THE CONQUERING HERO.

A jubilant contemporary wants to know when Bagot ever elected a liberal before. We are constrained to say that it has never happened. It may also be admitted that Bagot is one of the several Quebec constituencies which have departed from their former record by electing supporters of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Caudor alone compels the further statement that throughout the province of Quebec, except the English speaking Eastern Townships, the conservative party has never before been so far in the minority as it is now.

The only parallel to the present situation is furnished by the position in 1890 to 1892, when the late Mr Mercier, assisted by Mr Tarte and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, swept everything before him in the province except in the Eastern Townships. Except that Mr Mercier is gone the party now in control is the same management, and has the same leaders as in 1890. Its methods are the same, its principles are the same, and its power in Quebec is the same. The Mercier regime came to a sudden and inglorious end and was condemned even in the districts where it seemed to be supreme. The same thing may happen again. But, as in 1891, the Quebec by-elections give no sign of it. The reduced government majorities in Ontario and P E Island indicate a growing sentiment against the methods of the ministry. The increased Laurier vote in Quebec is quoted by Mr Tarte as signifying the determination to maintain the government in power. Mr Tarte's contention has the support of the returns.

DEATH OF CAPTAIN PAOLI.

By the death of Captain Paul Paoli, which occurred on Saturday afternoon, a good citizen is lost to the community. Captain Paoli has been a resident of Charlottetown for upwards of thirty years, and few men were better known or more generally respected. His honesty and integrity characterized all his actions, and the better he was known the more highly was he appreciated.

Captain Paoli has for several years past sailed as master of the steamer May Queen, which he owned, and he always seemed to be in excellent health. On Saturday afternoon, while doing some work about the steamer, he felt himself coming weak and left for his home. On the way up the wharf he fell, and was picked up by some men who took him into the office of Capt. Ronald McMillan, and his son, Mr Simon Paoli, accountant with Poole & Lewis, was summoned to his side by telephone. Medical aid was called in, and he soon recovered sufficiently to be driven to his home on Hillsborough street. Upon his arrival there he walked down the sleigh on the house, apparently much improved. After entering the house he laid down upon a lounge, and medical aid was again called in. The doctor saw that the end was approaching, and the priest was brought to the house with all possible despatch and the last rites of the church were administered. Within half an hour after Captain Paoli's arrival at his home the spirit fled. Heart failure was the cause of death.

The funeral of the deceased took place this morning, and the large attendance of mourning citizens evidenced the esteem in which he was held and the regret that was caused by his unexpected death. The pall-bearers were M. P. Hogan, William Dillon, Ronald McMillan, Thomas B. Riley, Thomas Z. Taylor and John Lewis. The services at the church and at the grave were conducted by Rev. Dr. Morrison.

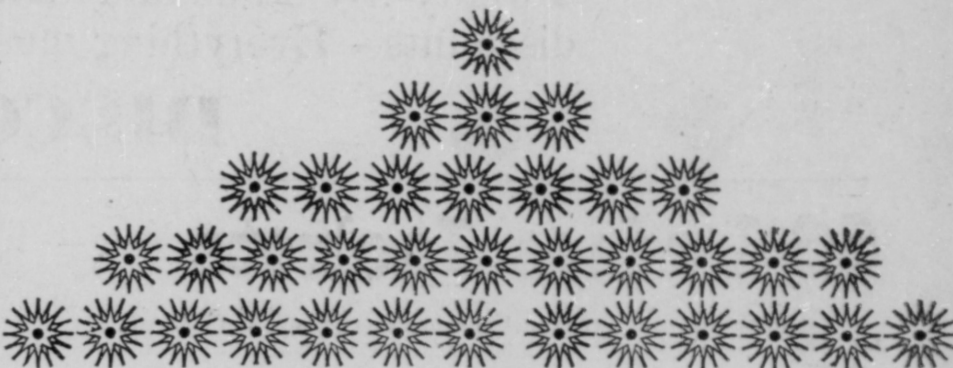
