Garden Province described 'unexcelled scenic beauty'

A panorama of unexcelled scenic beauty unfolds before the eye of the motorist as he glides over gentle hills and into picturesque valleys through the beautifully landscaped countryside of Prince Edward Island. Red soil, green fields, majestic trees, multicolored flowers and blue water produce a

fairytale effect for the fortunate visitor during the eight-hour part of his Island vacation. A day's journey from any resort can be a rewarding experience for those who are seeking exceptional scenery. The quiet, pastoral charm of the island is enhanced by the smell of new mown clover, by the song of the locust and by

the music of birds. PASTORAL OF BEAUTY. Lively and serene, the Island spreads a carpet of pastoral beauty on all sides to delight the eye of the visitor seeking the sort of landscaping which is the handiwork of mother nature herself. Island life is unhurried and the same pace usually prevails during pleasant drives which are a popular diversion in the Garden Province. Distances are short and the delights can be seen leisurely. Predominantly agricultural, the province gives the appearance of one large, well-kept farm. In fact, it is widely known as The Million Acre Farm. Herds of sleek cattle graze in roadside fields. The red of the clover and the whites and yellows of daisies in the hayfields predominate the entire setting. Even the white blossoms of many potato fields present a picture long to be remembered. Some of the world's best seed potatoes are harvested

from these same fields each autumn. Most Island roads run close to the shore line and pass through quiet little fishing villages where the descendants of the early fishermen and their families live. Busy little fishing boats churn merrily in and out of the harbours. Visitors are intrigued by the activity at the wharves when the daily catch of lobster, codfish and mackerel is landed. There are 3,000 miles of highway to speed the motorist on his way to the scenic views of Prince Edward Island. One thousand miles of paved highway link all parts of the province to the main centres and resorts. The Trans-Canada highway, now completed, is a first class, hard surface highway running through the centre of the province. Increasing numbers of car enthusiasts are seeking out the island as a desirable spot for excellent color photographs. Many artists also come to the province to capture their favourite scene on canvas. Two things that impress visitors most are the red clay and green grass that cover most of the island. About 85 per cent of the province is open country. There are no great forests — these are small. The motorist is greeted by a changing panorama of rural homesteads and pastoral beauty. Nowhere will you find a more beautiful countryside; nowhere such hospitality, and nowhere a place so pleasant and easy-going.
