**PROVIDER AT ST. JOHN.**—The St. John Telegraph says:—On Tuesday afternoon during the races, Mr. W. S. McKie, of Charlottetown, will give his trotting stallion, Provider, a turn around the track. Provider has this season captured the Calais track record of 2.18 1/2 and took first prize at the exhibition.

Pontifical High Mass was celebrated at 10.30 by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, assisted by Revs J. Eneas Macdonald, Dr. Murphy, J. J. McDonald and P. McQuillan. Rev. D. Monaghan was master of ceremonies. The sermon of the day was delivered by Rev. Dr. Doyle, who spoke ably and eloquently of the duties and dignity of the priesthood, with special reference to the life and works of Father Duffy. After mass the monument recently erected in honor of Father Duffy was formally unveiled by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald. In the afternoon at three o'clock the Sacrament of Confirmation was administered by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald.
