## Veteran Legislative Member Leaves Tomorrow For Nigeria

S.S. Hessian, QC, Montague, long-time Liberal member of the P.E.I. Legislature, leaves Thursday for Lagos, Nigeria, where he will represent this province at the annual meeting of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

Mr. Hessian was selected by the provincial branch of the association which has as its president John MacLean, Souris, speaker of the House. Premier Walter Hogg and Opposition Leader A.W. Matheson as vice-presidents and Wendell Mackay, clerk of the Legislature as secretary.

According to Mr. Mackay, Mr. Hessian was selected from a number of applicants to represent the provincial branch of the association.

Various factors in the selection of Mr. Hessian as delegate were his length of service as a member of the Legislature, his bi-partisan attitude toward government affairs and his lifelong support of democratic principles. It was felt that Mr. Mackay, "the Mr. Hessian will represent this province with honor and dignity."

Mr. Hessian will arrive in London on Friday where he will meet with other Commonwealth representatives for Lagos.

The conference will end on Nov. 13 and Mr. Hessian expects to return home by the end of November or early December. He expects to visit Ireland before returning home.

## Gov't is Handed Pat, Prod. for Winter Jobs

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government has received a pat on its back and a prod at its posterior from organized labor over its job-boosting winter work program.

After analyzing the impact of the program, under which the federal treasury anticipates a payroll cost of approved minimum wage maintenance jobs for winter months, the Canadian Labor Congress offered this pat on the back.

"There can be no question that the program has been effective and necessary to create 16,000 jobs in the 1962-63 season, lasting an average of about 40 days, for a total of 5,784,274 man-days work. This is a record."

At the same time, the 1,070,000 member Congress pressed the government for permanent winter work incentives.

"The fact is that seasonal unemployment will be with us for a long time, and that this program is doing as well as face this frankly, and say frankly that we must have every winter until the need for it disappears or something better can be devised."

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## Cent A Dozen Price Support On Eggs

OTTAWA (CP)—A deficiency payment of one cent a dozen will be paid on eggs marketed during the price support year ended Sept. 30, the agricultural stabilization board has announced.

Producers will be eligible to receive the payment on grade A extra large, grade A large and grade A medium eggs, to a maximum of 4,000 dozen.

The payment will be made to producers registered with the board on eggs sold through registered egg grading stations or producer-graders through retail outlets.

The weighted national average price received by producers for grade A large eggs for the 12-month period was 33 cents a dozen, one cent below the continuing support price of 34 cents, the board.

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## Government Backers Cash At Opposition

OTTAWA (CP)—Social Credit voted with the minority government again Tuesday night to defeat another non-confidence motion and keep Prime Minister Diefenbaker's Conservative Ministry in office.

It was the fourth time in this young session of Parliament that the government has survived non-confidence votes. Each time Social Credit has been the deciding factor on the Conservative side.

Tuesday night's count was 137 to 116, the 25 Social Credit MPs present siding with 112 Conservatives against 98 Liberals and 18 New Democratic Party members.

Public and private galleries above the Commons floor were packed with spectators—some standing despite cold weather which had plagued the capital all day.

Earlier in Tuesday's sitting, a top government spokesman lashed back at opposition criticism during the throne speech debate.

DEFENDS MOVE  
Justice Minister Fleming said belittling measures taken by the government last June were done with powers "clearly conferred by Parliament."

By contrast, similar measures under the Liberals in 1947 were "clearly illegal," a shocking derogation from the authority of Parliament and a defiance of the rule of law.

M. J. Martin, speaking in French said the Liberals had agreed to five years on the merit of evaluating the Toronto-Davenport project.

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
