## Seven Injured In Two Accidents

Seven persons were sent to hospital yesterday as the result of two separate accidents Sunday afternoon.

Two persons were hospitalized after a ten-car collision at Clyde River at 1:45 p.m. but were later released; their injuries being minor. The other five were taken to hospital by the Cutcliffe ambulance service.

At 2:20 p.m. five persons were sent to hospital from a two-car collision, which occurred between Marshall and P. D. Dunlop. The two cars were badly damaged. The driver of the car in front of which was involved in the accident, but it is not clear if it was reported and the other two were released after treatment.

The Charlottetown RCMP last night declined to release the names of those involved in either of the accidents. No reason was given other than that "they weren't available."

## Prince Nova Scheduled For P.E.I.-N.S. Service

The new ferry "Prince Nova" is expected to go into operation on the Prince Edward Island - Scotia run early in May.

Capt. Claud R. Hunter president of the Northumberland Ferries Ltd., returned from Victoria, N.S., Friday where he carried out an inspection of the ship built by Ferguson Industries Ltd. and 300 passengers, and the two ships will be able to handle 1,000 cars a day on regular runs. The route on any one day is 60, set in July of last year.

The original "Prince Nova" is the first ferry to operate on the route when the service opened in the summer of 1959, carried only 14 automobiles.

**COMPARISON NOTED**

An interesting comparison as to how traffic carried on the route has expanded is given by the 1953 figures and the 1961 figures in brackets: passengers 179,216 (23,363), autos 55,970 (6,327), trucks 16,646 (209).

The service usually gets underway the first week of May.

The new Prince Nova will have a speed of 11 knots compared to the Lord Selkirk's 11, and will probably be in a position to make one trip more a day than the Selkirk.

Like the Selkirk, the Prince Nova will carry 60 automobiles.
