Commonwealth Exchange Of Governors General?

OTTAWA (CPI) — A suggestion has been laid before the House of Commons that future governors-general of Canada be chosen from other Commonwealth countries, even if it means putting in Government House a man of different color and creed.

The proposal was made Wednesday by Wallace Nesbitt (PC-Oxford) who said Canada has "outgrown" the past practice of having a continual string of appointees from the United Kingdom representing the Queen in Canada. Neither did he think Canadians should be appointed each time.

Other countries would eventually be added to the Commonwealth, such as Nigeria, the Gold Coast and "at some time in the future, the West Indies," Mr. Nesbitt said. It might seem strange at first to see a governor-general of a "different color and even a different religion" but Canada should show by deed she supports the equality of man.

CONSERVATIVE OPPOSES — Mr. Nesbitt ran into opposition from party mate J. Wilfrid Dufferin (PC-Quebec West), who said Canada should not go to other Commonwealth countries for a governor-general.

The office should be filled alternately with French and English-speaking Canadians, Mr. Dufferin said. He would have no objection if Prime Minister St. Laurent were chosen to succeed Governor-General Vincent Massey the first native Canadian governor-general, who was appointed in 1952. But Mr. St. Laurent would have to resign "immediately."

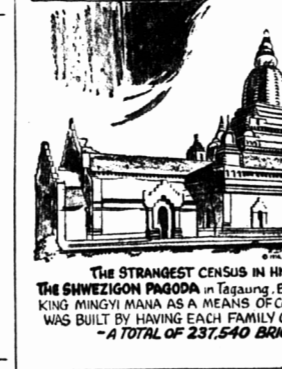
U.S. More Critical Over Foreign Aid To Egypt

By JOHN SCALI WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has decided to re-examine its offer to help Egypt build the world's biggest dam on the Nile River.

The state department, it was learned, will take a new, critical look at the deal the U.S. and Britain proposed to Egypt last December before deciding whether to go through with the offer.

USE MONEY ELSEWHERE — As evidence of its tougher attitude, the state department has notified Egypt that foreign aid grants previously earmarked to help Egypt begin its \$1,300,000,000 dam project now have been reallocated to other foreign aid programs considered to be of higher priority.

Mr. Pinard said he believes some "specimen" medals were minted in 1943 but a government committee which deals with awards had never recommended anyone for it.

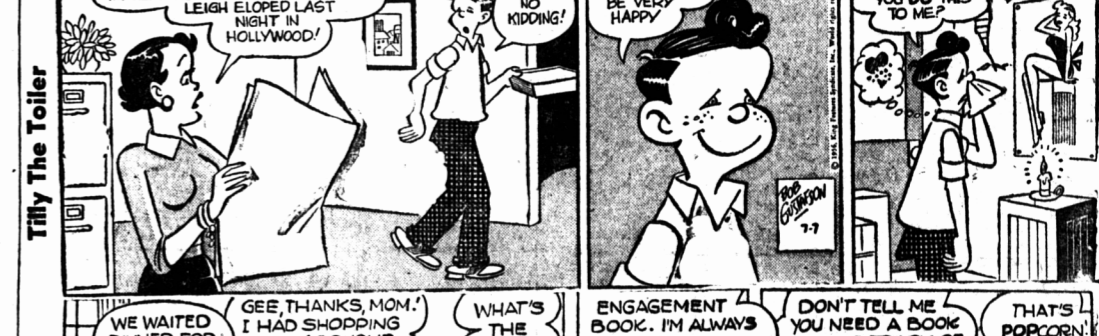
JOINT FINANCING — The U.S. joined Britain last Dec. 16 in offering \$70,000,000 in grants to Egypt to help begin its hydro-electric and irrigation project. The World Bank pledged a \$200,000,000 loan. Britain and the U.S. also promised to consider sympathetically Egypt's need for an additional \$130,000,000 in foreign currency.
