A TEST OF SINCERITY.
SIR WILFRID LAURIER is in Pictou County, wearing his sunny smile. "His dearest wish," he says, is "that the people of all Canada shall be united."
 The sincerity of the Right Honorable gentleman when he uttered this delightful sentiment would be demonstrated, now, if he were but to put the brakes upon the press supporting his Government.
 La Patrie, the Government organ in Montreal, for which \$20,000 was recently paid, declared a few days ago that—
 "We discover in the enemy's camp formidable elements of hatred against the French province of Quebec. Chiefs and organs are directed by the same fanaticism. Clarke Wallace, who is to-day the high priest in intolerance, is at the same time the right hand of Sir Charles Tupper."
 But in Pictou County, among the Scotch Presbyterians of Nova Scotia, supporting Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, Sir Wilfrid finds no evidence of this "fanaticism," and he rests with confidence in the arms of his very dear friend Senator Carmichael.
 A few days ago, the Globe, blowing a blast for the other wing of the Government party, said:
 Sir Charles Tupper boldly held the (Conservative) party to the restoration of separate schools in Manitoba, and sought to drive the Orange leader out of Parliament. The fact that the policy of the Federal intervention in Manitoba could not possibly be made effective counted for nothing with the Conservative leader. He deliberately prolonged a religious conflict out of which no possible good could come to the minority in Manitoba, and deliberately humiliated and crucified the Orange Conservative because he believed that by courting the favor of a body of ecclesiastics in Quebec he could hold that province and rule Canada in defiance of the views of his followers in Ontario.
 Such writing as this seems to be unnecessary in view of Sir Wilfrid's assurance that the Manitoba School question "is settled"; it is certainly not calculated to promote these Christian feelings of love and concord and union to promote which is "the dearest wish" of the Premier's heart. Certainly the Premier ought to administer a few words of gentle rebuke to The Globe as well as to La Patrie.
 And what ought he not to say to his newspaper organ at Three Rivers, Quebec, which quite recently put forward this plea on behalf of Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Tarte:
 "Canada, the largest portion of whose population is French-Canadians, is presided over by a French-Canadian Catholic. Leave things as they are; do not, through rancour, envy or jealousy, wish

to replace this French-Canadian by an Englishman, an Orangeman. Have our compatriots of the opposition so little of the spirit of patriotism as to imagine an English Tory more in keeping at the head of affairs than a Canadian Liberal? It is not necessary to consider only if the government is liberal or if it is conservative. These qualifications should not count."
 That is to say—"the French-Canadians are now masters of the administration;—do not, upon any account, let any division among French-Canadians admit of the accession to power of men of other nationalities"—described sententiously and forcibly as "Englishmen" and "Orangemen." Surely Sir Wilfrid's sunny smile must have been saddened when he read these lines, pregnant as they are with the spirit of racial hatred, jealousy and disunion! Or has Sir Wilfrid merely been acting a part while living as a guest in Presbyterian Pictou County?
 We shall see whether or not the double-barrelled disunion gun of the government will at once cease firing—that will be the test of the Premier's sincerity.

DR. RYERSON'S TESTIMONY.
 DR. RYERSON, who left Canada last winter as Canadian Red Cross Commissioner in South Africa, gave, upon his return, a few days ago, an extremely interesting interview to the Montreal Star. The doctor is full of admiration for the good work done by Lady Roberts and other English ladies of wealth and station in South Africa, and contradicts both Burdett-Coutts and Kipling as to the alleged inefficiency and neglect of the hospital corps. He expresses great pride on account of the martial deeds of the Canadian troops and declares that Colonel Hughes did good service. Having been stationed at the army headquarters, Dr. Ryerson saw a great deal, almost daily, of both Lord's Roberts and Kitchener. There was nothing more striking about the two generals, he said, than the contrast between them. Lord Roberts was small, sharp, active, genial and approachable. Kitchener, on the other hand, was a man of whom almost every other man was afraid—tall, taciturn, difficult to approach, matter of fact, but much more amiable than his appearance would indicate. In this respect, too, he belied his reputation. Roberts was distinctly the master of the campaign, very determined, very kind to his men, especially to the sick, and the idol of his army.
 "If the esteemed EXAMINER were as patriotic as it is partisan it would rejoice with the Guardian in the booming trade, the busy industry and rapid progress of this great Dominion of ours."
