It would be the answer to many of the problems plaguing the industry at the time and I have no doubt that it did cure a few malpractices but certainly it did not or has not accomplished all that was expected at that time," said Mr. Clement.

"It can be argued that in many respects compulsory inspection was and is a bad thing because it does cause a shift away from the grower and shipper of the responsibility for marketing a product well above the minimum grade.

LITTLE UNIFORMITY

"A review of the potato shipments from P.E.I. over this past growing season shows that only 40 per cent of the total table stock pack was warehouse graded. This of course means that 60 per cent of the table potatoes shipped were graded and packed by the producer.

"Under such circumstances you will agree that it is extremely difficult if not entirely impossible to establish or maintain a uniform quality."

Mr. Clement while expressing his opinion on the desirability of central grading did not indicate that the department was ready to initiate such a plan but he stated that New Brunswick growers of a certain area have asked for and will try such a scheme this coming season.

He said, "Central packing by experienced graders would have a tendency to over come the problem particularly if the central packing principle of registered grading warehouses for other commodities is combined with a system of registration."

DEPARTMENT'S PROPOSAL

In outlining the department's proposed policy, Mr. Clement said they would like to:

1. Provide that on and after a certain date . . . potatoes must be graded and packed only in registered warehouses and under the supervision of qualified personnel in order to be eligible for inter-provincial export trade.
2. Provide that minimum facilities and adequate equipment to be made available for grading before warehouse can be registered.
3. Provide for the marking of the warehouse registration number on all packages packed in registered warehouses.
4. Provide for cancellation or suspension of registration if grading or other established standards are not maintained.

OPTIONAL INSPECTION

"The four points speak for themselves and collectively indicate the control over the grades shipped from any warehouse. It is further suggested that provision be made to relieve registered warehouses of the compulsory inspection regulations but at the same time there is no suggestion that inspection and certification be dropped altogether. Rather it is thought that inspection and certification should be available on request basis only.

HAVE RESPONSIBILITY

"All people handling potatoes, whether they be growers and shippers, wholesalers or distributors or retailers, have some responsibility for ensuring that produce is up to grade on all factors, before passing the product along to the consumer. To this end the Department has established at many of the big marketing centres what we call Consolidated Retail Inspection Units. You may be interested in a brief review of the activities of these Units and their effects on the produce you market."

HIGH STANDARD

"On this promise it is evident that it is at the retail store, the

place where producer and consumer finally get together, that the produce must meet a high standard. Accordingly it was decided to do more work at the retail level covering fruits and vegetables (including potatoes) where standards are applicable.

Inspectors were trained to inspect all these products for quality and condition so that when the inspector enters the store he can do a complete inspection on all of the above mentioned commodities during the single visit. IN ITS INFANCY

"This type of inspection is still in its infancy and we are covering a relatively few markets but already the effects are beginning to show. The retailers generally are becoming very conscious of their responsibility and are insisting on a better quality product from the wholesaler or supplier. Wholesalers and suppliers are finding that they can no longer supply inferior or mediocre produce to the retailer so in turn they are demanding something better from shippers.

CHANGING TIMES

"When speaking on this subject it is difficult to know when and where to stop. There are many things that can be said about our changing times and the newer methods of doing business and the necessity for discarding the old systems if they do not fit into the new systems of merchandising.

"One might go on to talk about the new type of supermarket where small retailers go to buy on a cash and carry basis, or one might talk about the effect of end of the week buying or mention the effects of immigration and population growth. All these and other things have an effect on your business and emphasize the fact that there must be changes in the potato industry."

NEED IMPROVEMENT

"Perhaps I have suggested an avenue of approach to your problems, but whatever the approach it is hard to escape the fact that the industry must accept the responsibility for putting up the best possible pack of any commodity and not merely
