Pass Festival Completed

Arrangements for the drama festival in the Civic Auditorium, Summerside, on the evening of March 29, 30, 31, have been completed. Evening performances were made by J. Watson MacNaught QC, regional chairman of the Dominion Drama Festival.

Three groups have entered play: Summerside Little Theatre, Charlottetown Little Theatre and St. Dunstan's University.

The Summerside group have chosen as their entry, "The Play's the Thing," translated comedy of Moliere translated into English by Wadehouse. This play will be the first entry and will be presented on the evening of March 29.

The St. Dunstan's Drama Unit have chosen "Red, White and Blue" a play by the famous Spanish playwright, Lorca. This is a tragedy and is a challenging play for any group of actors. It will be presented on the second night of the festival.

The Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild will present "Overboard" by M. C. Smith a sparkling comedy and is excellent. "Cheese" This entry will be the final presentation on Saturday evening.

The play "The Play's the Thing" in Summerside are in a real treat in this unusually well balanced festival.

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Summary Trial To Fight On Series Of Charges

In Queen's County magistrate's court yesterday morning Ralph Junior Larkin, Charlottetown, elected summary trial by magistrate on seven charges laid under the Criminal Code of Canada.

He pleaded guilty to four and denied the other three.

Magistrate James R. Johnson remanded the accused until March 21 for sentence on the guilty pleas, and to the same court for trial on the remaining charges.

The charges were: (1) At Oyster Bed Bridge, between Dec. 14 and 18, 1961, he had possession of a 1953 Chevrolet sedan, known to have been obtained by the Indictable offence of theft.

(2) On or about Dec. 18, 1961, at Southport he did steal a pay station telephone, the property of the Island Telephone Company, valued at over \$50.

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(4) On or about Dec. 17, 1961, at Montague, he did steal a pay station telephone, the property of the Island Telephone Company, valued over \$50.

(5) On or about Dec. 18, 1961, at Oyster Bed Bridge, he did break and enter the Irving service station of Harold MacDonald's, with intent.

(6) On or about Dec. 18, 1961, at Brackley Point, he did break and enter the Esso service station of Brad Murray, with intent.

(7) On or about Dec. 18, 1961, at Oyster Bed Bridge, he did break and enter the Irving service station of Alfred Peters, with intent.

Pleading guilty to driving a motor vehicle while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, William Alexis McQuaid, N. o. r. t. h. was fined \$200 and costs or 20 days in jail.

The increased penalty was a given at the request of prosecutor, Deputy Attorney-General A. Arthur McFaul, after he had informed the court that this was the second a s. c. h. e. n. c. e. committed by the accused without a plea of insanity.

Henry Joseph Kelly, Dromere, charged with failing to stop at the scene of an accident, had his case adjourned until 11 o'clock on the same date will be set for hearing.

On the charge of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, Keith Joseph Francis, Charlottetown, was remanded until March 15 at 7:30 p. m. as both the Kelly and Francis cases, the defence counsel is John W. Nicholson.
