Black Hawks Tie Series; Outscore Canadiens 3-1

CHICAGO (CP)—Lorne Ferguson's third-period goal and an empty-net counter by Glen Skov Tuesday night gave Chicago Black Hawks a 3-1 win over Montreal Canadiens for an even break at 2-2 in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final.

The free-skating Hawks, checking as if their lives depended on it, threw the Montrealers off balance early after overcoming a one-goal lead and went on to win the acclaim of a roaring crowd of 17,538, second largest for a hockey game in Chicago Stadium.

The teams sawed off evenly in the first period on goals by Marcel Bonin of Montreal and Bobby Hull of the Hawks.

The teams battled through a torrid second period and appeared headed for overtime when the big break came.

Ferguson cut in from the left boards, took Earl Balfour's pass and blasted a 15-foot shot past goalie Jacques Plante at 13:26. With the crowd still in an uproar and sensing a second victory on Chicago ice, Skov made it safe for the Hawks at 19:49. He took Balfour's pass and calmly lifted the puck into the net vacated by Plante in favor of an extra forward.

With the series all tied up, the teams meet again in Montreal Thursday and back in Chicago again Saturday.

THREE YEARS AGO this spring Conn Smythe made the terse statement, "you'll never see Harry Lumley in a Maple Leaf uniform again." He won't be back next season. Lumley is through with this club.

Yes, Harry was supposedly finished as an N.H.L. goalkeeper as the Leafs' shouted "make way for youth." Lumley was washed up with the Leafs. His exit came after Detroit Red Wings ousted the Queen City crew from Stanley Cup play. It was the last time Maple Leafs were to reach the playoffs until the spring of 1959. Then their opponents were the Boston Bruins and who do you think was keeping watch over the Boston cage but the same Harry Lumley. Pardon us for the slip he wasn't the same Lumley. This time he's three years older than when Leafs gave him the old heave-ho.

WELL, THE LEAFS had plenty of youth on this 1958-59 edition, a belting band of youngsters who had amazed the experts by edging New York Rangers for the last playoff spot. Fellows like Frank Mahovlich, Dick Duff, Carl Brewer just to name a few soon tried to make the veteran Lumley look bad in the Boston nets. But old Lum beat them and robbed them. He just seem to gloat as the Bruins took those first two contests before howling Boston fans.

Again Saturday night in Toronto, Harry was terrific despite the fact that Gerry Ehman beat him in overtime for the winning marker. When this column was written, the result of the fourth game was not known but regardless of its outcome, Lumley has stamped himself as a top goalie once again.

THERE IS ALWAYS something nice about a castoff coming back to have his moments of glory and we can't imagine anyone except the Leafs themselves, whose hearts he broke, not enjoying old Lum's great exhibition.

Yes perhaps, he'll look horrible before this series draws to a close but regardless of the outcome Lumley has shown enough in those first three games to stamp him as still NHL material. That's more than the Leafs' management thought he was three years ago.

THERE WAS a great contrast between Boston Gardens and Madison Square Gardens the morning following Leafs, clinching of fourth spot in the National Hockey League standings. Stanley Cup fever really hit Beantown and as early that Monday morning as 6 o'clock fans were gathering in line at the ticket wicket. Some even brought camp stools and playing cards.

At New York it was a different story. The Rangers, who were almost assured a playoff spot, had put tickets on sale a couple of weeks before. That Monday morning they were busy refunding thousands of dollars.

And that kind of work is never any fun.

SPEAKING OF the New York Rangers, a story coming out of the Big City suggested making a package deal of Bill Gadsby and Dean Prentice and try to deal for power from other clubs. However, Muzz Patrick put thumbs down on that suggestion. His idea is to try dealing for a defenceman and a centre. He doesn't think that Rangers' defence would be fortified by getting rid of Mr. Gadsby.

We don't think so either. The good ones the Rangers have, they had better hold.

WHEN BOSTON BRUINS had posters printed for their semi-final series, they blared forth that Rangers would be opponents of the Bruins. However, they had to do a patch job on the posters, putting Toronto Maple Leafs over the name New York Rangers.

Punch Imlach enjoyed the whole thing and gave out with this comment when he spied one patch job. "That'll teach them to have no confidence in me, an ex-Bruin." But Imlach wouldn't gloat over the sadness in the New York camp. He figured it's bad enough being down without being kicked all over the lot.

And Imlach should know all about being down. That's where he spent the most of the season.

CHICAGO CUBS are in better spirits these days and the reason is a fellow named Moe Drabowsky.

Moe was expected to lead the Bob Scheffing coached outfit into the first division this season but a thumb injury made Cubs pretty bloody early last month.

However, the news is brighter from the Cubs' camp and Drabowsky started throwing curves this past Monday. He's confident he'll be able to play in exhibition games before the regular season lid is pried off.

Moe has the thumb protected by a pad while he works to get his arm back in shape.

AND SADNESS emanates from the camp of the Boston Red Sox and the Splendid Splinter, Ted Williams is the cause.

Ted is in hospital taking treatments for a neck ailment and there certainly is no assurance that he'll be ready to start the periodic traction treatments and possible use of a surgical collar season. Williams has had a series of X-rays and is scheduled for to relieve the pains that have plagued him for the past two weeks.

At first Ted expressed confidence he'd be ready to open with the Sox at Yankee Stadium but later he admitted that he might be sidelined for a longer period.

MAHOVLICH SCORES CLINCHER

Leafs Edge Bruins 3-2 In Overtime At Toronto

TORONTO (CP) — Big Frank Mahovlich, a bust in the early part of the season, scored at 11:21 of sudden-death overtime Tuesday night to give Toronto Maple Leafs a 3-2 victory over Boston Bruins and tie their best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final series at two games apiece.

The six-foot-one centre whipped a 15-foot backhand behind goaltender Harry Lumley, the National Hockey League veteran who played another spectacular game in the Boston nets, as the Bruins tried desperately to tie off a major penalty that couldn't have come at a worse time.

It was the second straight time Leafs staggered the Beantowners with an overtime triumph. They

won 3-2 here last Saturday. Centre Brian Cullen, who has seen limited service with Leafs this season, and Gerry Ehman, the overtime scorer Saturday, were the other Leaf marksmen.

Bronco Horvath and Gerry Toppazzini picked up the Bruin goals.

The series moves to Boston for a fifth game Thursday and returns here for a sixth meeting Saturday. Bruins captured the first game 5-1 and the second 4-2.

Mahovlich, a 21-year-old who came on strong in the latter part of the 1958-59 campaign, ended things as he swung around in front of Lumley after taking left-winger Bert Olmstead's pass from the back boards and let go a hard shot.

The Bruins were in a frantic state at the time. Left-winger Guy Gendron, who leaped high as he ran into Ehman at the Boston blue line and cross-checked the Leaf forward across the face, was serving a five-minute major sentence. He drew blood and an automatic \$25 fine.

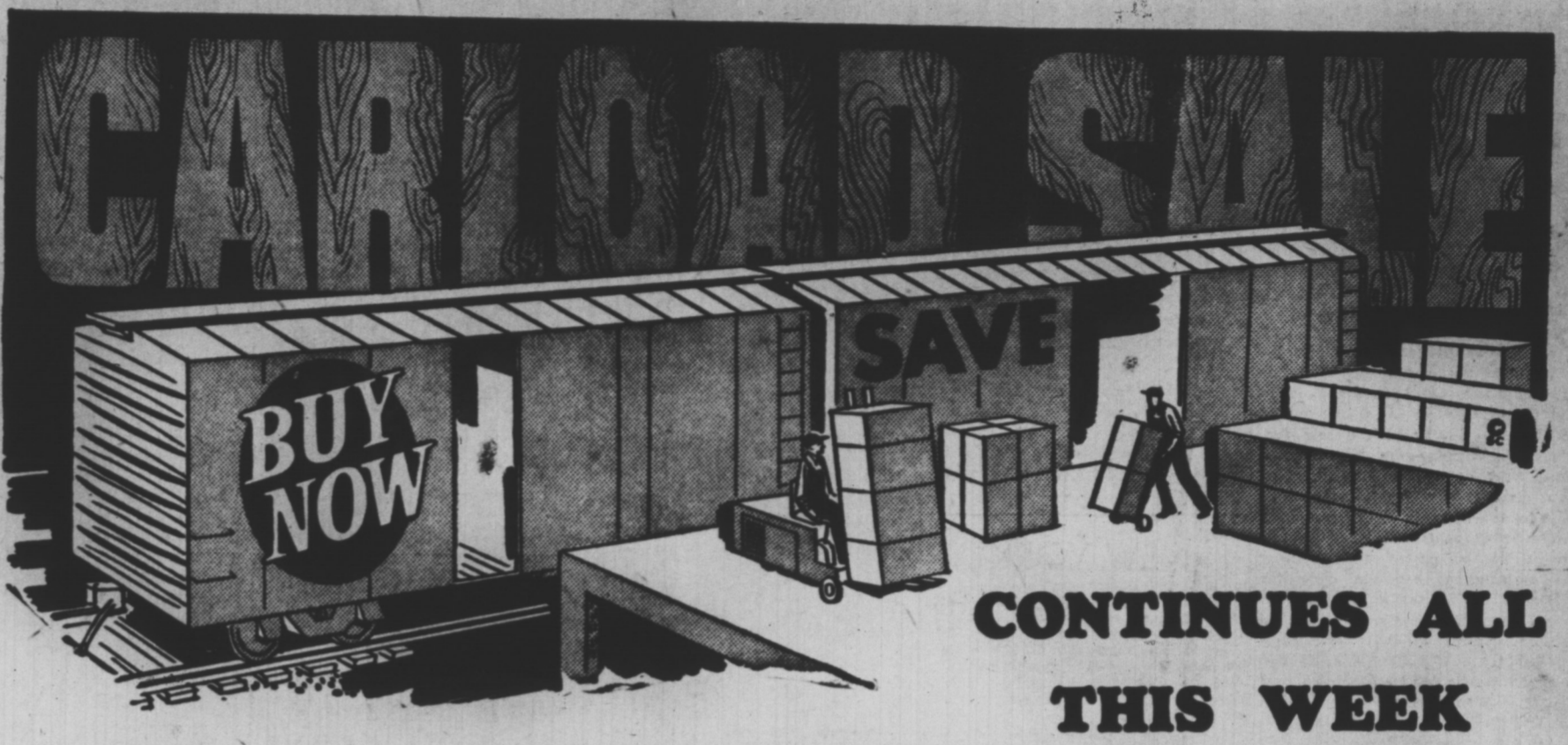
