Addresses will be given by several experienced speakers, well qualified to deal with various phases of assistance to retarded children.

## Present City Dump Said Health Menace

Alarmed by what one councillor termed "a frightening health menace" the Charlottetown City Council is going to take steps to modernize the city's dumping system. The drive to do away with the present open system of dumping waste material was led by Councillor G. R. Foster.

The councillor said a more modern dumping system is definitely "a must" for Charlottetown if the danger to citizens' health is as great as reported. The purchase of a \$30,000 excavator, a machine used for shallow excavations and back-filling, has been approved in principle by the council to bring the dumping system up to modern standards of other progressive cities and towns.

We find a new site, a meeting of the public property committee was held during which all methods of dump usage were investigated. We found that we have the most outmoded method, namely the "open dump."

"The system used in Summerside and in all other up-to-date and progressive towns is the sanitary fill system which means the acquiring of a traxcavator. If the ditching method is used for sanitary fill, a ditch would be dug each day. The garbage disposed in the ditch would be pounded down by the traxcavator to less than one quarter of its original volume and then covered with fill.

### LAND BUILD UP

"This would leave no garbage in sight and would also result in the building up of the land used as a dump.

"It is proposed that a committee headed by the mayor wait on the government to acquire land outside the city for use as a dump with the understanding that the sanitary fill system be used.

"It should be noted that the present dump not only serves the citizens of Charlottetown but also those of Parkdale, the Royalties and other outlying sections.

Coun. Foster said he had been asked by Councillor Baker the amount of land used by this system and added that it was his understanding that .75 to 1.25 acres are required per year for each 10,000 persons.

In conclusion the public property chairman stated, "It is certainly my feeling, and I believe, the feeling of the council, that the matter has reached serious proportions and that something must be done immediately."

## Rochford Square Students Have Art, Needlework Show

An outstanding needlework and art display was completed yesterday at the Rochford Square School. It indicated a great deal of industry and attentiveness by the pupils, coupled with patient instruction by the Sisters.

The items of needlework covered projects ranging from the initial sewing cards up to the finer work done with the aid of the sewing machine.

The lots of grade one received their introduction to the art of sewing and weaving by the use of cards on which were stencilled designs for the little fingers to follow. Advancing into the second grade, here the pupils get their introduction to applying the needle to cloth materials, this class turned some excellent work in the manufacture of bankies, small bibs and aprons.

DISPLAY ENHANCED

Continuing to go deeper into the mysteries of needlework the grade three students, turned out a fine display of organdie aprons and dolls quilts. To enhance the display of quilts the pupils laid them out over their dolls.

Moving into the finer work the pupils of grades four and five were taught the various methods of hemstitching. The former grade turning out pillow cases and table runners, the latter grade aprons and tray cloths.

In grade six the students were finally introduced to what is considered by little girls, the most intriguing part of the sewing world, the use of the sewing machine.

Under the watchful eye of the sister the pupils sewed skirts, in their own sizes, from a variety of materials in a wide color range.

ART SECTIONS

The art sections covered a wide range of subjects, done in various materials, ranging from crayons to poster paints. In most instances the subject of the work was the creation of mind of the pupils, and showed that there is no lack of imagination running through minds of the young ladies.

In browsing around it was learned that two of the students had taken prizes in the art display which was shown during the Education Week contest. Susan Kennedy, took first place in the grade four class, and Christine Theriault placed third in the third grade.

In addition to the foregoing a number of the classes had on display several examples of number work books and printing work books.

TO HALT SHEPPING

OTTAWA (CP) — Commercial shipping in the Montreal area of the St. Lawrence Seaway will be halted four to five hours when the royal yacht Britannia passes through June 21. B. J. Roberts, president of the St. Lawrence Seaway Authority, said Tuesday the delay will affect commercial shipping waiting to pass up and down the St. Lambert and Cote Ste. Catherine locks at Montreal and at the Beauharnois lock, west of Montreal.

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## Travel Bureau Kicked Around

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian government travel bureau Monday drew sympathy on one hand as being in a pitiful state and criticism on the other for failing to tell Americans that Canada contains more than "cold weather, ducks and Mounties."

J. W. Murphy (PC-Lambton West), chairman of the Commons mines committee, inaugurated annual study of the government travel bureau by saying that the bureau has been tossed about between government departments since its inception in 1934.

It was in sorry shape through no fault of its own, Mr. Murphy complained. Canada's tourist industry last year netted \$352,000,000 but this was only a quarter

of the revenue that should be coming in. More money was needed for foreign advertising.

Art Smith (PC-Calgary South) said he questions the premise that the bureau should be working full-time to attract United States visitors when many Canadians hadn't seen much of their own country.

GONE TOO FAR

Moreover, he said, the bureau has gone too far in the idea of representing Canada as a wilderness. Americans tended to expect nothing but cowboys and Indians on arrival. Mr. Smith asked what was being done to show that Canada had more to offer than cold weather, ducks and Mounties?

## Plants Bought For \$50,000 Cost \$750 Million To Build

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Premier Smallwood announced in the legislature, which reopened Tuesday after a 20-day recess, that his government had bought for \$50,000 all the shares of two large plants it spent \$7,500,000 to establish in the province.

The plants are the North Star Cement Limited near Corner Brook and Canadian Machinery and Industry Construction Limited at St. John's.

Mr. Smallwood made the announcement during second reading of two bills which would enable the government to find new management for the plants.

The current session of the House was recessed May 19 to allow Finance Minister E. S. Spencer to prepare the budget.

The premier said already a group of Newfoundland businessmen, Ches Pippel of St. John's, W. J. Landrigan, Corner Brook, Kea Goodyear, Grand Falls, and officials of McNamara Construction.

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## Injured Gunmen Is Search Object

AMHERSTBURG, Ont. (CP) — Police armed with shotguns are combing the wooded amusement park on nearby Bob-Lo Island for a wounded gunman.

The gunman was one of two masked men with their pistols in the back of a hostage who let loose with a spray of bullets when they walked into a police trap during an attempted holdup on the island early Tuesday.

The hostage, Norman Paisley, superintendent of the park, fell to the floor when the shooting started.

Less than an hour later, a suspect was arrested by Amherstburg police as he was opening the door of his car on the main street of the town. Leslie Temesay, 26, of Amherstburg, father of six children, was charged with attempted robbery.

Police believe one of the gunmen was wounded in the exchange of fire and may still be hiding on the island.

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## Island Minister Reports Increased Church Donations

SACKVILLE, N. B. — (CP) — The Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada Tuesday outlined plans for increased welfare work among the aged.

A report tabled during the convention's opening sessions said the Tantramar Haven Welfare Home here would be enlarged to include facilities for 15 additional people. The home has been operated for the last four years.

Ministers and laymen representing close to 900 Maritime congregations attended Tuesday's opening. Dr. J.D. MacLeod of Scotsburn, N.S. presided.

Dr. E. Arthur Betts of Winsloe, P.E.I. said church donations by the conference's 235,000 members last year totalled \$4,746,546, an increase of \$460,000.

The secretary's report showed 1,700 new members.

An ordination ceremony Sunday will see 18 men inducted as ministers of the United Church of Canada.

The conference continues today with the election of officers.

Dr. E. R. Seary, professor of English at Memorial University, St. John's, Nfld., quoted a letter to The Times of London last February by a group of English scientists and scholars. The letter said Russia's advances in science have been well publicized.

"It is not as widely known perhaps that the Russian achievement in training teachers of English is no less striking," the letter said.

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

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
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
