Course In Navigation Slated For Fishermen

Department of fisheries officials expect "heavy enrollment" for the course in navigation for fishermen which begins at the provincial vocational school in Charlottetown on Monday.

This is the third year that such a course has been held. Co-sponsors of the course are the provincial departments of education and fisheries and the federal department of labor.

The course consists of primary and advanced navigation and takes two years to complete. Those who are successful in passing are eligible to write department of transport exam-

nations leading to a mate's certificate.

Some new equipment has been installed for use in the course this year. Instruction will be given in radio direction finding and echo sounding as well as standard navigation lore as taught in the past two years.

Chief instructor is Capt. Lester White, Murray Harbor. The course will last several months.

OTHER COURSES
Courses of a week's duration in net hanging will also be given throughout the province during the winter. These courses will be sponsored by the department of fisheries and will show techniques of gill and trawl net usage. General fisheries topics will be discussed also.

COUNTY JAIL CLAIMED 'UNFIT'

Contending the presence of filth and vermin makes the Queens County jail unfit for human habitation, an appeal is being filed against the conviction in city police court yesterday of Milton Compton, on a charge of being drunk and incapable.

Allison Gillis, representing the appellant, said he is appealing the 10-day sentence imposed by Magistrate James Haslam on two counts: 1, that the sentence is excessive; and 2, because of the presence of filth, lice, bedbugs and other vermin "the said Queens County Jail is unfit for habitation".

Exhibition Dates Set, Aug. 13-18

Lost Articles Pose Problem

Deputy Chief of Police Stems Webster said yesterday that with approximately one dozen bicycles and three tricycles in the possession of the city police, the lost and found locker is beginning to bulge at the seams.

Some of these items have been on hand for several months, with no persons coming forward to attempt to lay claim to ownership.

The deputy said that the department is anxious that persons who have lost articles of this nature present themselves at the police station to try to identify the machines and, if possible, to claim ownership.

If such action is not taken within a reasonable amount of time, Deputy Webster said it may be necessary for the department to take other steps to dispose of the articles.

Sentence Suspended

Convicted of assaulting Joseph A. Ryan, by striking him on the face with his fist, Roy Wilson, New Dominion, was yesterday given a 10-day suspended sentence by Magistrate A. J. Haslam in city police court yesterday.

On the charge of disorderly conduct, refusing to pay for a meal and using obscene language in a local restaurant, William Jay, Summerside, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days in jail.

Two persons pleaded guilty to having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their residences, and each was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail.

At the request of defence counsel, Allison M. Gillis, the case of Trench Accessories Ltd., charged with parking a motor vehicle in a metered parking zone, when the meter did not show time purchased, was adjourned until Jan. 12.

Hearing Is Slated In Parkdale 'Test'

A writ has been issued out of Queens County Court for a hearing on the Village of Parkdale's action for collection of the work tax against employees of the Exhibition Association. The date of March 13 has been set for the hearing in the civil action.

There is a possibility that a tax action may also be taken before the Parkdale Justice of the Peace, D.A. MacDonald, for infringement of the village by-law regarding payment of the tax.

This matter is reported to have been considered yesterday by lawyers for the village but no report was made public last night.

TEST CASE
The action in County Court is in the form of a test case, with one of the pari-mutuel handlers, J.T. Pless, as the defendant.

Representing Mr. Pless is Charles McQuaid, while Robert G. MacLeod will appear for the prosecution.

Power of the Village to impose a tax is contained in the Village Services Act, which has sparked a move for revision of the Act at the next session of the legislature.

Authority of a justice of the peace to hear cases arising from by-law infractions is contained in a village by-law, passed in 1959 and later approved by the minister responsible for a administering the Village Services Act.

On a charge of car theft, James Edward Stewart, St. Charles, was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday.

Stewart, not represented by counsel, on Jan. 3 pleaded guilty to the theft of an automobile, the property of Paul Norbert Bradley, Parkdale, on the evening of Jan. 2.

Fines of \$10 and costs or five days in jail were meted out to Jackson Everett Roach, Windsor, for driving on the wrong side of

the highway, and to Gerald Joseph Gallagher, East Royalty, for driving when not in possession of an operator's licence.

Following the testimony of one police officer, the case of John Stirling Hamby, Sherwood, on the charge of driving without due care and attention, was adjourned until Jan. 17. Counsel for the defence is John P. Nicholson.

A fine of \$5 and costs or two days was given a pedestrian for walking on the wrong side of the highway, and to a motorist for failing to stop for a "stop" sign.

Car Theft Brings 2-Year Sentence

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Processing Plants On Island Are Visited By NRC Officer

T. F. Houlding of the technical information services branch of the National Research Council, Ottawa, is in the province visiting manufacturing and processing plants with a view to obtaining advice on technical problems that these plants may encounter.

For the next 10 days, Mr. Houlding will visit various parts of the province, accompanied by Graham Rogers, provincial transportation director.

In the amount of \$1,000, the case of Kenneth Ralph Duncan, Charlottetown, convicted Tuesday of possession of stolen goods, for which he received a one-year suspended sentence, was concluded. Mr. Gillis was counsel for the defence.

Of four persons charged with being drunk and disorderly, one was sentenced to 30 days in jail, another to 10 days, a third was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days, and the fourth \$10 and costs or five days.

Today, Mr. Houlding will be in Summerside and vicinity and on Friday in the Souris area. Next week he will visit O'Leary, Kensington and Alberton. Also slated for a visit from Mr. Houlding are St. Peter's, Morell, Montague and Murray Harbor.

Mr. Houlding made a similar visit to the province last year. Commenting on that visit, Mr. Rogers said "Mr. Houlding's advice and methods of getting advice on technical problems have been of great value to many Island producers."

Judges Of Memorial Bldg. Design Will Inspect Site

The seven-man jury that will select the winning architectural design for the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building will fly to Charlottetown Jan. 22, it was announced in Toronto yesterday.

Professor Eric E. Arthur, of the University of Toronto School of Architecture, the contest organizer, said the trip is being made so the jury may view the site of the building prior to the final judging.

Prof. Arthur said he expected his jury will announce the prize winners Jan. 27, after judging models and drawings in Toronto, Jan. 24-26. Deadline for entries to the contest is Jan. 19.

Prizes of \$7,500, \$5,000 and \$2,500 will be awarded to architects submitting the top three designs. The prizes will be presented in Ottawa Jan. 30 at a dinner to be attended by Governor General Vanier and Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

The winner of the first prize will be the architect of the memorial building, to be constructed in the center of the city on a site bounded by Queen, Grafton, Church, and Richmond streets.

1964 COMPLETION
The building will house a theatre, art gallery, museum libraries and a restaurant. Plans call for its completion by 1964.

The memorial developed into a national project from a local move to establish a permanent memorial to Canada's founding fathers, who met in Charlottetown in September of 1864. It will be the first such memorial established in Canada.

Professional and business men across Canada formed the memorial foundation last year. Federal and provincial governments pledged support, and the Canada Council granted \$30,000 in May to finance the architectural competition.

The foundation is seeking funds, ideas, and regional materials from governments, industries, and private citizens throughout Canada. Cost of the building is expected to be between \$4,000,000 and \$6,000,000.

56 ARCHITECTS ENTER
At present, 56 architects have said they will enter the competition and Prof. Arthur said that number may change before the deadline for entries is reached.

Members of the jury are: Calgary lawyer Eric L. Harvie; Dominion Archivist Dr. Kaye Lamb of Ottawa; Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College; Prof. Arthur, and three other architects: Charles Trudeau, Montreal; John Russell of the University of Manitoba, and Sir Basil Spence, designer of the new Coventry Cathedral in England.

Prof. Arthur is also professional adviser to the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Foundation.

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Water System Found Adequate At Present

Making a partial announcement regarding the survey of the water supply system of Charlottetown, conducted last summer, the Water Commission said yesterday that the existing water system has been found adequate for present normal demands.

But the Pliometer Associates of New York City, who carried out the survey, stressed the system is not capable of providing the necessary flow of water to the fire mains in certain sections of the city, in the event of any major conflagration.

In this connection, the company has made a number of recommendations regarding the improving of the water flow, with the intent of bringing the fire fighting standard of flow up to that required by the fire underwriters.

SUBSTANTIAL LOSS
In the matter of loss and leakage, the report indicates that there is a substantial percentage of loss. The highest being in the commercial districts and the older sections of the city.

Some of this loss is attributed to the normal amount of corrosion which occurs in the mains, from water having as high a chemical content as that of Charlottetown.

The company also indicated that there is an excess of loss due to underground leaks in some of the mains along with faulty consumer services, within buildings. This latter was again more evident in the commercial and older sections of the city.

The report outlined what is considered to be the city's water requirements for the next 15 years, which included recommendations for the replacing of present mains in certain areas with larger mains.

This was based, mainly, on the estimated normal growth of the city and population, over that period of years.
