## Top Ayrshire Bull Available For All Use

An Ayrshire bull with tremendous production behind him will be available to Island cattlemen this summer in the artificial breeding unit at Fredericton, N.B. which serves New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

The animal, Meredith Forester — he was one-year-old in January — comes from Meredith Farm, Topsfield, Mass. Forester's dam, Meredith Rosid, was the youngest Ayrshire cow to exceed 22,000 pounds of milk and she was the leading three-year-old cow in the United States in milk production with 22,899 pounds milk, 871 pounds butterfat in 305 days.

One of Forester's grand dams, Hammonds Top Primrose, produced 25,842 pounds milk, 966 pounds fat at the age of nine years. She is the highest grading living Ayrshire cow on conformation with a score of 96.8.

This cow was the first Ayrshire to produce more than 50,000 pounds of milk in two successive 305-day lactations. Her

production was 50,714 pounds milk, and her butterfat production was 979 pounds in the first lactation, and 960 in the second. She came from the Rowater Ayrshire herd in Newfoundland.

### DOZEN TOP COWS

Meredith Farm has a dozen cows that have produced 20,000 pounds of milk or more. When Arthur MacRae and Jim Williams were at Meredith Farm in February as a part of the selection committee that purchased the Forester bull, they had 69 cows that graded Excellent for conformation.

The sire of the Forester bull, Glenzarry Lloyd Royal, has 23 daughters with 48 production records that average 14,759 pounds of milk. Out of 29 classified daughters 17 were classed excellent for conformation, and there were 11 Very Good which is the highest possible, and the next to highest classifications that are possible.

Glenzarry Lloyd Royal is also the sire of Mackay Royal and the bull A. MacRae and Son brought to the province for their herd sire two years ago.

## Flight Check Reveals Ice Still Heavy

Little improvement has been noted in ice conditions in Northumberland Strait and around the eastern portion of Prince Edward Island since Tuesday.

A flight check Wednesday morning showed scattered ice from Wallace, N.S. to Cape Breton, N.S. Some leads have opened up around Pictou Island, but ice between Wood Islands and Caribou still prevents the department of transport from placing navigation aids that would permit Northumberland Ferries Ltd. to start the 1965 season.

From Cape George to north Cape Breton, heavy winter ice lies along the shore. From north Cape Breton it swings westward, lying along the north shore of Prince Edward Island to Morrell.

Other parts of Northumberland Strait from Wallace, N.S. to North Point at the west of this province appear ice-free. Also ice-free is the off-shore area of the Gulf of St. Lawrence from North Point almost to Rustico.

The 1965 lobster fishing season is scheduled to open May 8 but fishermen will be allowed to set traps May 7. Ice conditions could still cause some difficulties Friday in the Kings County fishing areas.

The Truth, he compared to confirmation, when God's truth is more clearly felt with the laying on of hands. The Life is the Holy Communion when the Christian's life is renewed through the bread and wine representing Christ's sacrifice.

## McCONNELL SEED-CUTTING POTATO PLANTER



**AUTOMATICALLY CUTS AND PLANTS SEEDS IN ONE OPERATION.**

It is actually tuber unit planting as seed pieces from each potato are planted consecutively in the row.

Seed potatoes are loaded in large hopper (A). They feed down into reservoir (B) where pickers on roller chain (C) pick up and discharge them at point (D) into seed coter unit (E).
