GENERAL HUTTON ON THE MILITIA Had a Lot to Say on the Subject.

AT THE MEETING OF THE DOMINION ARTILLERY ASSOCIATION.

List of the Officers Elected—Many Improvements Promised.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—At a meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association, Colonel Irwin was elected President. The Vice Presidents are Lieut. Colonel Ring, 78th F B; Lieut. Colonel Longworth 48; Lieut. Colonel 48; Lieut. Colonel G. W. Jones, 3rd regiment.

The members of the council are Lieut. Colonel H. A. MacDonnell, Lieut. Colonel Crawford-Lindsay, Lieut. Colonel J. R. Armstrong.

Major-General Hutton said that the suggestions made last year had his support, and he would have much pleasure in supporting them.

These suggestions referred to mobilizing, shed accommodation, dress, etc.

With respect to dress he said, it was important but the particular thing was efficiency. Touching upon the important question of garrison artillery arm he said that it was extraordinary to see the interest that the artillery had taken in their work under such trying circumstances.

With the exception of the 1st Halifax and the 5th British Columbia, the guns were all obsolete and it was marvellous to him under such circumstances that they were able to keep together.

In respect to having a team visit Canada from Great Britain he thought it would be best to leave it for another year.

He had recommended to the Government to extend the drill from twelve to sixteen days.

The general said he was very much astonished when he came to this country to see how low was the standard of scientific attainments in Canada.

This was not due to officers but circumstances. There was not a single officer in Canada who had any technical or scientific training as an artilleryman; there was not, he had to say with honor, an officer in the country who technically qualified to put himself at the head of a school of gunnery.

To meet this difficulty he had been able to get the Minister of Militia to send two officers to Woolwich and afterwards to go to Shoeburyness to get the necessary instructions.

His Grace thus writes it: "The declaration of faith is a series of insults hurled at the Catholic Church and its ministers, of blasphemies and sarcastic abuse of our venerated dogmas. The eucharist, the worship of the Holy Virgin, the sacrament of penance, the primacy of the Sovereign Pontiff, the confession, and the celibacy of the priesthood are also treated as diabolical institutions. All his most odious accusations and calumnies inspired by hatred of the Roman Catholic church have been revived." The Archbishop then flatly refuses to place the document among the episcopal archives, and returns it to the sender with thanks.
