., occupied the chair. A communication from the London & Albany Iron Company enclosing a petition for continuance of duties on iron and the report of a committee, embracing the opinions of J. P. Tanton, George D. Longworth & Co., D. E. Clarke, H. W. Longworth, Philip Large, George E. Fall, Walter Maheon, J. H. Myrick & Co., Thomas Kitcham, Horace Hazard, B. Rogers, M. L. A. and A. B. Warburton, L. A., concerning tariff readjustment were read and discussed at length. But nothing was done. It was merely ordered that the "opinion" be forwarded to Ottawa to the Tariff Committee.

MR. CHARLTON AT WASHINGTON.

(Montreal Gazette)

Canada is at the parting of the ways. One road that lies before her leads through reciprocity to closer relations with the United States, with the prospect of ultimate absorption in that republic. The other guides to Imperial federation. Ensure consolidation, a distinctive British system, embracing the Motherland and all her colonies, improved steam ship and cable service, differential duties in Britain in favor of the colonies and in the colonies in favor of Britain, colonial representation in the Imperial Parliament and a movement all along the line for the consolidation and unification of all the scattered outposts of Britain's Imperial world-wide domain.

These are not the utterances of a Jingo Tory, anxious to injure his political opponents by misrepresenting their position and assailing their loyalty. They are the sentiments of Mr. John Charlton, M. P., long regarded as a Liberal leader, and now actually in Washington, working to force the war for the acceptance of Mr. Laurier's offer of reciprocity when he arrives at the U. S. capital with them. Without attributing to Mr. Charlton a prescience he does not possess, it need hardly be said that they should cause all concerned to examine with a very critical eye the terms of any reciprocity arrangement that may be proposed or accepted, remembering, moreover, that since 1866, when a reciprocity treaty between Canada and the United States was concluded, a benefit, there have been in Canada political, commercial and industrial changes that are not short of revolutionary, and that practical men who have studied the question are not by any means agreed that even a renewal of the treaty of 1864, if it could be had, would bring the advantages traditionally credited to that old arrangement. That with any advantages there will be losses, Mr. Charlton makes even more plain than he does that reciprocity with the United States would destroy all chances of Imperial federation.
