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Hotel Workers Ask Pay Boost

OTTAWA (CP) — New contract demands seeking a pay increase and other benefits have been served on 12 railway hotels by the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers.

The proposals include demands for a one-year contract, five-cent hourly pay boost, two more statutory holidays, two more vacation days, and adjustments in certain job classifications.

About 2,800 hotel workers employed in CPR and CNR hotels are involved. They are covered by contracts which were to expire Feb. 28.

CNR hotels involved are the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec City; the Empress, Victoria; Banff Springs, Banff, Alta.; Palliser, Calgary; Saskatchewan Regina, and Alexandra, Winnipeg.

CNR hotels are Jasper Park Lodge, Jasper, Alta.; Beasbrook, Saskatoon; Fort Garry, Winnipeg; Chateau Laurier, Ottawa; and the Charlottetown at Charlottetown.

The jointly-owned Hotel Vancouver is also involved.
