Harvey McKenna, the expert billiard player of Detroit, who visited Charlottetown some years ago, is dying of consumption. He had arranged a match with Schaefer, but was obliged to have it declared off.

In connection with the jubilee of the Toronto diocese of the Anglican Church, the degree of Doctor of Civil Law was conferred on the Bishop of Nova Scotia; Dr. Potter, President of Hobart College, New York; Dr. Geikie, Dean of Trinity Medical College, and Canon DuMoilin, Rector of St. James Cathedral, Toronto.

Ltd Harris, under secretary of state for war, has been appointed Governor of Bombay.

Col. J. R. Rathbone, of Washington, founder of the order of Knights of Pythias in America, is lying very ill at Lima, O. There are small hopes of his recovery.

The German consul at Zanzibar confirms the report of the safety of Dr. Peters.

A Sherbrook, Que., despatch of the 20th says: Mrs. Mary Hutton, widow of the late James Stanley Unsworth, died here last night rather suddenly at the age of 70 years. She was the sister of John L. Hutton, the great English composer. Her late husband died at St. Hyacinthe in 1834; he had come from England to Canada about 1852, and had served on the editorial staff of the Montreal Gazette. One of his sons, Joseph, is now superintendent of the federal government railway on Prince Edward Island. The late Mrs. Unsworth lived many years in Montreal, where she was a general favorite in musical circles. She was the mother-in-law of L. C. Belanger, the well-known crown prosecutor for the district of St. Francis.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. What Stanley Says.

LONDON, Nov. 25. Stanley, in his letter, gives extracts from Lieut. Jepson's report, stating that Emin's troops were insubordinate and twice tried to make the Pasha a prisoner. Jepson was certain that Emin is desirous of quitting the country, but is unable to make up his mind whether he had obligations to the people who had mutinied against him. Jepson once threatened that he would advise Stanley to arrest and carry the Pasha away. Emin replied that he would do nothing to prevent Jepson from pursuing such a course. Stanley concludes his letter by saying that all sorts and conditions of Emin's people praised his justice and generosity but said that he failed to be firm enough.

Italian Parliament Opened. ROME, Nov. 25.

The Italian Parliament was opened today by King Humbert. In his speech from the throne he said the Government's wise and equitable policy assured tranquillity to Italy and guaranteed peace which, thanks to the concert of the great powers, appears to be assured in Europe. Continuing he said Italy would lay down arms in Africa when an international agreement was reached, guaranteeing to her the very considerable possessions she has now in that Continent and recognizing the wide sphere of her influence. He hoped he would be able to promote humanity in the region outraged by much barbarity.

For Criminal Libel. BELFAST, Nov. 25.

The News Letter published an article full of apologies for its libel of Thomas Seaton. The paper also pays Seaton £500 damages.

LONDON, Nov. 25. Park, editor of the North London Press, who charged that the Earl of Euston was one of the principals in the Cavendish Street scandal, was arraigned on a charge of criminal libel preferred against him by the Earl. Park was remanded until tomorrow, and admitted to bail.

About a Railway Subsidy. OTTAWA, Nov. 25.

Dr. Muir, Mayor of Truro, arrived here today as an advance guard of a large deputation that will interview the government on Wednesday, in reference to the Hants Central Railway subsidy. Muir is trying to prejudice the government against the claims of the Stewiacke company.

Polygamy in the North-west. OTTAWA, Nov. 26.

The Mormon colony in the North-west is increasing rapidly in numbers, and those who pretend to know say that polygamy exists openly. Parliament is to be asked next session to enact a law prohibiting polygamy. There is no such statute existing at the present apparently.

Asylum Burned. BLACKFOOT, Idaho, Nov. 25.

The Territorial Asylum was burned this morning. Fifty-seven of the sixty-five inmates were rescued, and four are known to have perished. Four others are missing; it is feared burned to death. The loss is \$30,000.

Will Likely Hang. GUELPH, Nov. 25.

The sentence of death on Harvey, the Guelph murderer, is likely to be carried out, as it is understood the Minister of Justice thinks the insanity plea has not been substantiated.

Died from His Injuries. STANSTEAD, Ont., Nov. 25.

Chas. Calkins, blacksmith, who was shot last Monday by Wm. Blanchard, died on Saturday.

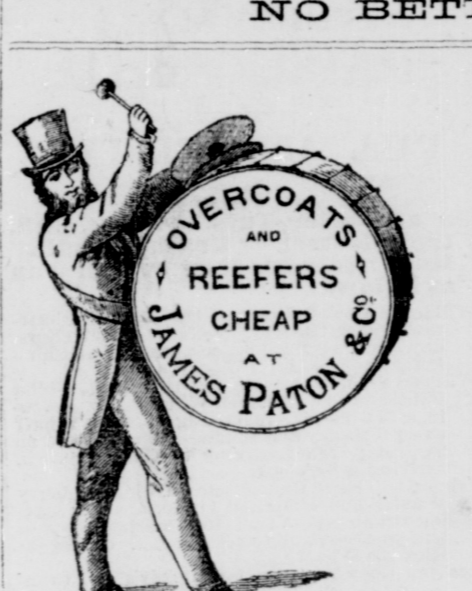
