

# Hawks Squeeze Out 5-4 Win Over Halifax St. Mary's Last Night

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 1 (CP)—Denis Filion led the way tonight as Moncton Hawks squeezed out a 5-4 win over the luckless Halifax St. Mary's in a regular Maritime Major Hockey League game here.

The win left Hawks alone in third place in the league standings, three points ahead of St. Mary's and one game behind second place Glace Bay Miners.

Hawks rode to victory on their early play. They fired three markers in the first period while holding their opponents scoreless and added two more in the second.

St. Mary's pressed midway through the second period and found the range with three goals before the period ended. They added another in the third but were unable to knot the count.

Filion was the star of the game turning in a hat trick and collecting an assist on Moncton's second goal. He also drew a misconduct penalty for fighting with Andy Brown in the penalty box after both had drawn minor penalties for roughing.

After brief fist swinging session between Red Olsen of Hawks and St. Mary's Hughie Campbell sent them off with minor penalties.

The game was a slow moving, rugged affair most of the way with Hawks holding the territorial edge in the first period while being out-shot 26-24 in the game.

Morrie Hamilton and Danny Horeck accounted for two Moncton goals. Hamilton also had a pair of assists, and Horeck one.

They are en route elsewhere now. If they consider a report necessary they will make one. Then I will deal with it as necessary."

Earlier this year when the Halifax management made it known to the hockey public that they had a working agreement with Montreal Canadiens, Maritime hockey fandom were looking for big things from the Nova Scotia capital entry. What, with their pre-season training camp being held in the Montreal Forum and innumerable prospects trying out for a berth on the Saints roster it was a general feeling that the Garrison City was really going after the Big Six title in a big way.

According to reports it was only a case of snapping their fingers in the general direction of Montreal to bring a rush of top-flight players if such were needed.

Well they sure are going to need them and generally speaking, most ardent fans hope they will get them. Hockey entertainment for the cash customer is at its best when all participating clubs are kept involved in a tight battle for positions along the full route of the schedule.

Even though each centre wants to see their own team on top, nobody takes much interest in the sport if there is a "weak sister" club. Such a statement coming from the camp of the team that is presently holding sole possession of the cellar slot may sound strange to some observers, but to the average Islanders fan, their boys are definitely on the upgrade from here on and not even the top spot is beyond their grasp during the schedule that lays ahead.

From what can be learned at present from in and around the Halifax camp, officials are not too hopeful of immediate player reinforcements to strengthen their roster and seem to be concentrating on scooping up some of last season's brigade that had returned to the fold during the current season.

George MacGregor and Bill Ford are two of the present prospects being mentioned. MacGregor was suspended from hockey indefinitely by the C. A. H. A. in the latter stages of last season's schedule after he quit the Saint Mary's Club over a dispute between player and management. Ford, who turned out with Halifax at their training camp in Montreal also walked out before the schedule opened.

Big Hughie Campbell also took his walking ticket at the same time as Ford, but since then has come to an agreement and rejoined the Saints last week.

# Maple Leafs Defeat Canadians 4-2 In Wild Game At Montreal

MONTRÉAL, Nov. 1 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs tonight defeated Toronto National Canadiens 4-2 in a wild National Hockey League game that blew sky high into a free-for-all late in the second period.

Out of the brawl, that lasted 10 minutes or more in a blood-letting affair sometimes associated with Toronto - Montreal engagements, came two game misconduct penalties and six major penalties.

Toronto's win lifted the Leafs over Canadians into second place, Boston Bruins, winning over Detroit Red Wings, moved into a third-place tie with Canadiens.

Captain Ted Kennedy scored two of the Leafs' goals and Sid Smith and Harry Watson got the others. Floyd Curry and Ken Mosdell scored for Canadians.

The win was the Leafs' second over Canadians in two nights. They edged the Habitués 1-0 in Toronto and exploded with the loudest bang in the free-for-all, fighting with Fern Flaman and Bill Judd.

The Rocket, still after his 300th goal of his N.H.L. career, drew a double major and a game misconduct penalty and sat out the rest of the affair in the dressing room. Flaman was given a single major and a game misconduct. Butch Bouchard of Canadiens and Judd each received majors. Later Ken Mosdell was given a major for slapping Gus Mortson into the boards and drawing blood.

The Leafs went in front early in the third period and stayed there. Canadiens held on while two men short, and were one short when Smith's close-in shot deflected into the net off a Montreal player in the scramble.

Canadiens were again a man short when Harry Watson took Fleming Mackell's perfect passout from the boards and sent a low shot into the corner of the net.

Ken Mosdell wound up the scoring with a sharp, hard drive from directly in front of the net, skating through the Leaf team after taking Tom Johnson's pass.

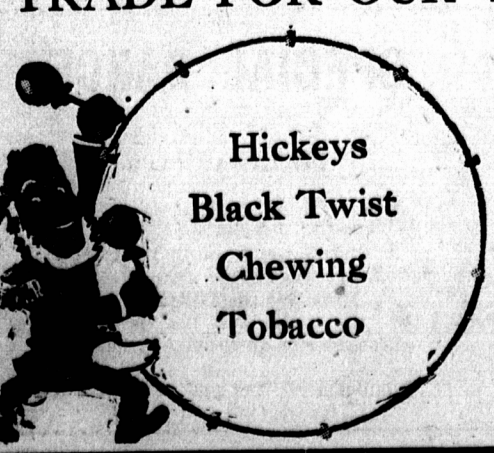
