## Reviews Activities Of Prince County Farm Federation

—In his report as president of the Prince County section of the Federation of Agriculture before the recent annual convention, in the Summerside High School, Mr. Edward MacGougan, of Malpeque, said that the Federation has made definite progress, and suggested that as any other organization, the Federation should always keep broadening out and going ahead in a manner that is acceptable to the majority of the members. He pointed out that the Federation is one of the leading organized groups in the country at the present time.

As in any other business or organization, Mr. MacGougan said, there are times when new systems and re-organization has to come about to make it more effective. "This, he said, is what has to be done in the Federation, not to the extent to which the members would like to see it, but to some plan that will be agreeable to the majority.

There has been established, he said, with Co-operative Unions, Credit Union League, Island Co-operative Services, and the fisheries extension department, a research division of the Federation to inquire into the social, educational, and economic problems.

Mr. L. P. McIsaac has been appointed director of the new division which will be most valuable in securing information to be used for guidance in deciding the Federation policy.

The re-organization of the Federation will entail a lot of planning and work, Mr. MacGougan pointed out, such as the grouping of twelve or fifteen school districts together around a central point, having a board of directors and a secretary, and it was suggested that the secretary might receive a commission for collecting the membership fees.

### Election Act Changes

Speaking of suggested changes in the Election Act, he said he hoped everyone thought seriously about this matter, because the reforms that had been presented to the members all required careful study before the government could be asked to consider them. Few people, he said, would argue the fact that our Election Act is outmoded and not in keeping with this modern day and age.

The Island educational system also needed to be changed, and might be effected by a plan similar to the one outlined for the Federation. It has been suggested, he said, that school boards be set up comprising twelve to fifteen schools with a town as the center. Speaking against retail price maintenance, he said strong representation has been made to the Prime Minister, other cabinet ministers, and our members of Parliament urging the enactment of legislation to curb or prohibit the practice of manufacturers dictating the price at which retailers will sell goods.

Such legislation, he said, would undoubtedly assist in lowering the cost of many items entering into farm production.

Retail prices kept in a straight-jacket by private price fixing would handicap agriculture which has to sell at prices set by supply and demand.

In a discussion of the increasing number of farmers who are using various methods of silo storage, Mr. MacGougan said that a study is being made of the various types of silos, and the different methods of storage in use, to determine which are the most satisfactory.

## IN MEMORIAM

### JAMES WENDELL MacLEOD

The community of Glen-garry and Salt-springs as well as other parts of Pictou County, N. S., were shocked to hear of the tragic death of James Wendell MacLeod as the result of a truck-train accident at West River Station, November 20th, at 10:45 A. M. Born at Long Creek, P. E. I., in the year 1926, the son of the late Thomas MacLeod and Mrs. MacLeod, he came to Pictou County five years ago, and since then had made his home in Salt-springs, until his marriage to the former Ria Marshall of Glen-garry, six weeks before his death. Since that time they had made their home in Truro.

Although a member of the Long Creek Baptist Church, since coming to Pictou County he attended St. Luke's United Church, Salt-springs regularly.

He conducted a trucking business and was thus employed when he met his untimely death. He was well known and respected. The remains rested at the home of his widow's parents, Mr. and

Mrs. J. R. Marshall, Glen-garry, and from thence were conveyed to Middle River Church where the funeral was held Thursday, November 22nd. It was exceptionally large, friends coming from far and near.

The service was conducted by the Rev. Dr. MacQuarrie of St. Columba Church, Hopewell, assisted by the pastor of the church, Rev. L. Mulder, and Mr. Harry Funge, pastor of Salt-springs United Church in the absence of Rev. Douglas Gass.

The combined choirs of Middle River and St. Columba Church sang an old favorite "There's a Land That is Fairer Than Day," also the "23rd Psalm" and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus."

The pallbearers were Arnot Graham, George McCulloch, Alden Fraser, Herbie Robinson, Douglas Marshall and Ernest Matheson. Interment was in the little cemetery on the hill behind the church. The casket was completely banked with floral offerings.

Surviving besides his widow are his mother, Mrs. Nellie MacLeod, Charlottetown, P. E. I., and two brothers, Ray of Long Creek and Louis of Niagara Falls, Ont., all

of whom were present at the funeral.
