IN MEMORIAM

MIRANDA S. GARRETT
A well-loved and much respected citizen passed quietly to rest at Kingsboro, on March 14, 1958, in the person of Mrs. Miranda Stewart Garrett.

Mrs. Garrett, the daughter of the late John Ching and Miranda Stewart, of Red Point, was born October 20, 1880. In 1904 she was married to Albert Garrett and moved to a farm on the East Baltic road where she resided until about ten years ago. Since that time she has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Wesley Bruce.

Although in failing health for some time she remained active until a few months ago when she was hospitalized with influenza. After she tenderly cared for by her cousin, Mrs. John Robertson and members of her family. Her latter days were brightened by a visit from her son Rupert, who flew from Florida to be with her.

Mrs. Garrett had a very keen interest in the work of the church and community. Early in life she confessed her faith in Christ, and united with the Church of Christ (Disciples), at South Lake. Before the Red Point-East Baltic hall was built in 1911, she and her husband offered the facilities of their home to organize a Sunday School. The daily through put of Imperial refineries averaged 267,000 barrels, which was 3.2 per cent less than in 1956. Here the main cause was a nine-week strike at the loco refinery, near Vancouver, last fall.

Taxes took a larger slice of gross income than the company made in net earnings, the report shows. Federal sales taxes, municipal taxes and income taxes charged against 1957 income totalled \$84 millions, which was equivalent to \$2.68 per share. This does not include the gasoline road taxes of 10 to 17 cents a gallon nor other retail taxes which the company collected for provincial and municipal governments in the amount of \$104 millions.

Re-INVEST
Almost half of the company's \$72 millions net earnings was reinvested for use in the business. Dividends, paid at a rate of \$1.20 a share, which was the same as the year before, amounted to \$38 millions.

Imperial made 24 discoveries of crude oil and natural gas in western Canada last year, four of them in association with other interests. It drilled 91 net exploratory wells in western Canada, 44 relatively shallow holes in Ontario, and five in Quebec.

The company also drilled 163 net development wells, of which 137 were oil wells, three gas wells and 27 dry holes. At year end it had 2,242 oil wells and 143 gas wells capable of production.

As part of the company's quality improvement program, new units called "Powerformers" went into operation last year at Sarnia, Montreal and Halifax; new hearing completion at Vancouver and Winnipeg; and will soon be under construction at Calgary.

Work was pushed ahead on a \$28.5 million petrochemical plant at Sarnia which, on completion this summer, will provide raw materials for further processing by other companies into hundreds of consumer goods. A \$5-million detergent alkylate plant went into operation at Sarnia late in the year.

A new 35,500 DWT tanker, Imperial St. Lawrence, went into service during the year. It is the largest vessel in the company's fleet. The new 6,150 DWT Imperial Quebec replaced a 40-year-old tanker in lake and coastal service.

ELLIOT JAMES BRUCE
Elliot James Bruce, a life-long resident of Red Point and East Baltic, passed away at the Souris Hospital, on March 17, 1958. Earlier that day, neighbors, investigating an unanswered telephone call found him unconscious with a severe stroke. He had lived alone for most of the time since his wife, the former Clara Stewart, passed away nine years before him.
