### OTTAWA CORRESPONDENCE.

There was no very striking progress made last week with the consideration of the tariff in committee. The Opposition talk and say the same thing over and over again, and the Government patiently listen in hopes that the obstructionists will wear themselves out. I understand that about one-half the tariff items have been disposed of. At the rate they are going on, and in view of the measures still to be brought before the House, it will be July before prorogation is reached, while if it be true that Quebec is to be re-distributed, the whole government business will be overhauled, and it will be September before they get away.

The question of putting witnesses before the parliamentary committees under oath was the subject of a whole forenoon's discussion last week before the public accounts committee, and occupied the whole afternoon session of the House. At first sight, it would appear that the Opposition decline to believe Mr. Joseph Pope, except on his oath. His testimony was desired by the public accounts committee to explain some of the expenditure incurred at the Bering Sea Commission in 1892, last summer, and when he presented himself for examination they wrangled all morning about putting him on oath, and as a consequence he was not examined at all. The dispute between Government and Opposition was a very small matter. The Opposition contended that the committee should be given general powers to swear by a motion calling for papers. "No, if it be found necessary to take testimony under oath, apply to the House and get the authority to do so." In the course of the debate a doubt arose as to the House's power in this respect, and Mr. Sir John Thompson's suggestion it was agreed that a bill should be immediately introduced and put through giving the committee powers, and thus the matter was disposed of.

### THE SCHOOL QUESTION.

The Manitoba and Northwest School questions came up for discussion last week by a motion calling for papers. Several speeches were made on both sides of the House, but the principal contribution was that of Sir John Thompson, who explained in some length and justly the action of the Government. Sir John's speech was elaborate and technical, and savored more of a law court than of parliament. He opened by referring to the resolutions arising out of a question, and congratulated his followers for withstanding the combined assault last session of Tarte and McCarthy, their irreconcilable views. Before taking up the Northwest issue, Sir John referred to the situation in Manitoba. He claimed the courts had decided that the Government had no authority to pass the legislation. Coming to the Northwest, he stated that the bill which had taken place in the consideration of the protests by declaring that while the ordinances were passed on the 21st December, 1892, the first petitions against the act were received on 11th November, 1893. These petitions contained complaints of two kinds, grievances on account of harm alleged to be done by the ordinances and apprehensions of the future on account of the ordinance. The Hon. John Hearn of Quebec West, who succeeded Mr. Thomas McCrewey, has again been very ill, so low, indeed, that the last rites of the church were administered to him. Mr. Hearn is an elderly gentleman, and was greatly reduced by an attack of la grippe last fall. He has a peculiar affection of the throat, which causes him to speak in a high pitched falsetto voice, richly flavored with the brogue.

Commodore Welsh has been dining with Sir Adolpho Alder.

One of Ottawa's most prominent citizens is ex-Alderman John Henev, a Knight of the Holy Sepulchre, but familiarly known as "Honest John." A few days ago he celebrated the 73rd anniversary of his birth. He is a County of Cavan man, and left Ireland for America just fifty years ago, and has resided at Ottawa for now nearly half a century. He still treasures the medal which, five years before he left the old sod, he received at the hands of Father Mathew, the Apostle of Temperance, while he has kept the pledge till this day. There came one of a temperance meeting in Ottawa without John Henev on the platform. He has been very successful in life and is accounted foremost, while his name is almost everywhere in every good work.

The state dinner, which had been postponed on account of the death of Lady Aberdeen's father, was held on Thursday evening last. The invited guests comprised the Lieutenant-Governor, the Cabinet Ministers, Privy Counsellors not in the Cabinet, the Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada, the Chief Justices of the Superior Courts of Law and Equity, the General and Admiral on the Halifax station, the Archbishops of Ottawa and of Ontario, the deputy heads of departments, the Speakers of the Commons and the Senate, and a number of other officials.

The grand ball given by the ladies residing at the Russell House, was one of the most pleasing social events of the season. It took place last Friday evening, 900 persons were invited, but they did not all come. Over 500 are said to have been there and the toilettes were gorgeous.

Father Dawson, of whom I gave you some account last fall, preached the laudable sermon before Queen's University, Kingston, where he was the guest of Principal Grant. Father Dawson, who is now in his 55th year, lodged with our old friends Mr. and Mrs. Donald McLellan, where he is very comfortable.

The dress was trimmed with bands of blue silk velvet.
