On To Asia

From Italy, Mr. St. Laurent embarks on his visit to Pakistan, India and Ceylon which he has described as the "main purpose of my tour". He will confer with Prime Minister Nehru of India and Prime Minister Mohammed Ali of Pakistan.

His statement in the Commons that good relations with Asia depend on treating Asians with genuine understanding and co-operation seemed to indicate that he will make special efforts to impress Asian statesmen and the people of those countries that Canada does have that understanding and desires closer co-operation.

He will address the Indian Parliament, record addresses for broadcast to the people of Pakistan and Ceylon and give press conferences in all three countries. He also will visit Canadian Troops in Korea before making a three-day visit to Japan.

An audience with the Japanese emperor and conversations with Prime Minister Yoshida and Foreign Minister Ozaki are scheduled before Mr. St. Laurent heads home across the Pacific. He will make brief stops at Midway, Honolulu and San Francisco before returning to Ottawa March 17.

with a peace treaty and restored unity.

The Communist press splashed the plebiscite proposal across front pages.

A British delegation spokesman dismissed the "Molotov plebiscite" as a ridiculous sideshow designed by the Russian to hide his refusal to let Germans choose their own leaders freely. Molotov demands a 50-50 vote for the Communists in a provisional all-German government as the first step toward unity. The East zone has about 18,000,000 of Germany's 68,000,000.

"A Grave Peril"

American delegation officials regarded the plebiscite issue as not worth comment at their press briefing after Wednesday's session.

But for Molotov it seemed another propaganda feather in his cap, following up his demands here for a Big Five conference with Red China, a world disarmament conference, a German peace conference and the admission of both East and West Germans to the Big Four talks.

Arguing futilely with Molotov, State Secretary Dulles told him Germany's division "cannot be maintained without very great peril to us all."

The next step is to unite Germany through free elections and give united Germany a genuine choice as to what it wants to do," Dulles said.
