

Blarney Stone Kissed By Premier W.R. Shaw

Premier Walter R. Shaw, vacationing in Ireland, took time out from his tours of agricultural plants and livestock farms last week to visit Cork and Blarney Castle, where he "kissed the Blarney Stone."

The premier, who is expected back in the province about mid-October, said "I climbed the high tower and after going through some contortions, kissed the Blarney Stone. I won't be able to decide on the influence of this venture until the next session of the Legislature, but in any event it was an interesting experience."

Premier Shaw said he found that little flax has been grown in Ireland during the past few years. He said "competition from synthetics and other subsidized products is very keen and flax is not subsidized. New processing techniques, however, have led to optimism that flax may make a comeback."

FLAX MARKET?
"Irish processors have expressed interest in our flax industry in the province and a market for

our product in Ireland would seem reasonable. It does seem strange to sell our product to continental Europe while those countries in turn sell to Ireland."

The premier, who is accompanied by Mrs. Shaw, is combining business with the pleasures of a vacation. Recently he held discussions with the Ulster Farmers' Union and the Ulster Milk Board.

WONDERFUL WELCOME
Premier Shaw said he had a "wonderful welcome in Dublin and Belfast." He said "through the fine services of the Irish Ambassador to Canada I was able to call on President Eamon de Valera, Prime Minister Sean LeMass and External Affairs Minister Aitkens — all friendly and gracious men — and we discussed problems of development relative to each country."

"The premier's vacation trip included visits to a hog sire qualification centre, and artificial insemination centre and an agricultural school."

"I also had the opportunity," the premier said, "to visit 'The Curragh,' where the Irish Derby is run and saw some of the world-famous thoroughbred stallions, some valued at over \$250,000."

Announces Site Change For Blood Donor Clinics

A change in location of the Charlottetown Red Cross blood donor clinics from the lecture theatre to the ground floor lobby of the Confederation Centre was announced by F.A.S. Jones, provincial chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee, when giving his report at the September meeting of the provincial executive held at Red Cross headquarters yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Jones explained that the entrance to the clinic would now be through the box office door on Queen Street, rather than through Memorial Hall as had been stated previously in the newspapers, and when cards were sent out to former donors. "The new location should be much more convenient and com-

the afternoon sessions on Tuesday and Thursday, as well as the morning one on Wednesday, in order to keep the clinic staff and volunteers constantly busy during these times, and leave the evening hours for those who could not possibly be there during the day time.

PROUD RECORD
Residents in Charlottetown, and the surrounding area, have established a proud record as blood donors over the years, and Mr. Jones stated that he was confident the same response would be forthcoming at next week's clinics which have an increased objective of 1,145 donors to meet.

"At present," Mr. Jones said, "Charlottetown is in second place for the 'Manning Trophy' having achieved a 116.6 per cent result at the spring clinics, with Souris in first place as the result of a 127.3 per cent response at the clinic held there in August. Souris was last year's winner of this coveted trophy which at present is being proudly displayed on the walls of the Legion Home in Souris."

FOUR DAY CLINIC
Mr. Jones made reference to the fact that there will be four days of clinics — Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week — rather than the usual three. He said that the extra day had been added in an attempt to overcome the long waiting line which occurred at last spring's clinics when such large numbers turned up during the three-day period. Bottling Plant Is Expanding

One of the oldest companies in Charlottetown, J. and T. Morris Limited, bottlers for Coca Cola Limited, established in 1855, is expanding its operation with the construction of a newer and more specialized bottling plant on the Kennington Road.

The one-storey structure, which has been in progress for about a month, is expected to be completed by the end of November. President and general manager, John F. Morris said the plant, being erected at a cost of

\$130,000, with a capacity of producing 7,200 bottles of beverage per hour, will employ 45 people compared with the present operation which turns out 2400 bottles per hour and employs 30 workers.

The first of its kind on Prince Edward Island, this new operation is the third of its type in the Maritime Provinces, as a id Mr. Morris.
