When he was introduced to Charles Eaton, New Jersey Republican, whose home town is Fugwash, N. S., the King, puzzled, asked how the representative got here. "Oh," Eaton replied, "I have travelled around just like you do." Eaton said he then told the King "the first song I remember singing as a child was 'Gave Save the King'." "He squeezed my hand after hearing that," the representative said.

NEW YORK TO GIVE ROYALTY BIG RECEPTION Manhattan Plans Record-Breaking Welcome To British King And Queen.

By LEON EDEL Canadian Press Staff Writer NEW YORK, June 9—Manhattan's millions, along the vast stretches of pavement that make up this sharp-lined city of skyscrapers, tonight awaited the coming of King George and his Queen. Sophisticated, hard-boiled but sentimental New York had special reasons for planning one of the breeziest, most democratic and enthusiastic welcomes it has ever accorded any distinguished visitor, although there will be no tickertape tomorrow and no royal progress up Broadway. For this city retains and cherishes a fund of British colonial tradition and association which 150 years of independence have failed to obliterate. The very name of New York will have more than a familiar ring for a British Sovereign who was Duke of York when he ascended the throne.

British Sovereign Places Wreath On Tomb Of George Washington And Decorates Tomb Of Unknown Soldier.

The ceremony at Mount Vernon, colonial home of the first President of the United States, stood out in a day of alternately historic and touchingly human activities for the King and Queen Elizabeth. There was the brilliant reception in the huge, high-domed rotunda of the Capitol, where Their Majesties shook hands and walked with some 400 Senators and members of the House of Representatives, all of whom were completely won over by the warmth and friendliness of the Royal Couple.
